Dear Neighbors,

Welcome to April. Hopefully winter is just about over; I am looking forward to seeing the leaves budding out soon. I have seen daffodils blooming in resident's lawns already as I drive through the town. Here are some things going on around town.

Winter Storm

Our Town staff did an outstanding job in preparing for and working through the extremely cold weather in February. Despite regular electrical outages, we were never in danger of losing our water service. Our Fire, Police, and Public Works (PW) folks worked together to handle 164 calls for help from our residents during that week, about what our Fire Department typically handles over two months. Fairview has no snow removal equipment, so PW was using the construction equipment they had driving through the cold with the open cabs wrapped in saran wrap! I also heard rumors about some of our PW folks sleeping on the floor in their office staying in town so they can respond quicker to emergencies. Among many other things, our team was able to turn off water to 62 homes and helped with smoke alarms triggered by electrical issues.

Frisco Road

This project moves the existing Frisco Road south such that it aligns with Country Club Road. When TxDOT expands Highway 5 north of Country Club, access from the south to Medical City McKinney will be blocked and ambulances coming from the south (Fairview, Lucas, Allen, etc) will take another 5-6 minutes to get to the ER. This reworked road also allows direct access to Fairview from eastbound Highway121. Reworking this road has been in our capital plan and is budgeted at \$4M. Our Town Manager, Julie Couch, worked with federal officials and was able to submit a grant application to the US Commerce Department under the Economic Development Administration (EDA) about two years ago. Fairview was just awarded \$3M specifically to help complete the rework of Frisco Road. The balance of the project cost is mostly coming from road impact fees that developers pay to the Town. Some of the early planning on this road rework has been completed so as soon as the EDA money is available, we will move forward quickly with bidding the project.

Solid Waste Contract

The Town's contract with Republic expires in September 2021. Because of years of good service provided to Fairview, the Council is starting contract negotiations with Republic as opposed to going out for open bids. Changing providers would be difficult especially when it comes to how Republic handles our bulk trash needs. Because of the large number of trees in our Town, our residents need bulk pickup of large amounts of landscape debris. The bulk pickup service that Republic provides to Fairview is unique and probably impossible to duplicate with a different provider without significantly increasing rates, so we don't want to disrupt this service. The Council will be in discussions with Republic for the next several months.

Drainage

Fairview's older neighborhoods were developed prior to the Town having any capability to review development designs leading to drainage problems

that some of our neighborhoods experience. A meeting was held with the Bluebird Lane neighborhood outlining some options in their neighborhood to alleviate drainage issues. Our Town Engineer, James Chancellor, and Council Member Ricardo Doi (who as a PE handles drainage projects in his paying job) presented several options to the neighborhood. The biggest issue in this neighborhood will be obtaining easements from a few residents so that the Town can legally do work on residents' property. James and Ricardo will continue to follow up working towards a solution.

At our March meeting, the Council approved a contract with Huitt-Zollars to put together a plan to help alleviate drainage issues in the FoxGlen neighborhood. A neighborhood meeting is planned for late March to get resident input.

Council Meetings

At the April 6 meeting, Council members will move back to the Council seats and chairs for residents will be spread throughout the remaining space in the Council chamber trying to maintain a semblance of social distancing. The Council requests that attendees at our meetings wear masks. Council members will continue have the option of attending meetings remotely. We will continue remote access to Council meetings for the public going forward. We appreciate everyone's patience over the past year as we all battled this dangerous disease.

COVID-19

While the mask mandate has been dropped and restaurants can go to 100% capacity, we need to remember that the virus is still out there and causing serious problems for those who get the disease. I am starting to hear about children – young children – getting the disease. Please be careful. Get vaccinated. Wear a mask when you are around crowds. I am worried about the upcoming spring break time for college students. If the virus has a big resurgence like I just heard this morning is happening in Europe, various restrictions might be reimposed on us.

A request

If you have questions or concerns about things going on, please don't spread rumors please ask someone who might know the answer. Ask one of our Council members, ask someone on our staff, and you can always email me at Mayor@FairviewTexas.org.

As always, please remember those that are less fortunate than we are here in Fairview. ACO, North Texas Food Bank, Samaritan Inn and Treasured Vessels all have leaders who live in Fairview. Send them a check.

FAIRVIEW FIRE STATION NO. 1 CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

As of press time (March 1) the interior walls and flooring are near completion in the offices and dormitory quarters. Interior doors and ceiling tiles are being installed. Exterior landscaping and irrigation has also begun.



CLIMBING ROSES

Technically most rose bushes can become an elegant, fragrant covering for horizontal and vertical structures. Rose bushes will grow out of control if left alone, but you can train them to 'climb' a trellis, pergola, column or fence.



Training roses to climb Simple steps to follow when planting a rose bush

Spring is the best time to plant a rose bush because it gives them sufficient opportunity to establish sturdy roots. Roses prefer full sun, so you should choose a location that averages at least six hours of sun per day. Early morning sun is usually better for roses vs. hot afternoon sun. Roses require a lot of space and should be placed away from trees, shrubs and other plants.

Roses need light, well-drained, nutrient rich soil. Choose a high quality soil and if possible mix with compost. If you choose a bare root rose bush, you need to soak the plant in a bucket of luke-warm water for an hour before planting. Also be sure to prune any leaves or hips from the stems.

The rose bush should be approximately a foot away from a trellis, pergola, column or fence. The hole you dig to plant the rose bush should be large enough for roots to spread out, usually twice as wide as the actual rose bush and the hole should be about 12 inches deep. Many rose growers like to sprinkle rose fertilizer, nutrients or bone meal in the hole before planting the rose bush.

Once you have planted the rose bush, water thoroughly, filling the hole to the brim with water. Let the water soak in and repeat several times which will help the roots from drying out. Finally fill the hole with soil, pressing gently as you go with your hands, until the roots are completely covered and soil is level. Do not pack the soil which could interfere with growth.

It is not too difficult to train the rose bush

to climb. Attach the stalks/canes of the rose bush to the trellis or fence loosely with stretchy cloth or plant ties from your local nursery or DIY store. Continue to repeat this step as new stalks/canes grow and you will have a beautiful climbing rose bush.

MONTHLY OUTDOOR SIREN TESTING

At Noon on the first Wednesday of every month there is an audible test of the outdoor warning sirens.

Tests will not be performed during severe weather events. If Fairview is experiencing severe weather on a scheduled siren testing date, please assume the siren is weatherrelated and seek shelter immediately.

The Fairview outdoor warning system consists of pole-mounted sirens that are used to alert people, who are outside, of a pending severe event to seek shelter.

These systems are activated by the local public safety authorities based on specific criteria.

The Fairview system is activated by the Allen Public Safety (APS) dispatchers, as a courtesy to the Town of Fairview since

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2009. The Fairview and Allen systems are provided by the same manufacturer, so it is very easy for APS to activate our system as they are activating theirs.

Our system can be used for a variety of warning purposes (ex: shelter in place for a hazardous material spill, assist in the search for a lost person, etc.) as it is essentially a very powerful public address system.

The Fairview system will be activated when:

- Wind speeds are greater than 70 mph.
- There is a threat of large damaging hail.
- During severe thunderstorm warnings where local storm spotters have witnessed lowering/rotating

clouds in the immediate area.

- There is a tornado warning for the immediate area with or without local storm spotter visual confirmation of lowering/rotating clouds.
- The Fairview Fire Rescue or Police Chief requests activation.
- Monthly Siren Testing

Audible siren tests are performed at noon on the first Wednesday of each month. Tests will not be performed during severe weather events. If Fairview or Allen is experiencing severe weather on a regularly scheduled date for siren testing, please assume the siren is weather-related and seek shelter immediately. Fairview Fire Rescue maintains the outdoor warning system located in Fairview.

Granite Countertop Maintenance

Granite is a porous stone and is prevalent on kitchen and bath countertops because of its durability and seemingly effortless care. Additionally, this gorgeous stone enhances the beauty and value of your home. However, granite countertops require routine maintenance and regular cleaning to safeguard against stains and water spots.

Good maintenance includes purchasing a few granite specific products such as a cleaner, polish or sealer. Nongranite specific products with harsh chemicals can damage the stone. It is also important to never use ammonia, vinegar or citrus on granite which can dull the finish. When using granite specific cleaner, spray or mist the countertops and let stand for one minute, then use a cotton or microfiber cloth to wipe away the cleaner.



If your granite countertops are dull, they may need to be polished. Using a granite polish, cover granite countertops evenly, let polish stand approximately 3 to 4 minutes, next remove the polish with soft cloth and gently hand buff with a cotton or microfiber cloth for a nice shine.

There is a quick and easy way to test whether the granites finish needs to be sealed or resealed. Drizzle a small amount of water on the countertop. Water beading on the countertops means you do not need to seal or reseal your granite but if the drizzled water seeps into the stone, a granite sealer is needed. A good granite sealer should be applied to dry clean granite. Follow the manufacturer's instructions when sealing your granite. Once your granite is sealed, use the water test again to make sure a good seal has been made. If water is still seeping into the granite, another coat of sealer may be needed.

To further protect granite countertops use coasters, trivets and cutting boards. Also clean spills and splashes as soon as possible. Granite countertops add value to your home so remember to routinely clean, polish and use the water test to check the seal of the stone.

There are a number of other benefits to using native plants in landscaping. Using these plants that are naturally suited to Texas' hydrologic issues is an excellent way to reduce supplemental watering. Many of the native plant species are also better suited to Texas' climate and provide food sources and habitat for many kinds of wildlife.

For over 30 years, veteran and novice gardeners alike have anticipated this rare opportunity to purchase some of the best plants for North Central Texas gardens and to obtain many rare plants. The plant sale will be open to the public on April 24 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and April 25 from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Museum admission is not required to attend the plant sale.

A Heard Museum Member Pre-Sale will be offered on April 23 from 4-7 p.m. The Member Pre-Sale is open to Heard Museum members only; however, memberships will be available for purchase at the event or online beforehand.

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday if all items are placed inside the cart with lid closed. Please place trash in the BLUE cart and recyclables in the GREEN cart.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week. **See #7 in the guidelines below for size** *limits.*

Remember These Simple Guidelines For Putting Your Trash Out

- 1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
- 2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items out side your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Brush and bulk trash must not be more than 12 cubic yards which is equal to 4 pick-up truck loads.

The Fairview Police Department is participating in the DEA's nationwide medication disposal program.

Medication can be disposed in its original container or by removing the medication from its container and disposing of it directly into the disposal box. Liquid products, such as cough syrup, should remain sealed in the original container. Caps must be tightly sealed to prevent leakage. Intra-venous solutions, injectables and syringes will not be accepted due to potential hazard posed by blood-borne pathogens.
