

This past year the old Highway 5 underpass has been closed due to the construction of a new safer street under the bridge over Sloan Creek and Highway 5. This underpass is unusual in that it is also had an S-curve making it a blind curve, so that many accidents happened there. It was also not tall enough for many of the trucks to get under, so they had to try to back up and find a place to turn around which caused many traffic jams. Some trucks even hit the top of the railroad bridge and damaged their trucks. According to witnesses, if they let the air out of their tires, some of the trucks could ease out of the tight situation.

This statement is taken from the Dallas Morning News in 1917 - A state highway beginning at a point six miles north of Denison, going through Dallas and extending to Galveston, will be maintained and known as the Henry Exall Highway, in honor of the late Henry Exall of Dallas, former president of the Texas Industrial Congress. The road was completed in 1921. This was the original Highway 75 that we call Central Expressway now.

It would be a continuous two-lane paved highway and went by the number of Highway 75 leading from courthouse to courthouse. (Highway 75 was known in Dallas as Central Expressway due to its running alongside the Houston & Texas Central Railroad.) In about 1959, a new Highway 75 was built running

slightly on the outskirts west of McKinney, so as to miss the street lights of the business district and the courthouse square. The railroad underpass further south on Hwy 75 was built as a convenience so that cars did not have to stop to wait for the trains to pass. But, the low height seems to have given trucks a difficult time from the very beginning.

Many and maybe most local residents remember having to wait in a long line of traffic because a truck that was too tall had to try to turn around since he could not fit under the underpass, or the truck had tried and gotton stuck in the underpass. There were many messy accidents. One time, a large truck carrying eggs had crashed at the underpass and "slippery egg goo ran down the highway into Sloan Creek." Another time, a truck loaded with 20,000 pounds of frozen shrimp got stuck. David Petefish, a local resident, remembers seeing a truck filled with oranges have an accident at the RR U underpass, and orange juice was dripping into the road.

Several photos of accidents at that underpass were photographed by Edgar Bush with his "Brownie Instamatic" when he lived just north of the underpass. One is of a cotton truck that turned over and caught fire. These accidents happened directly in front of their home. One time, an "aeroplane" being hauled on a truck had its wings get stuck. Apparently this underpass was unsafe from the very beginning. There is a humorous story about why the space shuttle as wide as it is - it needed to be able to travel by train and to fit under the railroad bridges. The early train tracks had the width of the early Roman roads that were the width of two horses pulling a chariot or wagon. That is how the width of a horse's backside determined the width of the space shuttle.

Mr. Bush also spoke of planting iris bulbs on the steep earthen slope of the underpass, in order to beautify the area for the 1936 Texas Centennial Exposition being held in Dallas at Fairpark. Eventually, people stopped their cars and stole them all.

Ruth Whisenant and Nancy Bush Morian remember that sometimes boys would go to the top of the railroad bridge and throw cantaloupes and rocks down on the cars passing underneath. They also remember how much fun it was to be beneath the underpass when the train was going right over the top and the noise and rumbling was very, very loud. They laughed and laughed while remembering this.

Penny and Ginny Apple remember sitting on the top of the bridge and dangling their feet down to the traffic below and then having to pull their feet up when quickly when a tall truck drove under.

Good times were also to be had on this new road. It was the "Roaring 20s" and people were enjoying their new automobiles. Sunday drives became a fashionable pastime for the people who could afford the new "horseless carriages." Bodie Watkins of Sulphur Springs remembers that stretch of Highway 75 as "the only road we had to go to Dallas." He recalls that in his teenage years, "After goin' to Dallas to get drunk, us boys would race them old Fords up and down that road. Remember them old Fords?" And he recalled that he had an accident one time when he took the underpass too fast.

Diane Miller of Melissa recalls a story that her mother told her. Her mother was 19 years old and returning with three girlfriends from the State Fair of Texas in Dallas. She was tired and the girls were supposed to keep her from falling asleep while driving home. They didn't and she fell asleep and took the curve too fast, flipping the car upside down! No one was hurt except for a little bit of blood on her mother's skirt. The next car that came along helped them to flip the car back upright and they continued on their way home. I am sure a lot worse accidents occurred at this treacherous section of road.

It is certainly time for this stretch of road to be straightened and made safer for our residents and travelers.

There were 502 households that participated and processed one vehicle every 36 seconds!





## The State Highway 5 road project is now complete.

State Highway 5 received several improvements including new asphalt from Indian Springs to Country Club Road (FM1378). The old sharp curves are gone and shoulders were even added for safety at the Railroad Bridge. Decorative retaining walls were also used to provide an aesthetic appeal to the area. A new left turn lane was added at the town's request at State Highway 5 and Country Club Road (FM1378). Guardrail improvements, new driveway culverts and new striping were also completed. The project went over on the time allotted, but the final product and safety improvements are a welcome sight.

Stacy Road utility relocations for the TxDOT widening project from State Highway 5 to Country Club Road (FM1378) are still underway. The road is still scheduled to go out for bids this December. The majority of the funding comes from the state, with some local participation from Collin County, the City of Allen and the Town of Fairview. TxDOT will widen Stacy Road to four lanes and provide for a hike and bike width sidewalk on the Fairview side.

The residential street improvements project is also nearing completion. Most of the asphalt streets are receiving a new layer of asphalt with some getting a new base underneath. When this project has finished, approximately nine miles will have been completed with five miles of streets that were done last year. Thanks to all our residents for their patience and enduring the construction that occurred within your neighborhoods.

Lower than normal North Texas Municipal Water District (NT-MWD) reservoir levels, and the ongoing need for watering restrictions to ensure that everyone is doing their part in conserving our water supplies, has resulted in the continued need for reductions in water usage at the individual level.

Landscape watering typically ac-

counts for the majority of household water use during summer months. Higher water use increases water bills and increases the demand on our water supply. 1 An automatic sprinkler system provides a convenience, but people have a responsibility to operate their systems efficiently and effectively. If you set your sprinkler system to run automatically and it is not programmed properly, you could use up to 35 percent more water than your neighbors without a sprinkler system. 2 "It is often recommended to manually operate watering your lawn versus irrigation" However, if you decide to run your sprinkler system on the automatic setting, some helpful tips are to know how to operate your sprinkler system controller. If you know it's going to rain, turn the controller off for the day. Manual operation of your system is the most water efficient, but if you set your system to operate automatically, be sure your controller is programmed properly.

It only takes a few easy steps to begin receiving a weekly email that lets you know how much water your landscape actually requires based on local weather conditions. The email also shows the length of time to set on your irrigation system cycle. 1 Simply visit www. watermyyard.org, select a weather station near your location, find exactly how long to set your irrigation system for and begin to water your landscape more efficiently.

By using these quick simple tips, citizens can play a huge role in assisting with conserving water.





Most people don't know that Il Cane Rosso was born in my backyard only about three miles from the Fairview site – I built our first pizza oven up there, cooked my first pizza there, and parked our mobile catering oven in my driveway up there for years. We have lived in the area for 10 years and still have many ties to the community. We constantly get requests from our customers that live in Collin County to open something up north. Now they don't need to fight traffic down Central Expressway to Deep Ellum," comments Jerrier.

The MG Herring Group and the Fairview Economic Development Corporation worked with Il Cane Rosso to bring the destination restaurant to The Village at Fairview. Fairview Mayor Darion Culbertson said "Jay Jerrier is one of the most well-known and well-respected names within the Dallas and Ft. Worth restaurant scene. He has built several incredible brands and we are very pleased that he has chosen Fairview as his next destination." # Fairview's Two Longest Termed Board Members Bid Farewell

involvement and guidance through numerous Council sub committees including the Action Committee, Budget Committee, and Appointments Committee that have made a significant and lasting impact to the town.

Councilmember Mary Price, Seat Six has served on the Planning and Zoning Commission for seven years. Affectionately known as the "Fire Chief's wife" by Mayor Culbertson, as she is also the wife of Fairview's Fire Chief, Dick Price. Councilmember Price was chosen to serve on the Home Rule Charter Committee and by 2006 was elected to the Town Council upon which she has served for eight years. Mayor Culbertson noted that "both, Councilman Cunningham and Councilmember Price have been on several different boards with the Town of Fairview and the town appreciates their dedication". Mayor Culbertson stated "the two will both be remembered for their dedication and service" as he presented the two with a beautiful plaque and clock as a token of the Town's appreciation. The sound of the applause from the audience during May Town Hall Meeting truly reflects the years that both have given of their time and talents.



#### Get Connected for Emergency Alert

The Nixle notification system was made available to Fairview residents in November 2013. Town staff is excited to see continued growth in subscribers. Nixle is a digital platform which allows residents to receive text messages and/or email alerts related to Fairview news, events and updates. Emergency alerts and advisory notifications can be sent instantly, allowing for immediate and accurate information straight from town staff.

There is no charge from the town for this service, but message and data rates may apply if you choose to receive alerts through your cell phone and/or smart device(s).

The Nixle notification system allows residents to receive the following types of alerts and notifications:

- Emergency Alerts (i.e. tornado warning, missing person)
- Advisory Notifications (i.e. road closures, police activity, severe weather)

• Community Notifications (i.e. town hall updates, event information)

Residents may sign up by texting the word Fairview to 888777 or by using the Nixle widget on the homepage of the town website at www.fairviewtexas.org. Residents may also sign up by visiting www.nixle.com and entering the Town of Fairview 75069 zip code.

Regardless of the method used to sign up, town staff recommends that you register an account at Nixle's website to choose what types of messages you want to receive and how you want to receive them. There is no cost for registering a Nixle account. Registering an account through Nixle's website will also allow those signing up via text message to add an email address for receiving alerts and notifications. You can also choose to



receive messages from municipalities/agencies other than Fairview.

If you sign up by texting the word Fairview to 888777, you will receive messages through your cell phone and/or smart device(s). If you sign up using the widget on the town's website or through the Nixle website, you have the ability to enter both your cell number and email address for receiving alerts and notifications.
