The fourth annual Showdown Half Marathon and 5K will be held Saturday October 10, beginning and ending at Fairview Town Hall. The festivities begin at 7 a.m. with a kids' dash. The half marathon will start at 7:30 a.m., and the 5K will start at 7:45 a.m.

The race will wind through Fairview and back to town hall. While there will be no major street closures, there will be some traffic delays, so please plan for a little extra time if you are going out on that Saturday. A course map will appear in the September newsletter to help you better plan your trips. The course will be clearing by about noon.

We will also need about 10 volunteers from approximately 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. to take down tents and cinder blocks and store them in town hall. If you have a strong back and the time to spare, please contact Ray Dunlap, whose contact information is listed below.

We encourage our residents in the neighborhoods where runners will be going to come out and cheer for the runners. Fairview gets good reviews in the running community, and these races are designed to have people stay in Fairview after the race and eat and shop.

At the July Town Council meeting, the Town Council addressed the following items:

- Made an appointment filling a vacancy on the Public Art Committee and appointed a Chairman to the Technology Advisory Committee.
- Selected Councilmember Henry Lessner to serve as Mayor Pro Tem.
- Received an annual report from Republic Services regarding services.
- Received a report and recommendation from the Environmental Management Advisory Committee regarding the EPA WaterSense Program.
- Approved minutes of the June 2, 2015 council meeting.
- Approved an Amending Plat for Lots 17R and 19R of Montecito Estates #2.
- Approved an Amending Plat for Lot 5E-P1, Block A of The Village at Fairview.
- Approved a request by Mr. Kelly Parker, for approval of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) in order to allow for the construction of an accessory building on a property that is zoned Three-Acre Ranch Estate (RE-3) and Open Space and Flood Hazard (FH), and is generally located at the eastern limit of Meandro Ria Lane.
- Approved a request by Mrs. Cathy Knapp, for approval of a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) in order to allow for the construction of an accessory building on a property that is zoned Two-Acre Ranch Estate (RE-2) and is specifically located at 1210 Stacy Rd, being Lot 1 of the Fairview Farms #1 Addition to the Town of Fairview.
- Approved an ordinance annexing a 16.484± acres tract of land situated in the Samuel Sloan Survey Abstract No. 791, and that is generally located north of Country Club Road and west of Rowley Mile.
- Approved a request by the Town of Fairview to zone a 16.484± acres tract of land that is currently unzoned and is situated in the Samuel Sloan Survey – Abstract No. 791, and that is generally located north of Country Club Road and west of Rowley Mile. The requested zone was the Planned Center (PC) Zoning District, specifically, to provide for a residential neighborhood comprised of eleven single-family residential lots and one common area lot.

Public Works

Your Town of Fairview Public Works Department is tasked with the repair, maintenance and operation of the town's streets, parks, water distribution system, wastewater collection system, drainage systems and code enforcement. The department is staffed with highly trained professional personnel, each possessing water and/or wastewater certification combined with a vast array of practical construction knowledge and training.

The department works closely with the town's engineering, planning, and utility billing staff to accomplish the town's goals and provide our residents with the highest quality services possible. You might think of Public Works as the "grunts in the field" who accomplish the day to day repairs and maintenance to keep the town's infrastructure running. In 2014, Public Works operators pumped over 626 million gallons of water to Fairview homes and businesses. To accomplish this, the department operates two major pumping stations with five pumps, four ground storage tanks and two overhead storage tanks. All pumps and stations are inspected daily to ensure proper operation. Using SCADA (system control and data acquisition), the entire system is monitored 24 hours a day, 365 days a year remotely. All tanks are inspected annually by licensed divers and cleaned.

Public Works operators check the water we deliver daily for proper chlorine disinfectant levels. Bacteriological samples are taken monthly at various parts of the town to assure proper disinfection has been achieved. Other sampling and testing takes place periodically during the year to detect other constituents, such as Haloacetic Acids and Trihalomethanes.

In 2014, the department completed about 2300 work orders. These were related to water issues, such as water leaks, meter change outs, meter re-reads, main breaks, meter installations, etc. We also completed over 2700 line locates for various utilities doing construction throughout Fairview. We installed new lines designed by the engineering department and GPS located, and we operated over 700 main line valves.

The same employees who run the water distribution system also maintain the wastewater collection system. They operated two lift stations with four pumps, cleaned over 26 miles of sewer main lines, and made numerous repairs to the system. Public Works also maintains several parks, including Monarch Park, Creekside Park, Beaver Run Park, Cypress Park and Road Runner Trail. We also maintain various right of way areas throughout the town. The department mows approximately 50 acres per week and maintains the various irrigation systems and playground equipment for each park.

Street maintenance is a high priority for the department and consists of maintaining traffic control signs, striping, repairs to base failure, asphalt patching, concrete replacement, tree removal and trimming, crack sealing, de-icing and guard rail installation and replacement for all 50 plus miles of town-owned streets. Drainage associated with the roadways are also maintained by the department. In 2014, the department removed over 400 cubic yards of asphalt and concrete along with another 200 cubic yards of brush and trees.

In the spring of 2015, at the request of the town's engineer, the department recycled approximately 150 cubic yards of concrete removed from Oakwood streets to repair and improve a drainage channel in the Hawkswood subdivision. This was just one of the department's many drainage repair projects. With the record rainfall early this year, the repair list will continue to grow.

The department also holds an annual household hazardous waste disposal and electronics cleanup event in the spring of each year and a document destruction event in the fall.

As summer days grow shorter, our Fairview community will soon be observing that timeless annual ritual: the first day of school. It's a time when parents breathe a sigh of relief, and students and teachers anticipate new beginnings and new challenges.

Unfortunately, the beginning of school is also a time when children are at increased risk of injuries from pedestrian, bicycle, school bus, and automobile crashes because there are many more children on the road each morning and afternoon and because of the changes in driving patterns. Shorter daylight hours make it especially difficult to see young pedestrians and bicyclists. So as our schools open their doors, it's time for everyone - motorists, parents, educators, and students – to improve their traffic safety practices. The following tips for traveling to and from school can help make this a safe and happy school year for the whole Fairview community. Review the basic rules with your youngster(s):

Walking

- In neighborhoods with higher levels of traffic, consider starting a "walking escort" in which an adult accompanies a group of neighborhood children walking to school.
- Make sure your child's walk to school is a safe route with well-trained adult crossing guards at every intersection.
- Be realistic about your child's pedestrian skills. Because small children are impulsive and less cautious around traffic, carefully consider whether or not your child is ready to walk to school without adult supervision.
- If your child is young or is walking to a new school, walk with them the first week to make sure they know the route and can do it safely.
- Bright colored clothing will make your child more visible to drivers.

Biking

- Always wear a bicycle helmet, no matter how short or long the ride.
- Ride on the right in the same direction as

auto traffic.

- Use appropriate hand signals.
- Respect traffic lights and stop signs.
- Wear bright color clothing to increase visibility.
- Know the "rules of the road."

School Bus

- If your child's school bus has lap/shoulder seat belts, make sure your child uses one at all times when in the bus. If your child's school bus does not have lap/shoulder belts, encourage the school to buy or lease buses with lap/shoulder belts.
- Wait for the bus to stop before approaching it from the curb.
- Do not move around on the bus.
- Check to see that no other traffic is coming before crossing the street.
- Make sure to always remain in clear view of the bus driver.
- Children should always board and exit the bus at designated locations that provide safe access to the bus or to the school building.

Tips for Motorists

- All passengers should wear a seat belt and/ or an age- and size-appropriate car safety seat or booster seat.
- Do not text or talk on your cell phone while driving.
- Slow down and obey all traffic laws and speed limits.
- Be alert for school zones that have a reduced speed limit at designated times of the day.
- Watch for school buses. Red flashing lights and an extended stop arm indicate the school bus is stopping to load or unload children. State law requires you to stop.
- Keep an eye out for children walking in the street, especially where there are no side-walks.
- Be alert for children playing and gathering near bus stops and for those who may dart into the street without looking for traffic.
- When backing out of a driveway or leaving a garage, watch for children walking or biking to school.

When driving in neighborhoods or school zones, watch for young people who may be in a hurry to get to or away from school and may not be thinking about getting there safely.

Tips for Parents

- Be a good role model. Always buckle up in the car, always wear a helmet when biking, and always follow pedestrian safety rules. Don't text or talk on your cell phone while driving.
- Supervise young children as they are walking or biking to school or as they wait at the school bus stop.
- Provide your children with bright clothing, so motorists can easily see them.
- If your child is younger than 8 years old, unless taller than 4'9", he/she is required to be in the appropriate child safety seat system whenever they ride in a passenger vehicle. The safety seat system MUST be installed according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Make sure that your teen driver understands and obeys all traffic laws. Discourage them from texting or talking on a cell phone while driving.

Tips for Students

- Always buckle up when riding in a car. Be sure to remove your backpack before getting in the vehicle. Never buckle your safety belt with your backpack on.
- Always ride in the back seat. It's the safest place for young people.
- Always wear a helmet and follow traffic safety rules when riding your bike.
- If you ride a school bus, learn and practice the safety rules for waiting at the bus stop, getting on and off the bus, and riding the bus.
- Never wait for the school bus in the roadway.
- If you walk to school, learn and practice the safety rules for pedestrians. It's extremely important for you to use sidewalks when available, look left-right-left when crossing the road, and always walk facing traffic.
- Always cross at cross walks. Obey all traffic signs, traffic lights and crossing guard instructions.
- Teen drivers should avoid speeding and distractions while driving, such as texting, talking on cell phones, eating and adjusting the radio. Teens are also reminded never to overload their vehicle. Everyone riding in a vehicle must use a safety belt.
- Be a good role model for your younger brothers, sisters and friends, and help them learn and follow vehicle safety rules.

Stormwater Quality

With the growth in population and vast amount of development occurring in the DFW Metroplex, there has also been a growth in the amount of surfaces, such as asphalt and concrete, that do not absorb water. Runoff from driveways, parking lots, roads and highways flows into storm drains when it rains. In Fairview, runoff watering entering our storm drains is released into Sloan Creek or Wilson Creek, both of which eventually release into Lake Lavon.

Pollutants like empty cans, plastic bags, chemicals or even construction materials can be washed into our drains if not disposed of properly. By correctly disposing of our trash, using and storing chemicals properly and educating your friends and family about the importance of stormwater quality, we can make sure the only thing going into our creeks and streams is water.



Here are some ways you can help:

- Clean up trash like soda cans, bottles, plastic bags and other debris
- Never dump anything into storm drains, roadside ditches or streams
- Pick up after your pets
- Participate in the town's trash off events
- Tell your friends and family about stormwater quality!



The utility relocation phase is still ongoing for the widening of Stacy Road by TxDOT. Oncor continues to set new power poles on the Fairview side of the road. Crews have started stringing new electrical power lines over to the new poles. The other utility lines, like cable and telephone, on the poles will follow the power lines. NTMWD has put the newly relocated 42" water main into service on the Fairview side and they are doing final cleanup and seeding. Atmos is moving their gas line just inside the new power poles, as well.

TxDOT should be releasing the contractor to start the actual road construction in the July/August time frame beginning between State Highway 5 and Meandering Way/Angel Pkwy. They will begin with underground culvert work and general grading for the new lanes, while leaving the existing two lanes of asphalt in service for now. Tx-DOT will not remove the two lanes of asphalt that you are currently driving on until two new concrete lanes are constructed and available to move traffic over.

As we ramp up our training for the 2015 Showdown Half Marathon and 5K which will be held on Saturday, October 10th as a part of Texas-OU Weekend, it's appropriate to address a topic that impacts all runners - injury prevention.

Whether you are a new runner or an experienced marathoner, you will likely be impacted by general aches and pains or overuse at various points in your running career.

The following tips will help you become a more effective runner and will make the Showdown a more enjoyable experience.

Cross Train - The quickest way to become an injured runner is to run too much! While we are training for the run, it doesn't mean that our training should only consist of running. By taking part in other activities such as cycling, swimming, and weightlifting, you are giving your body the opportunity to recover from your running workouts, while also strengthening areas that are neglected in running.

Workout Frequency and Intensity - While you may be training for the half marathon, it will not require you to run 80 miles per week. A sensible workout schedule that calls for no more than three running workouts per week can be used to prepare a runner to excel in



this event. Vary the intensity of the workout - sprints, tempo run, intervals, etc. - and the duration of the workout - mileage, time, etc. - based on how your body feels.

Treatment - Treat your body before the injuries develop! After your training runs, ice your legs and workout any remaining tension with a foam roller. Prior to beginning your training plan, ensure that your shoes fit properly and are appropriate for your running style/gait.

Online registration is now open for the fourth annual 2015 Showdown Half Marathon and 5K. The race will begin and end at Fairview Town Hall and the course will wind through Fairview. After the race, participants are encouraged to stay in Fairview and watch the game in a Fairview venue or shop in a Fairview store.

One of the things that make the Fairview race unique is the free childcare offered to runners by The Goddard School. This enables couples as well as single parents to be active while knowing that their young children are well cared for. No other race in the Metroplex offers such a service, making Fairview a very unique running venue.

FAIRVIEW RECYCLING TIPS

Recycling allows for used materials such as glass, paper, and plastic to be converted into new products and can help reduce overall energy usage, air and water pollution, and lower greenhouse gas emissions. One of the biggest perks of recycling is the reduction of landfill space needed to house our trash, which helps to keep trash off our beautiful Texas landscape. After all, it is recyclable materials that oftentimes end up taking the longest amounts of time to break down in landfills. The following data collected by the U.S. National Park Service and the Mote Marine Lab in Sarasota, Florida displays how long it can take some of these materials to break down once they arrive in landfills:

- Newspaper- 6 weeks
- Plastic bag- 10-20 years
- Tin can- 50 years
- Aluminum can- 100 years
- Glass bottle- Undetermined, though research suggests 500+ years

Ensuring that recyclables are reused, instead of increasing the need for more landfill space, can easily be accomplished through knowledge and taking important steps to improve upon daily practices and by utilizing Fairview's weekly recycling bin pickup service for residents by Republic Services. Recycling is collected every Tuesday for those living in Heritage Ranch, and every Wednesday for other residents depending on which street you live, not taking into account changes due to a holiday. See page (14) for a complete list of these streets and a detailed recycling calendar.

The town does not require that you presort your recyclables.

Please remember, many of the items you use on a regular basis can be recycled instead of being put out as trash. Below is a list of common household waste products that can be recycled.

- Plastics (milk jugs, soda bottles, shampoo bottles, etc.; please remove all caps)
- Glass (glass bottles only; all color types; please rinse containers and discard lids)



- Metal (all metal food and beverage cans; please remove any lids and/or food and liquid inside)
- Paper (newspapers, catalogs, magazines, mixed household paper)
- Cardboard (all cardboard must be broken down to a size that will fit inside your recycle bin; larger boxes must be flattened and can be placed under your recycle bin)

Next time you get ready to take out the trash, keep in mind that with just a little bit of effort much of it might be easily reused! As the North Texas region continues to grow, recycling will become more and more important to help sustain Fairview's natural beauty.


Allen Community Outreach's FILL THE BUS Program
