

# Overcoming Growing Pains when it comes to Town Services

Residential trash collection services are provided by Allied Waste throughout the Town of Fairview. Trash collection and recycling services are provided once per week on Tuesday in Heritage Ranch and every Wednesday for other residents depending on which street you live, not taking into account changes due to a holiday. A once per month bulk/brush collection is offered, and the current schedule for that service is the first Tuesday, Wednesday or Thursday of each month (geographically specific).

The population in Fairview has increased 19% since 2006 when the town entered into an agreement with Allied Waste for trash collection services. In 2012, Allied Waste collected 1,295 tons of brush/bulk waste, while collecting 1,322 tons of brush/bulk waste in 2013. This year, Allied Waste is on target to collect 1,568 tons of brush/bulk waste, which will not include the 225 tons of brush collected due to the December 2013 ice storm. Due to the growth of the town since the approval of the original schedule and the increased demand for bulk services, specifically brush services, Allied Waste has found it difficult to meet the demands of the bulk/brush collection days as mentioned above. This has resulted in complaints and delayed pickups this year. The town's current schedule would indicate that any given location in town can expect bulk and brush collections on a particular day in the month. During certain



times of the year when brush material is significant, that is not going to be possible; therefore, the Town of Fairview and Allied Waste are proposing changes in the bulk/brush collection schedule that would allow for the fluctuation in the bulk volumes and establish a program that should work as the town continues to build out. The town is not proposing any changes to the normal trash and recycling schedules, only to the bulk/brush collection dates.

The new approach would be to divide Fairview into four areas (based on sub-divisions) and cover each area during a different week in the month. This would allow for the fluctuations in the volumes and residents would know that the pickups would occur during that designated

week, not a particular day. The new schedule would be implemented in October 2014 allowing August and September to communicate the new concept and schedule to the residents in Fairview. Allied Waste and the town would begin enforcing the limited 12 cubic yards for brush collection; therefore, in order to manage this collection more efficiently and allow adequate time for Allied Waste to service the new schedule, residents would need to adhere to the 12 cubic yard restrictions and cut up brush into manageable pieces (such as length no taller than the average person and no wider than the average person). This may require brush to be trimmed before placing it out at the curb for collection.





Recycling allows for used materials such as glass, paper, and plastic to be converted into new products and can help reduce overall energy usage, air and water pollution, and lower greenhouse gas emissions. One of the biggest perks of recycling is the reduction of landfill space needed to house our trash, which helps to keep trash off our beautiful Texas landscape. After all, it is recyclable materials that oftentimes end up taking the longest amounts of time to break down in landfills. The following data collected by the U.S. National Park Service and the Mote Marine Lab in Sarasota, Florida displays how long it can take some of these materials to break down once they arrive in landfills:

- Newspaper- 6 weeks
- Plastic bag- 10-20 years
- Tin can- 50 years
- Aluminum can- 100 years
- Glass bottle- Undetermined, though research suggests 500+ years

Ensuring that recyclables are reused instead of increasing the need for more landfill space can easily be accomplished through knowledge and taking important steps to improve upon daily practices, and by utilizing Fairview's weekly recycling bin pickup service for residents by Allied Waste. Recycling is collected every Tuesday for those living in Heritage Ranch, and every Wednesday for other residents depending on which street you live, not taking into account changes due to a holiday. For a complete list of these streets and a detailed recycling calendar, please visit the town website at www.fairview-texas.org and access the "Water and Trash" page located under the "Departments" tab on the homepage.

The town does not require that you presort your recyclables. And please remember, many of the items that you use on a regular basis can be recycled instead of being put out as trash. Below is a list of common household waste products that can be recycled.

- Plastics (milk jugs, soda bottles, shampoo bottles, etc.; please remove all caps)
- Glass (glass bottles only; all color types; please rinse containers and discard lids)
- Metal (all metal food and beverage cans; please remove any lids and/or food and drink inside)
- Paper (newspaper, catalogs, magazines, mixed household paper)
- Cardboard (all cardboard must be broken down to a size that will fit inside your recycle bin; larger boxes must be flattened and can be placed under your recycle bin)

So next time you get ready to take out the trash, keep in mind that with just a little bit of effort much of it might be easily reused! As the North Texas region continues to grow, recycling will become more and more important to help sustain Fairview's natural beauty.





# The Wetsel Community


The community known as Wetsel, began as early as 1848, according to Gwen Pettit's genealogy research. Henry Wetsel was of German Dutch descent and a very skilled millright. He came to Collin County in 1848 when he was 56 years old with his family, which included three sons Peter, Lewis and David who were skilled in carpentry and woodworking.

Henry Wetsel began an ox-mill on the northwest corner of current Stacy Rd. and Hwy 5. Henry Wetsel and his three sons owned four headrights along the west side of Hwy 5 in Allen, just south of Stacy Rd. His son-inlaw, Joseph A. Taylor, married to his daughter Lucinda, owned a headright on the northeast corner of Stacy Rd. and Hwy 5 in what is now Fairview. A headright was 640 acres that was given to any married man who was here in Texas before 1836 or helped to fight in the Texas Revolution for independence from Mexico. A single man received 320 acres.

The Lewis Wetsel home, probably built about 1869, was located west of Hwy 5 in Allen. It has been moved to the Allen Heritage Village on St. Mary's Drive. The Wetsels were famous throughout Texas for their furniture making. Peter Wetsel and his son, Andrew, moved to Plano in the early 1870s and owned a furniture and undertaking business, building coffins. Lewis Wetsel also had a cabinet-making business in McKinney on the square.

The James Wetsel family reunion in Allen in 1904 included his 13 children and 164 family members. The Wetsel family is related by marriage to the other large early pioneer families of Snider, Lucas, Fitzhugh, Kerby and Coffey.

Henry Wetsel donated a tract of land for use as a subscription school on the southeast corner of Hwy 5 and Stacy Rd. which operated from 1855 until 1940. A teacherage was lo-



cated behind the school. There was a gas station, the Wetsel Service Station and Store, on the northwest corner and a row of tourist court cabins owned by Ida Hamilton and her husband (see photo). The Hamilton's built these cabins to prepare for the influx of visitors to the Texas Centennial at Fair Park in Dallas in 1936. A junk yard was known to have been on the east side of the road owned by the Hamiltons. Miss Ted Sommers said that a canner and a sealer were in a building next to the school on the northwest corner for the ladies to do their canning during the depression years.

As told to David Petefish, Austin Murray who lived north of the station remembers a story about Bonnie and Clyde stopping there for gas on their way to Oklahoma. Hwy 5 at that time was Hwy 75, the main road from Oklahoma to Dallas. The Apple girls, Penny and Ginny, also remember hearing that Bonnie and Clyde hid out for a day in the cement culvert on their property until the "law" had left the area.

Lucy Jane Phillips Epps was interviewed by George Pearis Brown in 1931 and stated, "In 1851 my father, Gabrielle Phillips, came to Texas and settled about 5 miles south of McKinney in a two room plank house and a log cabin for a kitchen." She tells of going to school in the old ox mill at Wetsel. She said there were "the prettiest flowers in the world, and we did not need flower beds then, they were everywhere. Plenty of longhorn wild cattle, and we had to watch for them sometimes, for they would run you, especially if you were walking." She said they had "a little brass oil lamp and used it some, but had always used candles." So, you see, Fairview

was careful not to produce too much light pollution from even the earliest times! Who knew?

The community of Wetsel was combined with the community of Fairview on May 7, 1958. The name Fairview was chosen because of all the work that Col. George Apple had done in incorporating the town. He was a long time resident of this area and owned the Fairview Dairy. Also, the name of Wetsel Rd. was changed to Stacy Rd. at about the same time when the new Hwy 75 was built and took a large portion of Dr. Stacy's farm. So the community of Wetsel was absorbed into the present town of Fairview.



### Best Suburbs 2014 by D Magazine




Check out the latest edition of D Magazine where they rank the best 63 North Texas suburbs.



With the growth in population, and vast amount of development, occurring in the DFW Metroplex, there has also been a growth in the amount of impervious surfaces, which are surfaces such as asphalt or concrete, that do not absorb water. When it rains, runoff water from driveways, parking lots, roads and highways, flows into storm drains. In Fairview, runoff water entering our storm drains is released into our streams and eventually into Lake Lavon.

By correctly disposing of our trash, using and storing chemicals properly, and educating your friends and family about stormwater management, we can make sure that the only thing going into stormwater drains is water.

As we ramp up our training for the 2014 Showdown Half Marathon and 5K which will be held on Saturday, October 11th as a part of Texas-OU Weekend, it's appropriate to address a topic that impacts all runners injury prevention. Whether you are a new runner or an experienced marathoner, you will likely be impacted by general aches and pains or overuse at various points in your running career. The following tips will help you become a more effective runner and will make the Showdown a more enjoyable experience for you.

Cross Train - the quickest way to become an injured runner is to run too much! While we are training for the run, it doesn't mean that our training should only consist of running. By taking part in other activities such as cycling, swimming, and weightlifting, you are giving your body the opportunity to recover from your running workouts, while

also strengthening areas that are neglected in running.

Workout Frequency and Intensity - while you may be training for the half marathon, it will not require you to run 80 miles per week. A sensible workout schedule that calls for no more than three running workouts per week can be used to prepare a runner to excel in this event. Vary the intensity of the workout - sprints, tempo run, intervals, etc. - and the duration of the workout - mileage, time, etc. - based on how your body feels.

**Treatment** - Treat your body before the injuries develop! After your training runs, ice your legs and workout any remaining tension with a foam roller. Prior to beginning your training plan, ensure that your shoes fit properly, and are appropriate for your running style/gait.

Online registration is now open for the third annual 2014 Showdown Half Marathon and 5K. The race will begin and end at Fairview Town Hall and the course will wind through Fairview. After the race, participants are encouraged to stay in Fairview and watch the game in a Fairview venue or shop in a Fairview store.

One of the things that make the Fairview race unique, is the free childcare offered to runners by The Goddard School. This enables couples as well as single parents to be active while knowing that their young children are well cared for. No other race in the Metroplex offers such a service, making Fairview a very unique running venue.
