Summer Water Use

As we enter summer 2016 without any drought restrictions, the Town would like to take a moment to remind residents of the Town's adopted landscape water management measures, as required by the North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD).

These measures have previously been adopted regarding landscape irrigation:

- Lawn and landscape irrigation is limited to twice per week.
- Lawn irrigation watering is restricted from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. from April 1 to October 31 of each year.
- Prohibition of watering of impervious surfaces.
- Prohibition of outdoor watering during precipitation or freeze events.
- Prohibition of the use of treated water to fill or refill residential, amenity and any other natural or manmade ponds. A pond is considered a still body of water with a surface area of 500 square feet or more.
- Rain and freeze sensors and/or ET or Smart controllers are required on all new irrigation systems. Rain and freeze sensors and/or ET or Smart controllers must be maintained to function properly.
- Home car washing can be done only when using a water hose with a shut-off nozzle.
- Prohibition of watering areas that have been over seeded with cool season grasses, such as rye grass or other similar grasses, except for golf courses and public athletic fields.

By far, the largest impact to water bills is yard watering and irrigation systems. The Town encourages residents to evaluate irrigation usage and adjust the frequency and duration of their irrigation cycles.

Summer 2015 was the first summer without water restrictions in several years. That paired with heavy rains in the spring, followed by a lack of rain in the summer, led to widespread complaints regarding high water bills across municipalities in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex. The NTMWD recommends the resources northtexaswateriq.org and watermyyard.org to help residents determine how frequently to water their yards depending upon recent weather. Just because you are allowed to water your yard twice per week that does not mean that it is necessary.

Additionally, residents should be reminded to be cognizant of their irrigation and pool usage, as once they have used more than 40,001 gallons, the rate in the Town becomes \$8.85 per 1,000 gallons. See the rate chart below for the Town's current Water Usage Rates:

30,001 – 40,000 gallons	\$5.61 per 1,000 gallons
40,001 gallons and up	\$8.85 per 1,000 gallons

At the May 3, 2016, regular Town Council meeting, the Town Council addressed the following items:

- Honored the Fairview students of the Lovejoy ISD Engineering team who participated in the VEX Worlds 2016 Robotics Competition from April 20 to 23, 2016.
- Fairview Fire Rescue presented a check to the Muscular Dystrophy Association donating the funds from their efforts in the Fill the Boot campaign.
- Mayor Darion Culbertson presented a proclamation declaring the month of May as Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month in the Town of Fairview.
- Awarded the bid for the fire hydrant relocation project for the TxDOT widening of Stacy Road.
- Approved an ordinance approving a negotiated settlement between the Atmos Cities Steering Committee and Atmos Energy Corporation, Mid-Tex Division.
- Conducted a public hearing and denied a request for approval of a replat of Lot 1, Block E of the Oakwood Estates, Phase III Addition into two (2) lots. The 2.002-acre site is located at 870 St. James Road and is zoned for the (RE-1) One-acre Ranch Estate District. Applicant: Lawrence Ringley, representing Herbert Linder. (Case No. RP2016-01).
- Conducted a public hearing and approved an Ordinance granting a request by M. Christopher, Custom Homes, to rezone a portion of a 44.069 acre tract of land situated in the Robert Fitzhugh Survey, Abstract No. 317 and the Samuel Sloan Survey,

Abstract No. 791 in the Town of Fairview, Collin County, Texas and being generally located adjacent to and east of Country Club Road (FM 1378) and north of Farmstead Street from Open Space and Flood Hazard (FH) Zone to Two-Acre Ranch Estate (RE-2) Zone (ZA2015-14). (Case No. ZA2015-14).

- Approved a development agreement with Harper Landing Development LLC.
- Discussed and took no action on an update from staff regarding the status of the emergency plan.
- Discussed and took no action on a request from the North Central Texas Council of Governments (NCTCOG) on their Mobility 2040 plan.
- Heard an update from Interim Fire Chief, Jeff Bell on Fairview Fire Rescue.
- Discussed Boards and Commissions but took no action.
- Received an update on the status of the Republic Services garbage services contract.
- Received an update on the water/sewer rate study.
- Received the Monthly Financial Report for the period ending March 31, 2016.
- Received the Quarterly Investment Report for the period ending March 31, 2016.
- Received an update on the Stacy Road construction project.

Spring Pancake Breakfast

The 2016 Spring Community Pancake Breakfast hosted by the Friends of Fairview Firefighters Association was another resounding success. This year's event took place on April 23 and was attended by several hundred people. Children were able to try their skills at operating a fire hose and check out the Fire Station. PCI even landed their helicopter so attendees could get an up-close look at how it transports victims of major accidents.

The FoFFA served pancakes, sausage, orange juice and coffee to the good Fairview citizens who attended for just \$5 per adult with small kids eating free. A free courtesy shuttle was offered from Heritage Ranch by Grande Communications.

The Friends of Fairview Firefighters Association was established in 2007 by like-minded Fairview citizens who were interested in supporting Fairview Fire Rescue and its members. The FoFFA mission is to find financial and non-financial solutions to increase the health, safety and well-being of FFR. Their two main fundraisers of the FoFFA are the Spring/Fall Community Pancake Breakfasts held at Fire Station #2 and the Holiday Flag Program.

The Friends of Fairview Firefighters Association thanks all who attended for their ongoing support of Fairview Fire Rescue. Our Firefighters are tireless heroes of our community and FoFFA is proud to support them.

Town Boards and Commissions Openings

Interested in serving your community? The Town of Fairview utilizes numerous citizen run boards and committees to ensure public input and participation in the Town's decision-making process.

To be eligible, individuals must be a registered voter of the town, may not be in arrears on property taxes and must complete an "Application to Serve." Find the application at fairviewtexas.org by selecting "Boards and Commissions" from the "Government" dropdown. The Town Council reviews all applications and votes on all board appointments and reappointments. Board members are typically appointed for two-year terms.

Boards and Commission renewals occur every summer, so residents are encouraged to apply to be members of any of our many boards and commissions including the Planning and Zoning Commission, Economic/Community Development Corporation, Technology Advisory Committee, Parks and Recreation Advisory Board, Special Events Committee, Zoning Board of Adjustments and several more. The Town's police department enforces this prohibition, issuing citations for violations. Fireworks present hazards to the safety of our residents and our pets, as well as the natural beauty of our town's vegetation.

We all remember the fun and excitement we had setting off fireworks as children; however, as parents and guardians, we must also consider the danger fireworks present to our children's safety, in order to prevent injury.

Our hot Texas summers make for extremely dry conditions, which creates a fire hazard for the town. Whether a faulty firework ignites an immediate flame or a spent firework casing causes a delayed blaze, things can get out of control very fast, especially in our windy North Texas region. Every year across the nation, huge amounts of property are damaged by fire, all of which could have been prevented.

STACY ROAD UPDATE

Road reconstruction is finally underway. Traffic will be shifted to the southern half of the existing asphalt pavement, using the shoulder and southern lanes for two-way traffic, allowing work to begin on the north side. Temporary driveways to businesses and residences will be maintained until the concrete directly in front of them is poured. TxDOT and/or Ed Bell Construction will keep all adjacent property owners with driveways informed.

Additionally, HOAs will be contacted when major lane changes or closures are coming up. Those traveling to U.S. 75 in the morning might want to consider alternative routes, depending on your destination. Currently turning South on Angel Pkwy may be a preferred route to U.S. 75, although Stacy Road remains open. Several other routes are advisable, depending upon your destination. LHS at Vex Worlds 2016 Robotics Competition



The Lovejoy High School Engineering and Robotics Club joined the Fairview Town Council at their May 3, 2016, regular Town Council Meeting where they were honored for their participation in the VEX Worlds 2016 Robotics Competition from April 20 to 23, 2016. This year's competition in Louisville, Kentucky, broke the Guinness World Record for the World's Largest Robot Competition with over 15,000 students and 1,075 teams from 30 different countries around the world. The participating LHS students included: Ryan Luther: Sophomore; Austin Wyatt, Senior; Connor Redding, Junior; Josh Blumental, Junior; Brock Mordecai, Junior; Max Hooper, Sophomore; Jolina Tran, Sophomore and Johanna Belk, Freshman.

The Fairview Public Art Committee held the Inaugural Town of Fairview Art Show to great success April 29 through May 1, 2016. The first Town show drew 174 pieces with artists ranging in age from 7 to 87. Over 100 adult pieces competed for a Grand Prize of \$500, won by Kenneth Beckhusen for his work *Blackland Prairie*, as selected by featured juror, Dallas artist Laura Moore. Moore is a former McKinney gallery owner and working artist who was the 2012 Artist-in-Residence at The American Church in Paris, France.

Other Adult Division winners selected by Moore included Brinda Chellappan in First Place for *Peacock Portrait*, Travis Troiana in Second Place for *Soft Self Portrait* and *End of Day* by Mary Beth Adams in Third Place. The Fairview Public Art Committee additionally selected several Town Choice Award winners to split a cash prize. This year's selections were *California's Water Lily* by Nathalie Maltais, *Tulips and Lace* by Mary Beth

Adams, *Hay on a Hill* by Sam Lawrence and *Love*, *Actually* by Pamela Van Laanen. The Grand Prize, First Place and Town Choice cash prize recipients are currently on display in Fairview Town Hall for a period of one year.

Both the Kindergarten through Sixth and Seventh through Twelfth Grade Divisions were judged by Fairview Mayor Darion Culbertson. Culbertson selected *The Memories of Salvador* by Kaya Czyz for her "extraordinary creativity" as the First Place winner in the 7-12 Division. Additionally, Culbertson called Mary Burgess' *Barrel and Onions*, the First Place winner in the K-6 Division, "simply elegant."

Other 7-12 Division winners selected by Culbertson included *Fleurs* by Samantha Cheng for Second Place and *Monday Morning* by Lindsay Browne for Third Place. In the K-6 Division, *Party Cat* by Grace Glotzbach took Second Place honors and Rayna Li's *Bird on Flower* earned Third Place. Student winners were awarded gift cards to a local art supply store. Finally, the Public Art Committee selected Jenna Garcia, Natalie Wu, Amy Wang, Callie Koch and Anukriti Singh as their Student Show Favorite Artists.

Despite the threat of bad weather, the Town saw a tremendous turnout at the Friday Art Show



reception featuring the local band, the Jazz Engineers. Fire Chief Jeff Bell was on hand to honor each of the student artists who entered, regardless of how their piece showed. Bell and Moore then awarded medals to the show winners. By the end of the weekend, more than 300 people had viewed the eclectic artwork on display in a space within The Village at Fairview shopping center.

The Fairview Public Art Committee is an all-volunteer board comprised of Joyce Bryan, Amy Adler, Elizabeth Glasco, Beth McInerney and Committee Chair, Karen Karnuta. The Committee hopes this event is just the first that will enhance the Town's position within the arts community of Collin County. They have already started the planning for next year's show and invite residents to come up to Town Hall to view this year's winners.


























Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Month

Fairview Fire Rescue Uses Grant Funds on Chest Compression System

It has now been over a year since Fairview Fire Rescue (FFR) fully took over EMS responsibilities for the Town. Through the support of the town and some area grants, FFR has been able to acquire some top-notch equipment to assist with the delivery of quality Emergency Medical Service (EMS) to the residents of the Town of Fairview.

One of the Town's most recent acquisitions has been the Physio Control LUCAS® 2 Chest Compression System. The LUCAS 2 device was purchased through a grant received

from CoServ's charitable grant foundation. The device delivers continuous high-quality automated chest compressions in accordance with the American Heart Association (AHA) guidelines to aid in performing CPR. High quality chest compressions with *minimal* interruptions are vital to improving the survival rate of a cardiac arrest patient by delivering good blood flow and oxygen to the heart and brain.

The LUCAS 2 Chest Compression System maintains high quality chest compressions when the patient is being moved or transferred from one location to another. Additionally, it allows EMS personnel to stay safely seat-belted in the back of the ambulance while transporting a cardiac arrest patient to the hospital.

It is the Town's goal to continue to provide the citizens of Fairview with excellent emergency medical services through the acquisition of quality equipment. The support received from the Town administration, area grant opportunities and the citizens of Fairview have helped greatly in the acquisition of this new equipment.

Beyond equipment, Fairview Fire Rescue recommends that everyone become familiar with CPR. Remember these two steps and you may save a life. First, CALL 911, and then PRESS HARD and FAST with chest compressions. Visit the American Heart Association Hands-Only CPR site to learn more at cpr.heart.org.

Do you ever go for nature walks to clear your head? If so, you have probably experienced firsthand how time in nature can benefit your overall well-being. The average child today spends about half as much time outdoors and participating in these kinds of activities as children did 20 years ago. Many of today's children may say they prefer to stay indoors in front of a screen; nonetheless, getting out in nature is important and beneficial to a child's wellbeing. More and more studies seem to indicate that children who play outside exhibit improvements in mood, health and cognitive function as compared to children who spend more time indoors.

Heard Museum Nature Camps

The Heard Natural Science Museum & Wildlife Sanctuary's mission is to inspire children to discover, enjoy, experience and restore our priceless environment. Heard Summer Nature Camps are geared toward children ages 5 to 12 (age set by camper's age on June 1, 2016) and feature opportunities to investigate the wonders of nature on our 289-acre sanctuary, encounter animal ambassadors and more.

In Nature Art Camp, young artists (age 6 to 10) will follow in the footsteps of great artists such as Audubon and Monet with unique opportunities to create their own art inspired by nature and live animals. All art supplies are included.

Keeper Camps will offer children (age 10 to 15) an opportunity to experience a behind-thescenes, hands-on adventure with our Animal Ambassadors. They will also learn about the Heard Animal Ambassadors and what it takes to properly care for them.

The one-week long camps described above run from 9:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. in June and July with a week tuition of \$235 (\$210 for Heard members). Mini one-day camps will run from 9:30 a.m. to noon on July 5 to 7 for \$20 per daily camp (\$17 for members). Mini-camps feature the topic choices of Reptiles Rock, GeoWhiz and Insect Mania.

For the complete information on camp topics, camp schedules and more details, visit heardmuseum.org/camps. Many of the Heard's summer camps fill early and preregistration is required.

Heard Natural Science Museum & Wildlife Sanctuary is a private, nonprofit organization and was founded in 1967 by Bessie Heard. Miss Heard was 80 years old when she saw the need to preserve a place where future generations could experience nature. Today, the Heard's mission of bringing nature and people together is carried out through education, particularly of young people, which emphasizes an appreciation of nature and its conservation.


