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# COUNCIL'S CORNER

## **At the January 5, 2016 Regular Town Council meeting, the Town Council addressed the following items:**

- Approved the minutes of the December 1, 2015 Regular Town Council meeting.
- Approved a resolution approving the Town's written investment policy regarding funds for the Town of Fairview; and providing an effective date.
- Approved an ordinance authorizing a budget amendment pertaining to the fiscal year 2015-16 budget and providing an effective date.
- Held a public hearing and tabled action until the March 1, 2015 Regular Town Council meeting on a request by M. Christopher Custom Homes, to rezone a portion of a 44.069 acre tract generally located adjacent to and east of Country Club Road and north of Farmstead Street from Open Space and Flood Hazard Zone to Two-Acre Ranch Estate (RE-2) Zone. (ZA2015-14).
- Held a public hearing and approved an ordinance granting a request by Chase Oaks Church for approval of an amendment to Ordinance No. 2014-35, a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) for a religious institution on a 10.672± acre tract of land located north of Stacy Road and 1,400' west of Meandering Way. (ZA2015-15).
- Approved a request by Kha Nguyen for approval of a Final Plat for the Nguyen Addition, a proposed residential subdivision comprised of 2 single-family residential lots on a 2.765 acre tract of land generally located at 940 Old Stacy Road. (FP2015-08).
- Approved a resolution approving a project and agreement between the Town's Community Development Corporation and Plano Children's Theatre. Approved a funding grant by the Fairview Community Development Corporation Board of Directors to the Fairview Youth Theatre from Type B funds.
- Discussed the status of TAPS transit service.
- Scheduled Monday, February 8 at 6 p.m. as the date for a work session related to capital improvement planning.
- Received an update regarding the status of the water rate study.
- Received the Monthly Financial Report for the period ending October 31, 2015.
- Received the Monthly Financial Report for the period ending November 30, 2015.
- Received an update on the Stacy Road construction project.

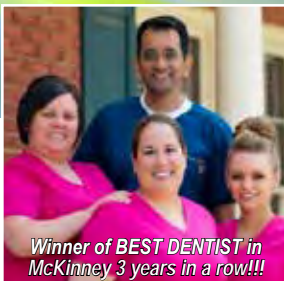

## Preserving Your Health

1. Change your toothbrush every three months. Did you know manual toothbrushes become worn out and are not as effective after three months? Also, be sure to rinse your toothbrush with hot water after every use and change it after you have an episode of flu, cold or other viral infections, otherwise you may risk re-infection.
2. Don't drink soda. People who tend to drink three or more glasses of soda daily have 62 percent more tooth decay, fillings and tooth loss than those who do not drink it at all. In fact, there was a sudden massive surge of patients with tooth decay the year Coke was launched!
3. Brushing harder isn't better. Vigorous brushing does more harm than good and can lead to eroded enamel, which never grows back and can cause sensitivity and other oral issues.
4. Be breath-conscious at work. Americans cite bad breath as the least attractive trait a co-worker can have, so be more popular around the water cooler by brushing – and flossing – often.
5. Avoid missing work by visiting the dentist. The next time you want to play hooky, head to the dentist for a cleaning instead. Last year alone, adults missed over 164 million hours of work – and children missed over 51 million hours of school for dental-related issues.

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## STACY ROAD UPDATE

The contractor believes that they will most likely start the roadwork portion of the project in March. The initial road project will begin on the north side of Stacy Road between State Highway 5 and Meandering Way. The contractor will begin preliminary grading as well as underground culvert installation and construction for the storm drainage improvements.

For now, utility relocations will continue to move utilities out of the way throughout January and February. Gas lines have been going in on the north and south side to replace the existing lines, which has been the predominant utility work seen. At press time, overhead power lines are currently being completed between Meandering Way and Country Club Road/FM 1378.

The final project will convert the two lanes of asphalt on Stacy Road to a 4 lane, divided concrete roadway from State Highway 5 to FM 1378, including sidewalks along the full length of the roadway.



## FAIRVIEW HALF MARATHON AND 5K

The 4th annual Fairview Half Marathon and 5K will be held Saturday April 9, 2016, beginning at Fairview Town Hall and winding through Fairview and back to Town Hall. The Fairview Half is one of two half marathons held annually in Fairview. One special feature of the Fairview races is the free child care offered by The Goddard School of Allen. This rare amenity sets Fairview apart as a place that caters to both healthy and family friendly lifestyles.

The half marathon course map will be published in an upcoming edition of Fairview Town News magazine as well as on the Town website, FairviewTexas.org. The course map will include the approximate times that the last runners will clear a particular area. While there will be no major road closures for the race, certain neighborhoods with multiple entrances will have select entrances closed, closings will also be listed in an upcoming edition of Fairview Town News magazine. 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# Boards and Commissions

Every year, dozens of residents volunteer their time and talents by serving on a Town Board, Commission or Committee. The Town utilizes these citizen run boards and commissions to ensure public input and participation in the setting of policy and in the Town's decision-making processes.

Interested in getting involved in serving your community? Find the Application to Serve at [fairviewtexas.org](http://fairviewtexas.org) by selecting "Boards and Commissions" from the "Government" dropdown. The Town Council reviews all applications and votes on all board appointments and reappointments. Board members are typically appointed for two-year terms. To be eligible, individuals must be a registered voter in the Town, may not be in arrears on property taxes and must complete an Application to Serve.

At press time, there were openings on the Public Art Committee, Technology Advisory Committee, Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, Special Events Committee and openings for alternates on the Board of Adjustments. If residents apply for a board without any current openings, their application will be kept on file with the Town Secretary's office for future openings. ## **Planning and Zoning Commission**

The Planning and Zoning Commission is comprised of seven commissioners. The current commission includes Chairman Brad Northcutt, Vice Chairman Pat Friend and Commissioners Scott Almy, John Cox, Ricardo Doi, Debbie Flood and Heather Hager.

It is the Planning and Zoning Commission's duty to make and recommend a master plan, as a whole or in parts, for the future development and redevelopment of the town. The Commission hears, recommends and determines matters related to zoning, platting and subdivision control as specified or required by town ordinance, charter and state law.

## **Economic Development Corporation (EDC) and Community Development Corporation (CDC) Board of Directors**

The EDC and CDC Board of Directors are

comprised of seven board members, with each member serving on both the EDC and CDC board. The current boards include President Warren Westberg, Vice President Sim Israeloff and Board Members Don Braun, Robert Herrema, Pam Little, Bill Nicol and Mary Price.

The EDC Board of Directors is responsible for promoting the economic growth and diversification in the Town of Fairview as well as for overseeing the half-penny sales tax collected for this purpose. The CDC Board of Directors is responsible for promoting the community through infrastructure construction projects funded through the half-penny sales tax collected for this purpose.

## **Parks and Recreation Advisory Board**

The Parks and Recreation Advisory Board is comprised of seven board members and currently has one vacancy. The current board includes Chairman John Brown, Vice Chairman Guy Wormald and Board Members Andrea Faulkner, Donna Pekarek, Maryanne Simonsen and Carol Sutton.

The Parks and Recreation Board acts in an advisory capacity in all matters pertaining to parks and recreation, including present and future maintenance, operation, planning, acquisition, development, enlargement as well as use policies of the town parks and recreation services.

## **Zoning Board of Adjustment**

The Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) is comprised of Board members and Alternates. The current Board includes Chairman Gregg Custer and Board Members Gene Harrington, Joe Barton King, David Logan and Terry Morrow. The Board currently has two alternate spots alongside Scott Almy and Ken Drew.

The BOA makes decisions on appeals and requests for variances to the Town's ordinances.

## **Environmental Management Advisory Committee**

The Environmental Management Advisory Committee is comprised of seven Committee Members. The current Committee includes Chairman Paul Westbrook and Committee Members Gary Anderson, Gary Carter, Ginger

Gouvion, Steven Peacock, Roger Taylor and Rick Zampino.

The Environmental Management Advisory Committee investigates opportunities to promote responsible environmental plans, projects, regulations, guidelines as well as other activities that serve to promote and protect the natural environment of the community.

## **Public Art Committee**

The Public Art Committee is comprised of five Committee Members and currently has one vacancy. The current Committee includes Chairman Karen Karnuta and Committee Members Amy Adler, Joyce Bryan and Elizabeth Glasco.

The Public Art Committee is responsible for administering the Town's public art program including the upcoming launch of an annual Town art show.

## **Technology Advisory Committee**

The Technology Advisory Committee is comprised of seven committee members and currently has one vacancy. The current Committee includes Chairman Bill Baxter and members John Adler, Darryl Besemer, Paul Myers, Carlos Olivarez and Katherine Ponder.

The Technology Committee investigates opportunities to provide more efficient and effective technology outlets for the town and its residents.

## **Special Events Committee**

The Special Events Committee is comprised of five Committee Members. The current Committee includes Chairman Chris Hendricks and Committee Members Maryanne Simonsen and Nancy Lewis. This Committee currently has openings for Committee Members and Alternates as well as openings for Auxiliary Members to assist with the 2016 Gus Macker tournament.

The Special Events Committee makes recommendations to the Town Council regarding community and regional events the town may conduct. The Committee is responsible for organizing, planning and conducting Town events such as the Town's Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony and the Gus Macker 3-on-3 basketball tournament.

# Hazardous Waste and Electronics Collection Event



The Town of Fairview will hold its annual Household Hazardous Waste and Electronics Collection event Saturday, April 30, 2016. The event will be held at Fairview Fire Station #1, located at 500 State Highway 5 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. Residents are encouraged to bring their old chemicals, fuels, oils, paints along with old electronics devices for safe recycling and disposal.

Please keep in mind that this year's event will not include bulk material disposal as was offered in prior years. See the Fairview Bulk, Trash and Recycle Calendar for 2016 on pages 14 - 15 to learn when you can have bulk materials conveniently picked up curbside from your home.

To take advantage of Hazardous Waste and Electronic Collection, you must provide either a valid Texas Driver's License with a Fairview address, or a copy of your last water bill issued by the Town. This has been a highly successful event in the past and your continued participation helps to protect the environment and contributes to a cleaner and greener Town of Fairview.

## Town Election Application Deadlines



The Town of Fairview operates under a council-manager form of government. The Town Council consists of a Mayor and six Council Members that are volunteers elected at-large.

According to the Town of Fairview Charter, no person shall serve as Mayor for more than three successive terms, and no person shall serve as Council Member for more than three successive terms. Their term of office shall be for a period of two years or any portion thereof.

The terms of office that will expire in May 2016 are Town Council Seats 2, 4 and 6. Town Council Mayor as well as Town Council Seats 1, 3 and 5 will expire in May 2017.

The Town's next General Election will occur on Saturday, May 7, 2016. Candidates may begin filing applications to be placed on the ballot for Town Council Seats 2, 4 and 6 with the Town Secretary's Office on Wednesday, January 20, 2016. The deadline for filing applications is at 5 p.m. on Friday, February 19, 2016.

A Fairview Town Council candidate must:

- Be a qualified voter of the town
- Be twenty-one (21) years of age
- Have resided in the town no less than twelve months immediately preceding Election Day
- Meet the requirements of the Texas Election Code
- Continually reside within the town during the term of office
