Stacy Road Update

Stacy Road is finally nearing completion. The capacity improvements at State Highway 5 and Stacy Road are about finished and the new traffic signal poles have been added.

Final cleanup and a little bit of work behind the sidewalks and final ramps at Meandering Way are also being completed. The last bit of asphalt will be laid at FM1378 and Stacy Road and the new left turning lane on FM1378 will be striped.



VETERANS PARK



Rairview has several parks throughout our town. Some are nestled in neighborhoods, some are privately owned but accessible to residents, and others are visible from major streets. All are perfect spots for playtime, parties, exercise and more.



This month's featured park is Veterans Park located at 372 Town Place; adjacent to Fairview Town Hall. The park is a small, meditative area that honors the men and women who have served our country in the military. There are six monuments, one dedicated to each of the branches: Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard and Merchant Marines. The sculpture, Flamma Libertatis, overlooking the pond was created by North Texas sculptor Michael Pavlovsky. The 10 foot symbolic eternal flame honors the memory of the veterans of the community. The triangular base contains the words: VALOR, HONOR, and SACRIFICE. Also in the park are stones that have been purchased by individuals or groups to honor someone who has served in the armed forces. Stones with a gold star indicate that the person honored was killed in combat. The closest parking is at Town Hall.

Mayor's Note

Dear Neighbors,

The Town Council recently voted unanimously to call for a bond election for an amount not to exceed \$7.6 million on the

May 4, 2019 ballot. The purpose of the bond election is to fund construction of a replacement facility for Fire Station #1. Station #1 was housed in the former Town Hall, which was a repurposed residential home originally built in the 1960's. As a result of a Professional Engineering report, this structure was found to be unsafe and was torn down and replaced with two temporary modular buildings.

In 2017, a \$25 million bond was presented to our residents to build Fire and Public Works facilities to meet current and future town needs at build out. That bond failed. As a result, the Town Council formed a group of citizen volunteers called the Community Resource Group (CRG) to assist in identifying and recommending solutions for our town's needs. The Council, with input from the CRG, is proposing to build a replacement Fire Station to meet the current needs of our Town. The proposed structure would include living quarters, equipment bays for current fire equipment and space for a future ambulance. The design would also allow for the future expansion of the bays, when the need occurs, based on buildout of the commercial district and increased emergency call volume.

The Town Council has identified a funding plan for payment of the debt associated with the bond, **without** a tax rate increase.

There are four Town Hall meetings scheduled, where your questions regarding the proposed bond can be addressed by the Town Council. FAIRVIEW FIRE FIGHTS BREAST CANCER



At the Tuesday, February 5, 2019 Council meeting, the Fairview Professional Firefighters Association Local 5039 presented a \$2,000 check to Bradie James' Foundation 56. The Firefighters Association raised the money through t-shirt sales during Breast Cancer Awareness Month this past October.

Mr. James' foundation focuses on early detection and with the funds raised by the Firefighters Association, his organization will be able to continue providing free mammograms at Methodist Dallas Medical Center. To date, Foundation 56 has donated more than half a million dollars to help provide access to breast cancer services, resources and transportation to more than 25,000 people throughout the country. Foundation 56 also supports the Bradie James Breast Cancer Resource Center at Methodist Dallas Medical Center. The resource center offers everything from fitted wigs, prosthesis, social therapy programs, support groups and more.

The Firefighters Association works throughout the year to raise funds not only to

help Foundation 56 but, to help Association members in times of need. In 2018 the Association helped an Allen Firefighter who lost his home to a fire and they also helped a former member's family with funeral expenses.





Reduce Your Carbon Footprint

There are many small changes you can make to your outdoor—and indoor surroundings to adopt environmentally conscious habits that could reduce your carbon footprint. Luckily, making careful choices can be easy with the right tools and information. Check out the following advice for taking a few small steps to a more sustainable living space. Remember to check the association's CC&Rs for guidelines and possible restrictions prior to beginning any projects.

Try composting. Compost is a natural way to enrich planting and gardening soil with nutrients from kitchen waste like apple cores, banana peels and coffee grounds mixed with plant matter like yard clippings and fallen leaves. The keys to successful compost are time,

ventilation and heat. You can start with a medium-sized container and a lid that includes ventilation holes placed in direct sunlight, if possible. Remember to be mindful of where you place the compost on your property to decrease the likelihood of offensive odors seeping into your neighbor's living space.

Grow your own herbs and garden veggies. Even if you don't have an outdoor gardening space, you still can grow herbs and vegetables indoors in small containers. Herbs like oregano, rosemary and mint require little

maintenance and can thrive if placed near a bright or sunny window. Vegetables like tomatoes and carrots also can be grown indoors with the proper care. Check your local home improvement store for seed packets and guides for getting started. And, don't forget to use your compost to enrich that soil!

Consider using drip irrigation. Drip irrigation uses a slow-drip watering method to hydrate your lawn and garden on an ongoing basis instead of running a sprinkler system or hose for several intermittent periods. Running drip irrigation often can be both a cost-efficient and environmentally responsible alternative to traditional watering methods, but be sure to consult a landscape professional to learn about which plants and foliage benefit most.

Use solar-friendly outdoor lights. Several products on the market now employ the use of small solar sensors or panels to help reduce the amount of electricity used for outdoor lighting accessories. Semi solar-powered lantern lights, walkway illuminators and attached light fixtures are available at many home improvement stores. Opt for energy efficient light bulbs to go with your solar-friendly outdoor lighting accessories whenever possible.

30th Annual Hared Museum Plant Sale Fundraiser

The 30th annual Spring Plant Sale fundraising event at Heard Natural Science Museum & Wildlife Sanctuary, taking place April 13-14, will feature a huge selection of native plants, hard-to-find herbs and welladapted plants.

There are a number of other benefits to using native plants in landscaping. Using plants that are naturally suited to Texas' hydrologic issues is an excellent way to reduce supplemental watering. Many of the native plant species are also better suited to Texas' climate and provide food sources and habitat for many kinds of wildlife.

For 30 years, veteran and novice gardeners alike have anticipated this rare opportunity to purchase some of the best plants for North Central Texas gardens and to obtain many rare plants. Visit the Heard's website for the complete plant list (available soon) at HeardMuseum.org/PlantSale. Guests are welcome to bring carts or wagons to facilitate their purchases.

The plant sale will also feature a selection



of native milkweed plants. Monarch butterflies, Danaus plexippus, a species suffering from major decline in recent years, is dependent on milkweeds. This is the only plant species that their caterpillars can eat. With shifting land management practices, we have lost much of the milkweed from the landscape, leaving them with a limited food supply. Scientists believe this to be one of the causes of the Monarch population decreases. By purchasing and planting milkweed to help feed Monarch butterfly caterpillars, North Texans will be able to both help the recovery of this species and support the Heard. All purchases are also tax-free.



The plant sale will be open to the public on April 13 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and April 14 from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Museum admission is not required to attend the plant sale.

A Heard Museum Member Pre-Sale will be offered on April 12 from 4-7 p.m. The Member Pre-Sale is open to Heard Museum members only; however, memberships will be available for purchase at the event or online beforehand.

Severe Spring Weather Storm Warning Systems

As spring is here, often times, it brings severe weather conditions. Now is a good time to make sure everyone in your family is prepared for this weather. Preparations should include a safety plan for your family and emergency supplies, such as water, flashlights with fresh batteries, a working cell phone with back up batteries or a pre-charged power supply and a weather radio. More information on preparations can be found at KnoWhat2Do.com. Click on "SEVERE WEATHER" to learn more about severe weather. You can also click on "Make a Plan" to create your own personal plan and learn how to build an emergency supply kit.

One of the key areas of preparation is to make sure you have the ability to receive alerts about approaching severe weather. There are a variety of processes and systems that can be used to notify you of severe weather.

Outdoor Warning Systems

These systems consist of pole-mounted speakers or sirens that are used to alert people who are outside of a building of a pending severe event. These systems are activated by the local public safety authorities based on specific criteria. The Fairview system is activated by the Allen Public Safety (APS) dispatchers, as Fairview does not have our own dispatchers or other personnel at our Town Hall on a 24-hour schedule. The Fairview and Allen systems are provided by the same manufacturer, so it is very easy for APS to activate our system as they are activating theirs. Our system can be used for a variety of warning purposes (ex: shelter in place for a hazardous material spill, assist in the search for a lost person, etc.) as it is essentially a very powerful public address system.

The Fairview system will be activated when:

- Wind speeds are greater than 70 mph
- There is a threat of large damaging hail
- During severe thunderstorm warnings where local storm spotters have witnessed lowering/rotating clouds in the immediate area
- There is a tornado warning for the immediate area with or without local storm spotter visual confirmation of lowering/rotating clouds
- The Fairview Fire or Police Chief requests activation

Weather Alerting Radios

These radios can be purchased from a variety of retail and online outlets for less


than \$50. They are referred to as All Hazards NOAA Weather Radios. You should look for radios with the SAME (Specific Area Messaging Encoding) feature. This allows you to dial in a code for the Collin County area. By entering the code for Collin County, your radio will only sound for events affecting Collin County. Be sure to get a radio that has a back-up battery that will allow it to work in the event your power goes out. Having one of these radios is an excellent addition to your storm warning preparedness plan as they are activated by the National Weather Service in severe weather events.

Automated Notification Sources

The Town of Fairview uses Nixle alert you via your email and/or text messages to your cell phone. You can sign up using the widget on the FairviewTexas.org homepage. You may also want to sign up for a weather alert app from any number of the local TV and radio stations that cover the Dallas Fort Worth Metroplex.

As you can see, many systems can assist you in the case of severe weather. Each system has specific design purposes and can have some technical difficulties. You are encouraged to have several warning methods for your personal severe weather plan.





Collection Schedules

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week.

2019 Holidays: Trash, recycling, bulk and brush will not be picked up on the holidays listed below; instead the collection will slide one day after the holiday.

January 1, New Year's Day May 27, Memorial Day July 4, Independence Day September 2, Labor Day November 28, Thanksgiving December 25, Christmas Day

Remember These Simple Guidelines For Putting Your Trash Out

- 1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
- 2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags, All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items out side your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Brush and bulk trash must not be more than 12 cubic yards which is equal to 4 truck loads.

storm water avality

Do you ever stop to think where rain water ends up or how dirty the water is after it lands on the ground?

With our growing community, we must understand the importance of stormwater quality. Trash that has blown away from open trash bins or excess fertilizer from lawns produce pollutants that are eventually picked up by rain water. When this happens, all pollutants are swept into Sloan Creek. In Fairview, our system allows rain water into our storm drains and road side ditches, then into our creeks and streams, and finally into Lake Lavon.

How can we prevent these pollutants from getting into our water system?

- Pick up dog poop. If it is left on the ground, it is picked up from rain water and goes down to Lake Lavon.
- Recycle motor oil. Do not dump it down the storm drain.
- Do not litter. Always put waste in trash bins with the lid closed.



- Do not throw cigarette butts on the ground. They are picked up by rain water as well.
- Set a good example and do not rely on anyone to pick up YOUR trash.

With everyone's help we can keep our creeks, streams and lakes clean.
