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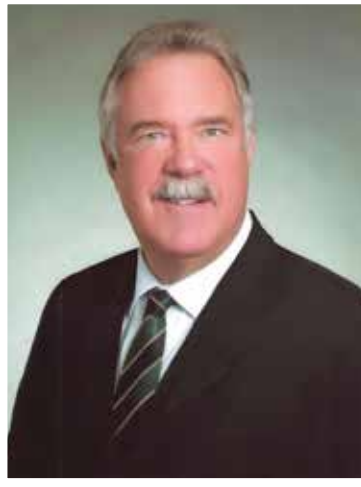
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SPECIAL MESSAGE FROM THE TOWN OF FAIRVIEW

TXU Request

Country Club Road/DART

TxDOT is making good progress on the improvements along Country Club. I want to address a related issue that caused some concern on social media. An announcement went out in late April that this road was going to be shut down over a weekend due to DART construction. Going east on Country Club, just before Stoddard Road, there is a DART crossing. Because only DART can do work in DART right-of-way, DART was there to improve the crossing. This was part of the overall TxDOT improvement project. Nothing more.

DART owns right-of-way from the Parker Station in Plano all the way up to Denison. McKinney does want DART to come into their downtown area. To get to McKinney, DART has to pass through Allen and Fairview. Neither Allen nor Fairview is interested in joining DART at this time. DART could decide to build into McKinney through Allen and Fairview using their right-of-way without locating any stops in either city. All this being said ... there is nothing going on that will bring DART through Fairview.

McKinney Airport

The political leadership in McKinney has stated multiple times that if the bond issue is voted down by their residents, they will find another way to build the passenger terminal. If McKinney wants economic development out of the airport property, the best thing they could do is shut down the airport and build taxable property — buildings — on that site. The airport, I believe, is a drag on the McKinney economy — not a positive force. We have won a battle with the defeat of the bond issue. We are now talking about how to win the war.

COUNCIL'S CORNER



At the Tuesday, April 4, 2023, Regular Town Council meeting:

- Mayor Henry Lessner presented a proclamation declaring April 2023 as “Sexual Assault Awareness and Prevention Month” in the Town of Fairview.



The Council also:

- Received and accepted a presentation from Weaver & Tidwell regarding the annual independent audit for the fiscal year ended Sept. 30, 2022
- Approved the following items on the consent agenda:
 - a. Minutes of the March 7, 2023, Regular Council meeting
 - b. Minutes of the March 28, 2023, Special Council meeting
 - c. An amended Plat of Lots 9 and 10, Block A of the Woodland Farm Estates Addition into one (1) lot. The 4.75-acre site is located at 430 Lakewood Drive and is zoned for the (RE-2) Two-acre Ranch Estate District. Applicant/Owners: Henry and Shannon Van Beber
 - d. A renewal of the 2023 Municipal Mosquito contract for mosquito management services
- Received an update on construction projects
- Held a public hearing and approved an ordinance granting a request for a Major Warrant associated with a revised site plan to accommodate an accessory structure and a revision to the Master Sign Plan for the Lincoln Office Building. The 8.72-acre site is located at 195 Murray Farm Road, at the northwest corner of Murray Farm Road and Convention Drive and is zoned for the (CPDD) Commercial Planned Development District with the Urban Village Sub-district. Applicant: Trey Braswell, Kimley-Horn and Associates representing Fairview Office, LLC
- Took the following actions:
 - a. Approved a request for a Final Plat of the Field Addition. The 15.0+/- acre tract of land is located at 661 Meandering Way and is zoned for the (RE- 2) Two-acre Ranch Estate District. Applicant: Tom Field, Thompson Realty, representing owners, Lonnie and Antionette Tillinghas
 - b. Approved an ordinance related to short-term rentals
 - c. Authorized the Town Manager to execute a professional services agreement for materials testing with Alliance Geotech for Fairview Crossing (Frisco Rd) construction
 - d. Appointed Gary Wittsche to the Park Board

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Fairview's Financially Healthy Outlook

An independent auditing firm has confirmed that the Town's financial position is strong, with healthy reserves.

At the April 4 Town Council meeting, Claire Wootton, CPA with the independent auditing firm of Weaver and Tidwell, presented the Town of Fairview an unmodified or "clean" opinion on the Fiscal Year 2022 Comprehensive Annual Financial Report. The financial statements were presented in conformity with Generally Accepted Accounting Principles and audited in accordance with Generally Accepted Accounting Auditing Standards by a firm of licensed Certified Public Accountants.

Financial highlights for Fiscal Year 2022 include:

- ▶ The assets and deferred outflows of resources of the Town exceeded its liabilities and deferred inflows of resources at the close of the most recent fiscal year by \$49 million.
- ▶ The Town's total net position increased by \$4 million. This was due to a net increase in revenues over expenses in 2022, mostly from the business-type activities where operating income exceeded \$3.4 million due to increases in water sales due to the hot, dry summer.

- ▶ As of the close of the current fiscal year, the Town of Fairview's governmental funds reported combined ending fund balances of \$13.5 million, an increase of \$394,840 in comparison with the prior year.
- ▶ The \$5.9 million unassigned fund balance in the General Fund represents 60 percent of the total General Fund expenditures.
- ▶ The Town's long-term liabilities decreased by \$3.3 million (-10.0 percent) during the current fiscal year. This was due to continued payments on long-term liabilities during 2022.

The goal of the independent audit is to provide reasonable assurance that the financial statements of the Town of Fairview are free from material misstatements. The audit involves examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements; assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management; and evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. The results of the audit continue to reflect the goals of the Town Council in maintaining a strong financial position. 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Spring Cleaning Events Gave the Town Fresh Shine

Participation was strong in Fairview’s three spring cleaning events – a cleanup of parks, trails and roadways, the annual hazardous waste collection and the annual document shredding – all held April 15.

More than 300 vehicles lined up to drop off paper and items that can’t be tossed with regular trash for the document shredding and hazardous waste collection events at the Public Works yard. And about 25 energetic volunteers scoured the town for trash in the cleanup event organized by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board.

Jaws Sequel Coming to Fairview

Fairview's Fire Station 2 is awaiting delivery of new life-saving equipment. In March, the Town Council approved an expenditure of about \$31,000 to replace the older hydraulic Jaws of Life, which helps firefighters cut through wreckage to quickly extricate victims from crashed vehicles. The powerful tools are also capable of prying apart crushed metal and cutting through debris in a building collapse.

The new equipment will shave several minutes off the set-up time when responding to an emergency. Traditional hydraulic Jaws of Life require rescuers to attach pressurized hoses. The new equipment is similar to apparatus already in use at Station 1, which are powered by batteries instead of requiring connections to heavy hoses, making them more nimble and easier to handle.



"With the battery-operated ones, you get them out, flip a switch, turn the handle, and you're ready to go," Fairview Fire Chief Jeff Bell said. "Instead of having a 5-minute set up time, it's instant."

When firefighters need these tools, victims are typically severely injured, and this crucial time saved can change the outcome dramatically.

The new set of battery-operated tools is expected to be delivered in early Summer 2023.

County Service Keeps an Eye on Your Property

Collin County Clerk Stacey Kemp has posted a new – and free – online service that will let you know if anyone attempts to change your property’s documents on file in Collin County. A Property Fraud Alert will notify you of changes made to your deed.

This notification system is set up to help thwart people filing fraudulent land records with the county clerk, making it look like they own your home or business property.

And it happens.

Scam artists pick a house to steal, maybe a rental property. They then assume the homeowner’s identity using any information they can find to create fake IDs, forge signatures and notarizations and file a fraudulent deed transferring the property away from the legitimate homeowner. Next, they record the deed and sell the property or remortgage it and pocket the proceeds – and it can be long gone before the homeowner is aware of what’s happened.

Property Fraud Alert is a team effort with the county clerk to help keep you informed if someone tries to file a land record using your name.

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Mobile Technology at Work Amidst Wildflowers

The Town's Coyote Meadow Park is sporting some new amenities this spring without compromising the natural environment. The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board organized a wildflower seed spreading workday last December, and the board hopes the resulting



flowers are coming soon. Adding to this tableau is new technology to ramp up the experience, so get your mobile devices ready!

Dallas-based PlantTAGG recently "PlantTAGG-enabled" Coyote Meadow, located at 567 N. Meandering Way, with three signs that help visitors learn about our native wildflowers and plants. PlantTAGG is at the forefront of bringing data

science and artificial intelligence to our fingertips to help people immerse with nature. Fairview is one of the first towns to embrace use of PlantTAGG'S mobile technology to help our community enjoy the wonders of nature.

PlantTAGG is built upon data from leading horticulture research institutions, certified Master Gardeners and data scientists. It

includes information on more than 7,500 plants in a virtual library. The experience at Coyote Meadow allows users to identify plants using their phone cameras, add to 'Favorites,' learn about each plant and even determine how well it may grow in their own yards.

PlantTAGG is free to use. The full version of PlantTAGG, downloadable as a mobile app from both the Apple and Google stores, allows users to select a micro-climate (called a Zone in the app) and add plants from their own yards. As plants are added, PlantTAGG will warn the user if the conditions of the Zone aren't well suited for the plant and allows users to define how they will fertilize.

Plant selection through careful planning is the first step in the gardening success. The heart of PlantTAGG is its unique ability to deliver hyper-local plant care information based precisely on where a gardener lives. The system is connected to over 10,000 NOAA weather stations in the U.S. to create a unique season map for each plant in a yard.

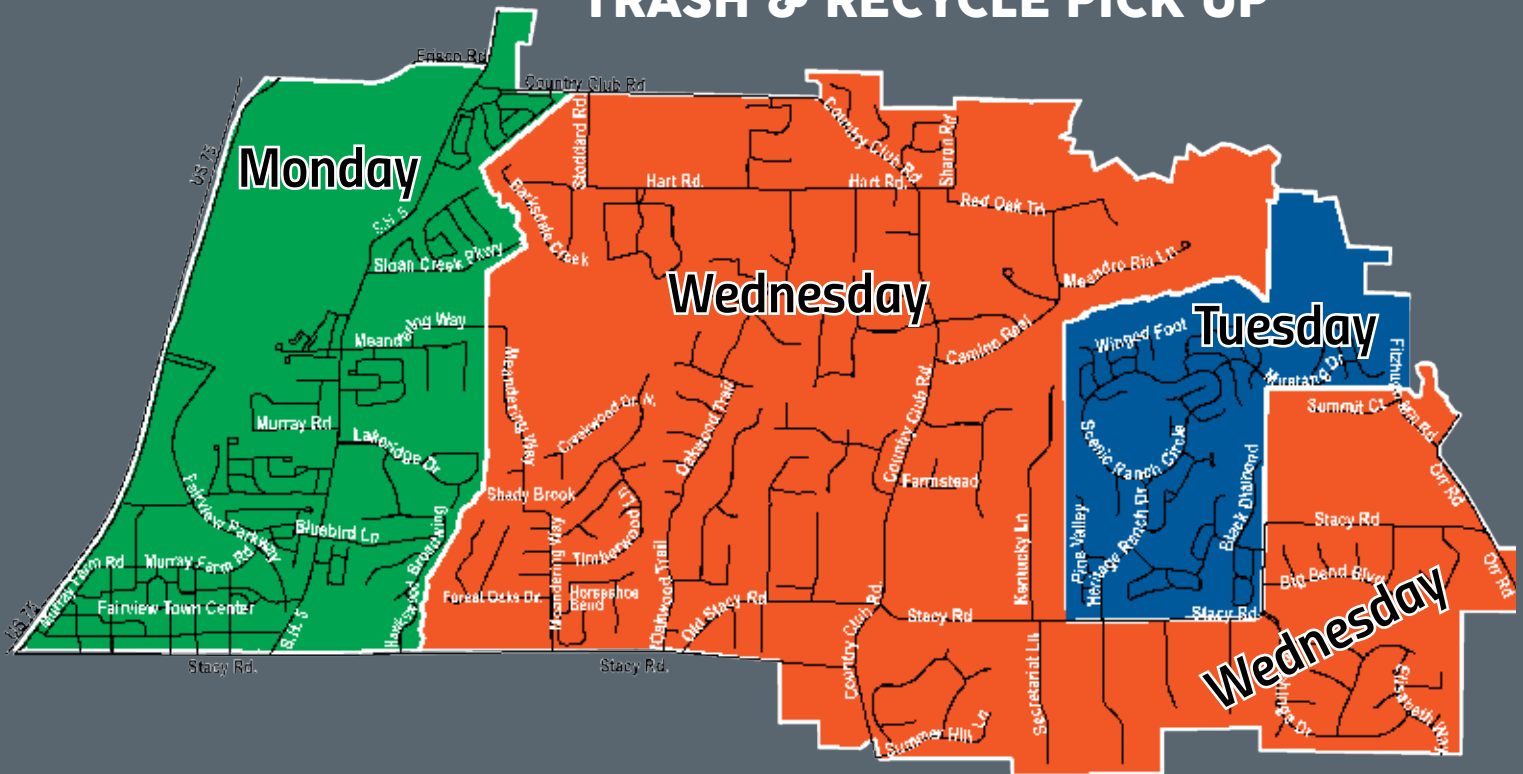

Trash, Bulk and Brush Collection

TRASH & RECYCLE PICK UP



Trash and recycling carts should be placed at edge of the street/alley no earlier than 5 p.m. prior to your collection day and no later than 7 a.m. on collection day. Only household waste, grass clippings, leaves and similar yard waste placed in an approved container will be collected.

Key things to remember:

1. Trash carts are solid blue. Recycling carts are either solid green or dark blue with a lighter blue lid.
2. Shredded paper is no longer accepted for recycling. All recyclables should be clean and dry and placed loose inside your recycling cart. For a full list of recyclable materials, visit RepublicServices.com.
3. Carts should be placed with handles facing the house and lids opening toward the street or alley.
4. Carts must be placed 2 to 3 feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters or other



objects that will obstruct the pickup arm.

5. Trash should be inside securely tied plastic bags, and all bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
6. Do not place hazardous waste in the cart.
7. Nothing should be placed outside the cart except for acceptable bulk or brush placed for pickup on your scheduled bulk and brush pickup week.
8. Carts must be rolled back away from the street after pickup – no later than 6 a.m. the following day.
9. Bulk and brush should be cut into 4-foot lengths and neatly stacked. Up to 12 cubic yards of brush or bulk are allowed per address in a month. A single cubic yard is 3 feet long, 3 feet wide and 3 feet tall.

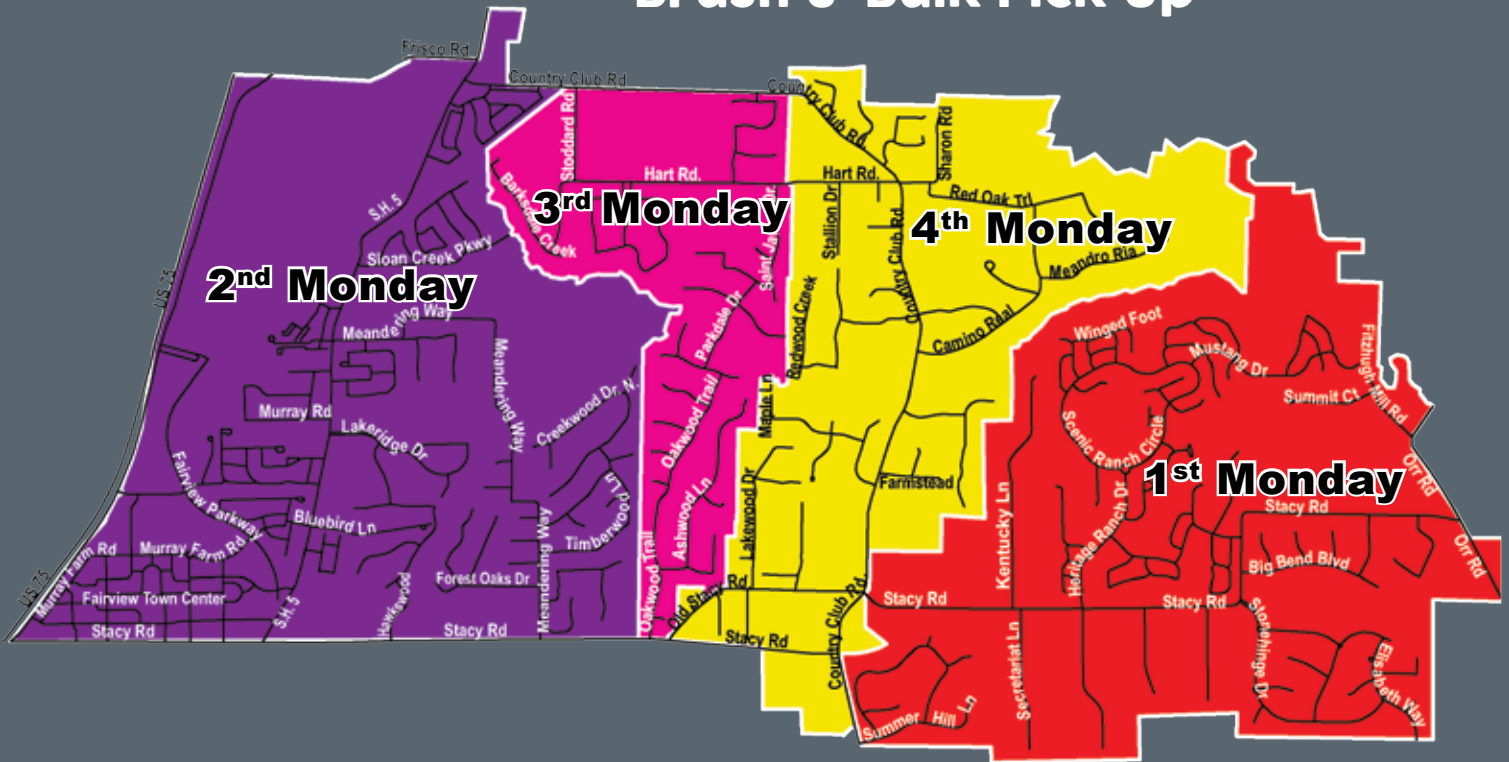

Trash Talk

The ABCs of Weekly Trash and Recycling Collection

Those big trucks that collect our trash and recycling are amazing, but they need your help to do their work properly. Remember these ABCs to keep the trucks moving on schedule, so everyone gets timely collection:

- Arrange** carts carefully. Cart handles should face your home, and lids should open toward the street. **Allow** at least 2 feet of space between carts and other objects, including mailboxes, meters, fences and automobiles.
- Be** punctual. Have your trash and recycling carts in place at edge of the street or alley no earlier than 5 p.m. prior to your collection day and no later than 7 a.m. on collection day. And remember to roll your carts back to your house by 6 a.m. the day after pickup.
- Close** but **don't clamp** or lock lids. If there's not enough space in your solid blue trash cart to close the lid, purchase a pink tag from the Town for \$2.07. Only bags tagged with Town-issued tags will be picked up if they're left outside of carts (except for bags left on your bulk pickup week).

Did You Know? Clean and dry aluminum cans, notebook paper and cereal boxes are perfect for putting in your recycling bin. But aluminum foil, shredded paper and coated cardboard cannot be recycled in Fairview.
