- Approved a resolution authorizing continued participation with the Steering Committee of cities served by Oncor and payment of assessed dues for 2016.
- Approved a resolution authorizing submission for a park grant application to Collin County for completion of a trail included in the Fairview master trail plan.
- Approved an interlocal agreement with the City of Richardson for use of a Fire Training Center.

Newly Elected and Re-Elected Councilmembers Sworn In

At the June 6, 2016, Town Council meeting, newly elected Councilmember Pam Little and re-elected Councilmember John Adler took their oaths of office. Councilmember Powell has also been re-elected and will be ceremonially sworn in at the next Council meeting.

Councilmember John Adler was sworn in to serve his second term as a Councilmember, Seat 2, on June 6. Councilmember Adler was first elected to the Council in May 2014. At the June 6 Town Council meeting, Councilmember Adler was additionally selected by the Council as their new Mayor Pro Tem, replacing previous Mayor Pro Tem, Henry Lessner, who reached his term limit as Seat 4 in May 2016. Councilmember Adler has additionally served on the Technology Committee since 2005 and previously served as a Board Member for the Town's Economic and Community Development Corporations. Councilmember Adler has worked for various companies in the Telecom Corridor and now develops startup technology companies across the nation; he resides in Oakwood Estates.

Councilmember Pam Little was sworn in to serve her first term as a Councilmember, Seat 4 on June 6. Councilmember Little additionally has served as a Board Member for the Town's Economic and Community Development Corporations. Councilmember Little recently accepted the Spirit of Fairview award from the Allen Fairview Chamber in April 2016. Councilmember Little is involved in many activities around Collin County including the Chamber board, the North Texas Republican Women's board, President of the Samaritan Inn Board, the Finance committee of her church, the Garden Club at Caldwell Elementary School and a charter member of the new Fairview Rotary Club. Councilmember Little resides in The Vineyards at Fairview.

Councilmember Renee Powell was sworn in to serve her second term as a Councilmember, Seat 6, prior to the June 6, 2016 meeting. Councilmember Powell was first elected to the Council in May 2014. Councilmember Powell previously served on the Town's Planning and Zoning Commission for ten years from 2004 to 2014 and has been actively involved with the community for many years. Councilmember Powell resides in Fairview Farms.









You may have driven by Fire Station #1 lately and wondered about the new gray building sitting in front of the Station. The Town recently had the condition of the Fire Station #1 building evaluated by an engineering company including a structural, mechanical and electrical review.

The evaluation report identified some safety concerns in parts of the existing

Fire Station #1. The area of most concern was the kitchen and storage areas around it. Once this issue was recognized by the Town staff and the Town Council, the decision was made to bring in a modular building so the unsafe areas could be taken out of service as soon as possible. The new temporary building will be utilized until the plans for a brand new Fire Station #1 can be completed and constructed.

The shift to the southern side of Stacy Road is now in place and will be that way for awhile. The Contractor will spend a majority of the time working in the low-lying areas where underground culverts must be reconstructed for the new paving designs. Once all the underground drainage systems are installed on the north side of the roadway, then construction of two new concrete lanes on the Fairview side will begin.

The entrance onto Oakwood Trail will need to have some interruptions as an underground storm pipe must be constructed and extended at the entrance to Stacy Road. TxDOT and the contractor are working on the timing and methods either for a partial or full closure of the Oakwood Trail entrance during the school's summer break. TXDOT is considering feedback from the HOA and residents while deciding whether to do a partial closure to work on half the road at a time, or to take less time by fully closing the entrance.

This TxDOT project will construct four lanes on Stacy Road from SH-5 to FM-1378, along with wide sidewalks for pedestrians. Please continue to observe the recommended 40 mph speeds through the construction zones and take alternate routes whenever possible to relieve congestion and improve safety during construction.

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



TOWN QUARTERLY FINANCIAL REPORT

For Quarter Ending March 31, 2016

Monthly financial reports are prepared for the General Fund, Water and Wastewater Fund, Solid Waste Fund, Debt Service Fund, Stormwater Fund and Fairview EDC/CDC Funds, these reports are presented to the Town Council at their monthly meetings. These monthly financials can be accessed on fairviewtexas.org by selecting Departments/ Administration/Audit-Budget.

This report covers through March 31, 2016, which is the end of the second quarter of fiscal year 2015-2016; therefore, it is generally desirable for year-to-date revenue totals to have achieved 50 percent of the budgeted amount and for expenditures generally not have exceeded 50 percent of their budgeted amounts. However, because property taxes are primarily received during the first trimester of the budget year and other revenues such as franchise fees are cyclical, revenues will not always equate to the projected percentage. Likewise, total expenditures may not always equate to the projected percentage, because payments for contracted services, insurance and debt-service payments are paid in lump sum amounts, while transfers to other funds occur quarterly.

General Fund Analysis

Revenue collections in the General Fund for the sixth month of fiscal year 2016 total \$5,729,921 and represent 74.3 percent of the total annual budget. Actual total collection this year is \$757,444 higher than last year.



The top revenue category that is higher than last year is Property Taxes with a total of \$3,191,228, which is \$314,367 higher than last year due to the 8 percent increase in assessed valuations and several agriculture parcels being "rolled back" for collection of additional \$52,817 in delinquent taxes and penalties.

Charges for Services increased \$117,240 over the prior year primarily due to the


Town receiving \$73,549 in engineering fees related to Town development as well as the EMS transport fees received from the inhouse ambulance services now provided by the Town that began in April 2015. Transfers from other funds were higher than last year by \$635,000, related to the funds set aside at the end of the previous fiscal year in the Capital Projects Fund. The Town has transferred these funds back to the General Fund for capital and one-time expenditures budgeted in the current fiscal year.

The top revenue category that is lower than last year is Miscellaneous with a total of \$84,759, which is \$378,231 lower than last year due the Town receiving \$380,000 in debt proceeds during the prior fiscal year to purchase EMS vehicles and equipment. Though the Town gained municipal court revenue during the March 2016 warrant round-up, Fines and Fees are still down overall in FY2015-16 by \$15,606 mainly due to the State of Texas's new "one sticker" law that prevents municipalities from issuing citations for expired inspection stickers.

General Fund expenditures total \$3,193,288 and represent 41.2 percent of the total annual budget. Expenditures are \$90,913 less than the previous year and expenditures for all divisions are within the acceptable range. The decrease of expenditures in the Planning as well as Fire Departments can be contributed to less contractual services being provided and not purchasing the in-house EMS capital as in the prior year, respectively. The Town transferred \$160,490 to the Technology Fund, which is \$64,101 higher than the previous fiscal year due to added budgeted technology expenditures this fiscal year.

Water and Wastewater Fund Analysis

The Water and Sewer Fund revenues total \$2,013,436 and represent 37.1 percent of the total annual budget. This amount is \$362,359 higher than last year. Water sales were



\$101,240 higher than the previous year, while miscellaneous revenue was \$19,844 higher due to a higher refund from the North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) for an over-payment for billed water. Due to timing of the transfer from the Debt Service Fund, an increase of \$246,631 occurred in the transfer category when compared to the prior fiscal year.

Expenses for the Water and Sewer Fund total \$2,405,415 and represent 37.5 percent of the original annual budget. This amount is \$287,351 higher than last year. An increase of \$134,929, or 13.2 percent, occurred due to the increase in water purchase rates and sewer treatment rates established by the NTMWD.

Other Funds Analysis

The increased expenditures in the Fairview EDC and CDC funds of \$215,931 and \$179,337 respectively are primarily due to reduced payments this fiscal year on the 380 Agreement with the Village at Fairview. The revenues and expenditures for all the other operating funds are within an acceptable percentage range. Revenues and expenditures will be monitored and reported to ensure that spending will not exceed the approved budget amounts.

Sales Tax Analysis

Sales tax revenue collections for the entire Town of Fairview (Town, Fairview EDC and CDC portions) for sixth month of fiscal year 2016 total \$1,640,837. Actual total collection this year is \$58,659 or 3.7 percent higher than last year.

The Town of Fairview received \$184,490 in sales tax revenue during March 2016. This amount represents a decrease of \$6,086 or 3.2 percent less than March 2015. However, during the month of April 2016, the Town received \$256,153. This amount represents an increase of \$72,712 or 39.6 percent less than April 2015; part of the increased amount (\$36,699) represents a "prior period collection" from the State Comptroller, which could be from a taxpayer that paid the wrong taxing entity and now the funds have been applied to Fairview.

and guidance through numerous Council committees including the Appointments Committee and the Communications Committee, as well work on the CPDD Master Plan Joint Committee have made a significant and lasting impact to the Town.

The Town staff would again like to thank all these wonderful volunteers for sacrificing their personal time in order to help their Town.
