

Hello Fairview!

As I write this, we are into March already. The redbuds and dogwoods are starting to bloom, tulips and daffodils are in full bloom, and the trees are showing hints of green.

Here are some things that are going on around Town.

Alarm Fees

There has been some confusion about who is supposed to pay alarm fees. There are two categories where fees are charged:

- If your alarm system automatically calls emergency services.
- If your alarm system emits an audible alarm outside your home.

The annual \$25 fee has not been increased since the service was started in 2003. The Council raised the annual fee to \$50 to reflect the increase in costs to administer this program.

McKinney Airport

The City of McKinney has a bond package on their May 6 ballot that asks its residents to approve \$200M for the addition of a four gate passenger terminal, 2000 parking spots, and a new taxiway needed to start commercial passenger service at their airport. The FAA is adding \$100M to this project. Adding passenger service probably means that there will be larger planes flying in/out of this airport - and larger planes make more noise - negatively affecting the quality of life of those living within several miles of the runway. These planes will take off/land over neighborhoods in Fairview, Lucas, and the eastern edge of Allen. Fairview is the most impacted as we are closest to the end of the runway.

Since this bond package is only voted on by McKinney residents, there is a great effort in progress to convince McKinney residents that this bond package is not in their interest – and to vote it down. You can help by going on Facebook to Tom Michero's page and purchasing a sign for \$14. We will make sure that these signs are spread around McKinney or you can purchase signs for friends/family in McKinney (like I did). Dick Hevey and Kim Meeks are setting up a PAC that will raise money for media and mailings to McKinney

residents. The best place to follow what is happening is on the Facebook page "Citizens Against McKinney Airport (TKI) Expansion". You can also follow comments/thoughts/facts on various NextDoor pages.

The McKinney City Council voted unanimously to support this expansion and the FAA is committed to it. That being said, McKinney residents are the only ones who get to decide whether or not this expansion happens – so the best way to beat this is to make sure everyone you know in McKinney gets out to vote against Proposition A on the May 6 ballot.

Frisco Road

Frisco Road is going to be relocated south to where it directly intersects with Country Club. The new road will be a divided four lane road between Greenville and the northbound US75 access road. This new road will help with the congestion that occurs in that area. At our February meeting, the Council awarded the construction bid to Sinacola, and in March, the Council voted to rename the new portion of the road "Fairview Crossing." You can see on the west end of the new Fairview Crossing where some of the construction activity has started. The road should be ready for service in mid-2024.

Watch for information that will be coming out about the April 15th Town wide cleanup day.

McKinney, TX—On April 22-23, 2023, the 34th annual Spring Native Plant Sale fundraising event at Heard Natural Science Museum & Wildlife Sanctuary will feature a huge selection of native plants, hard-to-find herbs, and well-adapted plants.

There are many benefits to using native plants in landscaping. Using these plants that are naturally suited to Texas' hydrologic issues is an excellent way to reduce supplemental watering. Many native plant species are also better suited to Texas' climate and provide food sources and habitat for many kinds of wildlife.

For over 30 years, veteran and novice gardeners alike have anticipated this rare opportunity to purchase some of the best plants for North Central Texas gardens and obtain many rare plants. The Heard's plant sales also often feature a selection of native



milkweed plants. Please see our website for the complete plant list (available soon) at HeardMuseum.org/Plant-Sale. Guests are welcome to bring carts or wagons to facilitate their purchases.

The plant sale will be open to the public on April 22 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and on April 23 from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Museum admission is not required to attend the plant sale.

Lovejoy ISD Celebrates Advanced Placement Scholars and National Merit Recognitions

Lovejoy ISD recently hosted its annual Advanced Academics Recognition Ceremony, celebrating the 272 Lovejoy High School students who achieved Advanced Placement (AP) Scholar status. AP Scholar status is designated by the College Board, and is only granted to students who receive scores of three or higher on three or more AP Exams. Nine National Merit Semifinalists and Nine Commended students were also recognized. Guest speakers, campus and district leadership, teachers, fellow students, and proud family members made this event a well-deserved celebration of the hard work and academic achievements of these students.

Additionally, at the February 24th Board Meeting, the Lovejoy ISD Board of Trustees proudly recognized seven students who were designated as National Merit Finalists. These Lovejoy students began their journey to National Merit Finalist back in October of 2021 as juniors, when they took the 2021 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®). From approximately 1.5 million high school students, 16,000 Semifinalists were identified, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors. To become a Finalist, they then submitted an application, essay, school-based recommendation, verified their high academic standings, and took another test - the SAT or ACT. Wow! Approximately 7,250 Finalists will be selected to receive Merit Scholarships® between March and June.

Lovejoy ISD Director of Advanced Academics, Brie Smith said, "Our Lovejoy National Merit Finalists have an average SAT score of 1530 out of 1600. These young adults will take over 90 AP classes and exams before they graduate; that is over 300 hours of testing! They don't just spend their time taking tests though, these well-rounded students enjoy music, robotics and programming, world languages, football, basketball and soccer, debate, hanging out with their friends, traveling, sewing, and much more. They plan on studying areas, such as Political Science, Law, Business, and Computer Science in college. I know we will continue to see great things from them!"




Community Clean Up Day

This is in conjunction with the Hazardous Waste and Shredding event at the Public Works Yard at 500 S. Hwy 5.






This month at the Allen Public Library...

J. Frank Dobie biographer Steven L. Davis

Folklore offers a glimpse into the soul of a region. A community with colorful folklore typically has fascinating residents. One of the first Texas-based authors to garner national

recognition, J. Frank Dobie captured the folklore of Texas and penned over 20 books, including *Tales of Old-Time Texas*, *Coronado's Children*, and *The Long-horns*.



Steven L. Davis, au-

thor of *J. Frank Dobie: A Liberated Mind*, will discuss the famed folklorist at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 6, at the Allen Public Library. Admission to the program is free, and it will be web-cast live at https://actv.org/ by clicking on the WATCH button.

During the 1920s and 30s, Dobie was known to have driven down country roads, and when he spotted senior citizens on porches, he would stop and interview them. When asked about his motivation for penning a Dobie biography, Steven explained, "I got interested in studying Dobie when I realized that the conventional wisdom about him had been totally wrong. The truth is far more interesting – and far more inspiring. Dobie was a courageous champion of human rights, a visionary environmentalist, and his writing has been enthusiastically mined by many notable authors. I found that Dobie represents so many of the best elements of Texas. He was a free-range spirit and his groundbreaking life and work continue to influence our culture in many ways."

Steven is a past president of the Texas Institute of Letters, a literary honor society founded in 1936. Curator at the Wittliff Collections at Texas State University in San Marcos, Davis has developed and curated over 30 exhibitions at the Wittliff. His previous book includes *Dallas 1963*, winner of the PEN Center Literary Award for Research Nonfiction.

Goldfinger (1964)

Ian Fleming's classic James Bond novels were among President John F. Kennedy's favorite books. In 1962, Dr. No became the first James Bond title to be released as a film, and in 1964, *Goldfinger* became a blockbuster that attracted lengthy lines at the theatre. In some cases, police were summoned to control unruly crowds. Goldfinger's \$3 million budget was recouped in two weeks, and box office records were shattered in multiple countries. *Goldfinger* was the first Bond film to garner an Oscar for Best Sound Editing.

Listen to film historians Brian Hughes and Clyde Ponder analyze and discuss the actors, set designs, videographic challenges, innovative sound effects and music at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, April 11 at the Allen Public Library. This discussion can be viewed virtually at https://actv.org/ by clicking on the WATCH button. In the library's gallery during April, view James Bond: The First Decade 1962-1972, Dr. No, Russia with Love, Goldfinger, Thunderball, You Only Live Twice, On





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After their presentation (7:00 p.m.), a film that involves a British M16 agent will be featured. The film will not be presented virtually.

Brian has written and lectured extensively about the James Bond phenomenon, publishing articles and reviews in local and national publications. Co-founder of the New Orleans WTUL radio show, "Stage and Screen," his

annual November tribute to Bond film music became so eagerly anticipated, generating so many phone calls to the studio that he had to solicit a volunteer to field them so he could cue up the music. Brian serves

Speaking While Female: 75 Extraordinary Speeches by American Women

Nationally recognized journalist, speechwriter and speaker Dana Rubin shares the long-overlooked history of female orators in America at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, April 27, at the Allen Public Library. Admission to the program is free, and it will be web-cast live at ACTV.org by clicking on the WATCH button.

In this first anthology of famous speeches by American women, Rubin's book provides cogent evidence that women have changed the world with their ideas and their public voices, even though the history books have obscured this. From the American colonial period to the present, our nation was fundamentally shaped by the ideas of women, primarily expressed through the spoken word. Speeches by American women shaping the national debates and defining American values are presented in this concise anthology.

"This is a vital book," notes Jon Meacham, author of the Pulitzer Prize-winning American Lion: Andrew Jackson in the White

House. "By identifying and elevating the voices of women across the ages, Dana Rubin successfully led all of us to examine our assumptions and to listen with new ears and open minds. Carefully curated, deft-



ly edited, and brilliantly brought together, this is a collection that will not be silenced. but heard."

Focusing on expanding diverse female voices and viewpoints in the public discourse, Dana Rubin has appeared on C-Span and TEDx Talks. The Rockefeller Foundation and New York City Police Department are among her clients.



Trash, Bulk and Brush Collection



COLLECTION SCHEDULES

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday if all items are placed inside the cart with lid closed. Please have trash and recycling carts out of 7 a.m.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week. See #7 in the guidelines on next page for size limits.

2023 Holidays: Trash, recycling, bulk and brush will not be picked up on the holidays listed below; instead the collection will slide one day after the holiday-unless otherwise noted.



Trash, Bulk and Brush Collection



REMEMBER THESE SIMPLE GUIDELINES FOR PUTTING YOUR TRASH OUT

- 1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
- 2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items outside your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Bulk and brush should be cut in four foot lengths and neatly stacked, you are allowed 12 cubic yards per month, 1 cubic yard is approximately the size of a washing machine.
