

Stacy Road Update

In August, CoServ Gas was able to get their underground lines out of conflict with some underground storm sewer lines designed for the new Stacy Road expansion on the south side. Ed Bell Construction began installing the underground storm sewer work in August. There is also some more underground work to do at the intersection of Angel Parkway and Stacy Road.

Curb inlet installation was complete in mid-September, the subgrade work for the two new driving lanes to be poured was scheduled to begin at the end of September. Once the subgrade is complete, then the paving crews will come out to install the two southern driving lanes and the side street connections into Allen subdivisions. TxDOT believes this will occur before Thanksgiving.

There are also some new traffic signal pole and SH5 intersection improvements to be done after the traffic switch. This work will go on after the first of the year. The project should be completed early next year.


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SHOWDOWN HALF MARATHON AND 5K

The Seventh Annual Showdown Half Marathon and 5K will be held the morning of Saturday, October 6, 2018, on the same day as the Red River Showdown, the annual rivalry football game between the University of Texas and the University of Oklahoma.



NOTE: The course is all paved concrete or asphalt road. There is 0.3 miles on Frisco Road at mile 3.3 that has rougher asphalt. if you pre-drive the course, be aware the barricades on Frisco Road will be removed on race day. DO NOT off road here if previewing the course.

The festivities begin at 7 a.m. with a kids dash. The Half marathon begins at 7:30 a.m. and the 5K will start at 7:45 a.m. The race will wind through Fairview and back to Town Hall.

Review the course map to help you better plan your morning when getting out and about. While there will be no major street closures there will be some flagman traffic along Stacy Road and traffic delays along the course. The course will be clear by noon.

The State Fair of Texas as we know it today began in 1885 when local civic leaders proposed the idea of producing Dallas' first fair. In the 19th century fairs and exhibitions reflected the country's agricultural-based economy so it only seemed natural that Texas join in on the trend.

Originally a private corporation; the directors of Dallas State Fair and Exposition began experiencing differences of opinion on where to build the new fairgrounds. When a compromise couldn't be reached some of the directors broke off on their own and started their own event called the Texas State Fair and Exposition just north of town, opening one day before the Dallas State Fair which was being held on 80 acres of prairie land that is now known as Fair Park.

Financial troubles plagued both fairs and both organizations decided to merge in 1887 and renamed the event the Texas State Fair and Dallas Exposition and Fair park became the permanent home. And, despite

being in debt the new directors voted to expand the fairgrounds by purchasing an additional 37 acres.

When Texas banned gambling on horse races in 1903 the Fair's main source of income was eliminated and caused even more financial woes. In an effort to protect the Fair the board of directors sold the property to the City of Dallas with the agreement that allowed for a period of time each fall to hold the annual fair and exposition.

With this reorganization the State Fair of Texas immediately began seeing profits and record attendance. The Fair even garnered attention from Presidents Taft and Wilson. Car races and stunt flying exhibitions become the top attractions and helped the attendance reach the 1 million mark. However, in 1918 because of World War I the Fair was cancelled and Fair Park was converted into a temporary army encampment.

Some other highlights in the history of the State Fair include:

- The opening of the Music Hall in 1925.
- The First Texas/OU Game in 1929.
- The building of the 46,000 seat Cotton Bowl Stadium in 1930.
- The hosting of the Texas Centennial Exposition in 1936 which spurred the \$25 million project to transform the fairgrounds into a masterpiece of art-deco buildings.
- Fletcher's Corny Dogs make their debut in 1942.
- Big Tex finds his home at the State Fair in 1952.
- The Texas Star Ferris Wheel the largest ferris wheel in North America makes its debut in 1985
- Fair Park was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1986.

This year's fair will run from September 28 – October 21. Highlights of this year's entertainment include Little Hands on the Farm, nightly parades and fireworks displays, live music and of course The Food - featuring deep fried shepherd's pie and cotton candy tacos.

Tickets range in price from \$14-\$18 and are discounted when purchased online. Food and ride tickets can also be purchased online as well. The State Fair also has many discount days including free admissions on Thursday for Seniors (60 years and older), first responders day and North Texas Food Bank discount days – just to name a few. HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS 13 15

CHILD SAFETY

- Never eat any treats until they are examined by an adult at your home.
- Never Trick-or-Treat alone. Go with friends or a parent.
- Never enter the house or car of a stranger.
- Always Trick-or-Treat before dark.
- Trick-or-Treat in your own neighborhood and visit houses that you know.
- Stay on streets that are well lit, and cross the street at corners.
- Never run across the street and ALWAYS look both ways before crossing.
- Never take short cuts through backyards, alleys or parks.
- Carry a flashlight so you can see hazards, and wear reflective tape so drivers can see you.
- Only Trick-or-Treat at houses that are well lit and that have a porch light on.
- Do not let children use sharp tools to carve pumpkins. Allow children to draw faces on pumpkins with markers and then have the adults cut them.

ADULT SAFETY

- Only buy flame resistant costumes, wigs, masks, etc., for you and your children.
- Only buy accessories like knives and swords that are made of soft, flexible materials.
- Welcome Trick-or-Treaters by turning on your porch light.
- Candlelit jack-o'-lanterns should be kept clear of doorsteps and walk paths.
- Consider using flashlights to light up your jack-o'-lanterns, instead of candles.

- Keep pets away from the door, so children do not become frightened.
- Set a time limit for your children to Trick-or-Treat and designate a specific route.
- Feed children before they go, so they will be less likely to eat the treats before getting home.
- Carefully inspect all treats before allowing young children to start eating them.
- Use extreme caution when driving children around. Watch out for children walking in roadways or darting across the street.
- Backing vehicles account for a number of injuries on Halloween, so back up carefully.

PET SAFETY

- In case of teenage pranks, do not leave pets outside on Halloween.
- Remember, chocolate, tin foil and/or candy wrappers can be very harmful or toxic to some pets.
- Pets may knock over lit candles and pumpkins and start fires or get burned.
- Dressing pets in costumes can cause undue stress on animals.
- Keep pets in a separate room from where Trick-or-Treaters will visit.
- Pets can be unpredictable around people dressed in costumes. Someone could be bitten.
- Pets may run to the door or dart out the door when Trick-or-Treaters come knocking.
- Walk your dog before the Trick-or-Treaters come out to avoid accidental encounters.

AWARENESS MONTH

Each October people and organizations all over the world participate in various events in honor of Breast Cancer Awareness month. Thousands of organizations use this time to increase awareness of breast cancer and to raise funds for research into its cause, prevention, diagnosis, treatment and cure. Major breast cancer charities, including Susan G. Komen and the American Cancer Society, host fundraising events as well as programs aimed at educating people about the importance of breast awareness, education and early screening.

Breast Cancer Awareness month was founded in October 1985 as a partnership between the American Cancer Society and AstraZeneca to promote mammography as the most effective weapon in the fight against breast cancer.

Kicking off the events in the Dallas area is Drummathon on September 30 hosted by local resident and founder of Breast Cancer Can Stick It! April Samuels. Drummathon, held at Klyde Warren Park in downtown Dallas, is an annual family-friendly fundraising event set in a festival atmosphere that brings together the drumming community.

In October 2010 April, a professional drummer, was diagnosed with an aggressive form of breast cancer called triple negative breast cancer. Immediately, April was motivated to "do something." The following month combining her will to fight breast cancer with her passion for drumming, she came up with the motto "Breast Cancer Can Stick It!."


That motto became a brand and then officially a non-profit organization working to raise awareness and funds for research, clinical trials and a cure for breast cancer. Over the past eight years April and her organization have raised more than \$150,000 for the cause.

As Drummathon works to fight breast cancer, it is also a celebration of life, music and passion! Registered drummers for the event showcase their talent in front of family, friends and attendees during a timed drum solo, and then later, drummers and attendees have the opportunity to play on a kit alongside the celebrity drummers. And, since Breast Cancer Can Stick It! founder April Samuels is endorsed by the drum company owned and founded by Rikki Rockett of Poison/Devil City Angels, drummers will be playing on one of the two available Official custom Breast Cancer Can Stick It! drum sets designed by Rockett Drum Works.

The event will include silent auctions and raffles featuring rock 'n roll memorabilia as well as games and vendor booths all while sprinkled with some great music from local rock bands. On October 8, we will celebrate Columbus Day to commemorate the landing of Christopher Columbus in the Americas in 1492. Columbus was an Italian-born explorer who set sail for Asia in August 1492 with the backing of King Ferdinand and Queen Isabella.

Columbus intended to chart a western route to China, India and Asia; instead on October 12 he landed in the Bahamas. Later that month Columbus spotted Cuba and believed it to be mainland China. In December the expedition found Hispaniola, which Columbus thought might be Japan. There he established Spain's first colony in the America's with 39 members of his crew.

Columbus returned to Spain in March 1493; but continued to cross the Atlantic several more times before he died in 1506. It wasn't until his third journey when Columbus realized he hadn't reached Asia but instead had come upon a continent previously unknown to Europeans.

In 1792, a New York political organization—Tammany Hall - hosted

the first ever Columbus Day Celebration to commemorate the 300th anniversary of the historic landing. At the same time, many Italian and Catholic organizations began organizing similar celebrations in other parts of the country.

To mark the 400th anniversary of the landing; President Harrison in 1892, issued a proclamation encouraging American's to celebrate the day with patriotic festivities. And, in 1937, President Roosevelt proclaimed Columbus Day a national holiday.



School District Report Cards

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) released its new accountability ratings for more than 1,000 school districts and charter schools. The new system will rate multi-campus school districts on an A-F scale.

With more than 160 districts in the Dallas/Fort Worth area, 39 earned the top A grade – including McKinney and Lovejoy. In fact; all but four Collin County districts received an A.

Lovejoy had an overall score of 97, which tied with three other districts for the highest score. McKinney's overall score was a 90. The grades are based on three different areas: 1. student achievement – shows how much students know and are able to do at the end of the school year; 2. school progress – shows how students perform over time and how that growth compares to similar schools and 3. closing the gaps – this area tells how well different populations of students in the district are performing.

The TEA graded schools on a curve, giving them more points in the areas they do best. This is based on how students perform on the STAAR tests as well as graduation rates and how many students earn college credit.

Medication can be disposed in its original container or by removing the medication from its container and disposing of it directly into the disposal box. Liquid products, such as cough syrup, should remain sealed in the original container.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere.



This year's Fire Prevention Week will be held October 7-13, 2018.

Every year in October the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) along with local fire departments host Fire Prevention Week (FPW). This year's FPW campaign, "Look. Listen. Learn. Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere," will be held October 7-13. The campaign works to educate people about three basic, but essential, steps to take to reduce the likelihood of having a fire—and how to escape safely in the event of one:

"LOOK" for places fire could start. Take a good look around your home. Identify potential fire hazards and take care of them.

"LISTEN" for the sound of the smoke alarm. You could have only minutes to escape safely once the smoke alarm sounds. Go to your outside meeting place, which should be a safe distance from the home and where everyone should know to meet.

"LEARN" two ways out of every room and make sure all doors and windows leading outside open easily and are free of clutter.

Since 1922, the NFPA has sponsored the public observance of Fire Prevention Week. In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance, making it the longest-running public health observance in the country. During Fire Prevention Week, children, adults, and teachers learn how to stay

safe in case of a fire. Firefighters provide lifesaving public education in an effort to drastically decrease casualties caused by fires.

Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of October 9th in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began on October 8, 1871, and caused devastating damage. This horrific fire killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres of land.

In a fire, mere seconds can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy. Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults, and the elderly are also at risk in fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a fire.

According to NFPA children under 5 and adults over 65 are at the highest risk for injury or death in a fire; however; people of all ages are vulnerable. In fact, the risk of a nonfatal fire injury is highest for those between 20 and 49, showing that fire safety education is essential for everyone.

The purpose of Fire Prevention Week is to bring awareness to the risk of death in case of a fire and provide educational resources for everyone. This year the Fairview Fire Department will visit local elementary schools to teach children the keys points of this year's theme – Look, Listen, Learn.





Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection and may be picked up anytime during the collection week.

Holidays: Trash, recycling, bulk and brush will not be picked up on the holidays listed below; instead the collection will slide one day after the holiday.

Remember These Simple Guidelines For Putting Your Trash Out

- 1. Place carts with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street.
- 2. Keep carts away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags, All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items out side your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Brush and bulk trash must not be more than 12 cubic yards which is equal to 4 truck loads.
