





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Now is the best time to plant new trees and shrubs. The planting hole should be only as deep as the root ball and 2 to 3 times wider. No need to amend the soil or add fertilizer at planting time. Return the original soil, firm and water well. Mulch 3-4 inches deep around plant.

Fertilize established trees and shrubs to maintain growth and health during the coming winter weather stresses. Water well. Replenish mulch.

Move tropicals inside before temperatures fall below 50° F. Be prepared for an early freeze. Pre-chill tulip, crocus, late-flowering daffodil and hyacinth bulbs in the refrigerator.

What to plant in October:

BULBS: Allium, Amarcrinum, Calla, Autumn Crocus (Colchicum), Cooperia, Daylily, Dietes, Hardy Cyclamen, Spider Lily (Hymerocallis), Liriope, Louisiana Iris, Ipheion, Lily, Lycoris, Oxalis, Monkey Grass, Rain Lily, Scilla, Watsonia. Purchase Tulip, Crocus, daffodil and hyacinth bulbs for chilling.

VEGETABLES: Early to Mid Month: Arugula, Broccoli, Cabbage, Cauliflower, Chinese Cabbage, Collard Greens, and Kohlrabi.

Mid to Late Month: Carrot, Endive,

Lettuce, Spinach, and Turnip.

HERBS: Borage, Burnet, Caraway, Catnip, Celeriac, Chamomile, Chervil, Chives, Comfrey, Coriander, Cumin, Dill, Fennel, Fenugreek, Lemon Balm, Mexican Mint Marigold, Mint, Oregano, Parsley, Rosemary, Sage, Santolina, Winter Savory, Sorrel, Thyme, Yarrow.

FRUIT: Strawberries.

FERTILIZE: Fertilize existing beds of iris with well-rotted manure or balanced fertilizer. Reduce houseplant fertilizer by 1/2 for winter.

PREPARE SOIL: Mulch gingers and other tropicals that overwinter outdoors to retain warmth and moisture and to control weeds. Falling leaves make autumn a good time to start a compost pile. Shred (or mow) leaves to speed decomposition. Turn compost pile periodically and keep it moist.

LAWN CARE: Fertilize with 3-1-2-ratio fertilizer. In newly plugged lawns, sow 8 lbs. of ryegrass per 1000 sq. ft., to help hold soil. The seed grass will make a bright green carpet until spring, when hot weather will kill rye. Not recommended for established lawns. Mow every 5-7 days and leave the clippings on the lawn.

DISEASES/PESTS TO LOOK FOR: Check for cabbage loopers in the garden; spray with Bacillus thuringiensis (Bt). Make second treatment for brown patch on lawns with a history of the disease.

PRUNE: Prune shrubs as needed, but save major pruning for the winter. Remove dead and damaged wood from shrubs and trees. Make cuttings of tender plants before frost.

Allen American Official Town Newspaper

At the September 2nd regular Town Council meeting, Council approved a resolution designating the Allen American as the official newspaper for the Town of Fairview.

The McKinney Courier Gazette was previously designated as the official newspaper. It was determined that more Fairview residents receive the Allen American than the McKinney Courier Gazette. **The resolution has an effective date of October 1, 2014.**

The town posts notices for public hearings and passed ordinances in the designated newspaper.

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Gus Macker 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament


On the weekend of April 17-19, 2015, Fairview will host a Gus Macker 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament in The Village at Fairview. The Original Gus Macker 3-on-3 Basketball Tournament was started in 1974 by Scott McNeal (alias Gus Macker) on his parents' driveway basketball court in Lowell, Michigan. It started with 18 friends playing competitively for \$18.

The Macker Tournament is designed so that anyone can play: male or female, young and old, short and tall, the most experienced or no experience at all. This maintains the purity and integrity of the driveway game. Since 1987, the Macker Tournament has expanded, holding a total of 972 tournaments with over 2.2 million players – male and female from 7 years old to 50+ – and more than 23 million spectators. Teams are computer-matched into male and female divisions within one of the following categories: Junior, Adult, or Top. The age, height and experience of all four players are considered. Teams receive at least three scheduled games each tournament. The Macker Tournament is a double elimination tournament with a consolation bracket, the "Toilet Bowl", for teams losing their first two games.

The Macker Tournament has grown to national prominence, but is still run in a hometown, friendly manner. Teams of various age, size, and talent levels pay a team registration fee for the opportunity to compete against other teams of similar make-up and the chance to win top-quality trophies. By prohibiting alcohol or tobacco-related sponsors, the Macker Tournament has maintained the wholesome nature and pure fun of the event which draws players, spectators, and media wherever it is held. It has grown due to the simple essence of the event, as originally established in Scott McNeal's parents' driveway.

The Fairview event will consist of a corporate day on Friday, April 17, 2015 with the actual tournament starting the morning of Saturday, April 18, 2015. Gus Macker handles all registrations, and they anticipate opening registration for the 2015 season sometime in November.

1872 Arched Stone Railroad Bridge



The Houston & Texas Central Railroad Bridge over Sloan Creek is on the National Register of Historic Places and is very impressive. Awesome is a better word for it. David Petefish, from the early Fairview Petefish family, discovered this historic bridge while checking for erosion before buying the adjacent property downstream. It is 27 feet tall and made of large stones, just the same as the Allen Station Dam on Exchange Parkway in Allen, which is also on the National Register. It is lined with brick inside the tunnel for Sloan Creek to traverse under the railroad

tracks, and it has the same stone wingwalls on either side of the creek.

The first train ever to travel across Texas was the Houston & Texas Central, built after the Civil War was over. This brought prosperity to the region and allowed the heavy cotton bales and other crops to be transported to markets up north and on to Europe. Before the train came, the farmers could not get their crops to market except by wagons to the steamboat landings at Jefferson, near Louisiana. These wagons had to travel on the dirt roads and cross every stream by ferry boat if it was a large river and by fording the creek if it was a smaller creek. During rainy periods, the wagons just had to sit and wait for the water to go down before they could continue. This could take days sometimes.

Later, the Interurban, which was the electric train that serviced this area, traveled just to the west of the railroad on somewhat smaller tracks. It



ments, some of the interurban grade and the site of an early railroad section house with the cistern. However, the cistern was later destroyed by a construction crew when they put in a new pipeline along Murray Creek.

The remnants of Club Lake Dam and the old Bush Springs Recreational Pool dam can be spotted littering down the creek along with some cement erosion terraces that apparently did not stop the erosion. Trolley Lake Dam, which was built during the Works Progress Administration in the 1930s, is still intact and is included in this district on Murray Creek. This dam is about 30 feet tall and is built like a row of staggered rocks with the cool, clear spring water swirling around it. This was the local spot for taking a Sunday drive and for having a cool spot for entertaining. Bush Springs had modern outdoor electric lights and the cement mounting for the poles are still in place.

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North Texas Municipal Water District – Critical Water Supply Trifecta

The North Texas Municipal Water District (NTMWD) is a wholesale water provider serving over 1.6 million customers within the 13 Member Cities and 33 Customers in the North Texas region. The Town of Fairview is one of the 33 Customers.

The critical factors affecting the NTMWD's water supply can be summed up into three categories:

- Denied Access loss of 28% of the water supply due to invasive species
- Long-term Drought Lavon Lake and Jim Chapman Lake were roughly 50% full as of July 2014
- Regional Growth NTMWD's growth in the region has increased by 100% in the last 20 years

Since 2009, NTMWD has been denied access to 28% of its total raw water supply from Lake Texoma due to the presence of zebra mussels. This has caused NTMWD to withdraw more of its water supply from Lavon Lake. NTMWD is now able to restore the Lake Texoma water supply after receiving several exceptions to the Lacey Act, a Federal Environmental Protection Law which provides criminal prosecution for knowingly transferring invasive species across state boundary lines. One of the exceptions to the Lacey Act allowed NTMWD to restore pumping of 28% of NTMWD's total water supply with the completion of a pipeline extension project. This \$306 million pipeline extension of approximately 46 miles extends from the outfall of the existing Lake Texoma pipeline to the Wylie Water Treatment Plants, located in Wylie, Texas. The pipeline extension project was placed online in May of 2014.

The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) predicts the drought affecting Lavon Lake and Jim Chapman Lake will continue and likely worsen through the end of this year. In order to extend resources, the NTMWD has implemented its Drought Contingency/Water Emergency Response Plan. All of the NTMWD Member Cities and Customers have implemented Stage 3 water restrictions in compliance with the water management strategies established by the NTMWD Board of Directors.

The NTMWD has seen substantial growth in the region since its creation in 1956. As you can see in the chart above, the growth in the region has increased by 100% in the past twenty years. A long-term water plan has been created in order to address the current and future water needs of the region.




