Citizen Prosecutor Academy Accepting Applications

Hello Gairview!

As I write this at the end of June ... it is HOT already. Take care of your people and animal friends. Put some cool water out for the birds. Make shade — plant more trees! Some things going on around Town:

Fairview Town Center (FTC)

Lots of things happening here!

- We did a "wall breaking" instead of groundbreaking for the Revolving Kitchen that is supposed to be open in December 2023. This 37,000 square foot space will contain 34 commercial kitchens for takeout food and a food hall for in-store dining.
- Checkout a new restaurant called "Bubbles" for breakfast or lunch. It is a unique place where you can have a meal and watch your small kiddos play, and soon you will be able to have a drink and do this too!
- Venture X is coming back. Their new space is under construction on the north side of the FTC interior street.
- The new tenant taking up the space between Cafe Gecko and Bubbles will be announced shortly.
- The cigar bar has started interior construction.

- Construction on the new apartments down by Dillard's and the old community garden has started. The two-story parking garage on the north side of the FTC down near Dillard's is adding two more floors of parking.
- There is an entertainment venue that will be announced soon going in where Bowlero was located.
- Boozies, which opened to excellent reviews and then surprised us by quickly shutting down in about three weeks was part of company-wide shut down. All of the brewing equipment is still in the building, so hopefully either they figure out their internal issue or they sell out to someone who will continue to operate the restaurant and brewery.
- Chicken Salad Chick is about to open where Zoe's used be to be.
- Wild Salsa is now open for lunch and dinner.

Senior Transportation

I visited with the residents of The Overture recently and was asked about senior transportation. Fairview has an agreement in place with DART called Collin County Rides that offers heavily subsidized transportation within Collin County. As you probably know, Fairview is not a DART member. DART has decided that it wants to end this arrangement with Cities/Town that are not DART members (Allen, Fairview, Wylie). Our staff is working to come up with an alternative solution. I will write more about this in future issues.

I am so blessed to have been born in this great country. The vast majority of our family trees started on another continent. My family tree started in Europe — Austria, Germany, Scotland, Ireland, England. I have many friends who are first- or second-generation immigrants and are now citizens. 

Lessner was first elected mayor in 2019 and had previously served eight years on the Town Council. 

Medical City Plano recently honored four Fairview firefighters for using an intravenous (IV) medication that speeds up blood clotting to help save a patient who was bleeding severely and had lost consciousness.

School is back in session this month. A few precautions go a long way toward keeping children safe, especially as traffic patterns change:

Pedestrians

- Ensure you have adequate room in the lane ahead of you when making a turn, so you don't block a crosswalk and force pedestrians to go around you.
- Stop and yield to pedestrians who are in a crosswalk or preparing to cross at an intersection.
- Always stop for a crossing guard holding up a stop sign.
- Take extra care to look out for children in school zones, near playgrounds and parks and in all residential areas.
- Never pass a vehicle stopped for pedestrians.

Bicyclists

- When passing a bicyclist, proceed in the same direction slowly, and leave 3 feet between your car and the cyclist.
- If turning left when a bicyclist is approaching in the opposite direction, wait for the rider to pass.
- If turning right and a bicyclist is approaching from behind on the right, let the rider go through the intersection first, and use your turn signal.
- Check side mirrors before opening your door.

School Buses

- Never pass a bus from behind or from either direction if you're on an undivided road if the yellow or red lights are flashing and the stop arm is extended.
- Stop far enough back to allow children space to safely enter and exit the bus.



Coming Soon to Fairview

Construction is in full swing on Fairview Crossing at the northwest edge of Fairview. The four-lane divided road will replace the former Frisco Road, just south of Medical City McKinney. The new road has been realigned and will bring a four-way intersection where it will meet State Highway 5 and Country Club Road. Fairview Crossing is scheduled to be open to traffic in Spring 2024.

The future Sloan Corners development, which is being planned by the Billingsley Company, will lie between State Highway 5 and U.S. 75, primarily south of Fairview Crossing. A small portion of the development is planned for north of Fairview Crossing. A construction date for the development has not been announced.

The northern extension of Fairview Parkway will run through the development and will intersect with Fairview Crossing, ending at the town limits. The extension project is in the engineering phase, and construction is expected to begin in 2024. When it opens, a four-way stop will be in place where it intersects with Latham Road. The former Fairview Village Road, which aligned with Latham Road west of Fairview Parkway, has also been renamed to Latham.

Dogs Running Loose? There's an **Ordinance** for That



Some dogs are content to sleep the day away, and others are always looking for adventure and an escape route.

Regardless of your pooch's personality, Article 2 of the Fairview Code of Ordinances specifies that dog owners are required to keep their dogs under their control if they're not inside an enclosure.

According to the ordinance, the owner of a dog running loose will be given a warning on the first offense and a citation thereafter. Collin County Animal Services is responsible for animal control in Fairview. Scan OR code 1 to read the full animal control ordinance.

Need to report a loose dog or a lost pet? Contact animal services at 972-547-7292. You can also search for or report a lost animal on the animal services website. Scan QR code 2 to visit the Collin County Animal Services site.

Rules for handling habitually barking dogs are also found in Article 2 of the town code. For Fairview code enforcement, call 972-886-4223.

Did you know?

Residents are limited to four canine or feline friends in their household. The limit applies to any combination of dogs or cats living in a home. New litters of dogs are cats are exempt from the rule until they are four months old.

The 'Dog Days' of Summer, in Summary

The "Dog Days of Summer" are usually the hottest and most unbearable days of the season. Do you know where the expression originated? Some think it's a reference to the hot, sultry days that are "not fit for a dog." Others suggest it's the time of year when the extreme heat drives dogs mad. But where does the phrase actually come from? And what does it have to do with dogs?

The phrase is a reference to Sirius, the Dog Star. During the "Dog Days" period, the sun occupies the same region of the sky as Sirius, the brightest star visible from any part of Earth. Sirius is a part of the constellation *Canis Major, the Greater Dog.*

In the summer, Sirius rises and sets with the sun. On July 23, the star is in conjunction with the sun, and because the star is so bright, the ancient Romans believed it actually gave off heat and added to the sun's warmth, accounting for the long stretch of sultry weather. They referred to this time as *dies caniculares* or "dog days."

The phrase "Dog Days of Summer" specifically refers to the 20 days before and 20 days after this alignment of Sirius with the sun: July 3 to August 11 each year.

While this period usually is the hottest stretch of summer, the heat is not due to any added radiation from Sirius, regardless of its brightness. The heat of summer is simply a direct result of the Earth's tilt.

During summer in the Northern Hemisphere, the tilt of the Earth causes the sun's rays to hit at a more direct angle and for a longer period of time throughout the day. This means longer, hotter days.



Trash, Bulk and Brush Collection



There will be no solid waste collection on **Labor Day**, **Monday**, **Sept. 4**. Pickup days for bulk, trash and recycling will shift for the entire week.

Residents who normally receive bulk pickup the first Monday of the month will instead receive bulk pickup on Tuesday, Sept. 5.

Residents who normally have trash and recycling collected on Mondays will instead receive pickup on Tuesday, Sept. 5. Addresses that normally receive Tuesday pickups will receive collection on Wednesday, Sept. 6, and residents who normally receive Wednesday pickups will instead receive pickup on Thursday, Sept. 7.

As always, trash and recycling carts should be placed at edge of the street/alley no earlier than 5 p.m. prior to collection day and no later than 7 a.m. on collection day. Only household waste, grass clippings, leaves and similar yard waste placed in an approved container will be collected.

Key things to remember:

- 1. Carts should be placed with handles facing the house and lids opening toward the street or alley.
- 2. Carts must be placed 2 to 3 feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters or other objects

that will obstruct the pickup arm.

- 3. Trash should be inside securely tied plastic bags, and all bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous waste in the cart.
- 5. Nothing should be placed outside the cart except for acceptable bulk or brush placed for pickup on your scheduled bulk and brush pickup week.
- 6. Carts must be rolled back away from the street after pickup no later than 6 a.m. the following day.
- Bulk and brush should be cut into 4-foot lengths and neatly stacked. Up to 12 cubic yards of brush or bulk are allowed per address in a month. A single cubic yard is 3 feet long, 3 feet wide and 3 feet tall.



Trash Talk The ABCs of Weekly Trash and Recycling Collection

Those big trucks that collect our trash and recycling are amazing, but they need your help to do their work properly. Remember these ABCs to keep the trucks moving on schedule, so everyone gets timely collection:

- a. **Arrange** carts carefully. Cart handles should face your home, and lids should open toward the street. **Allow** at least 2 feet of space between carts and other objects, including mailboxes, meters, fences and automobiles.
- b. **Be** punctual. Have your trash and recycling carts in place at edge of the street or alley no earlier than 5 p.m. prior to your collection day and no later than 7 a.m. on collection day. And remember to roll your carts back to your house by 6 a.m. the day after pickup.
- c. <u>Close</u> but <u>don't clamp</u> or lock lids. If there's not enough space in your solid blue trash cart to close the lid, purchase a pink tag from the Town for \$2.07. Only bags tagged with Town-issued tags will be picked up if they're left outside of carts (except for bags left on your bulk pickup week).

boxes are perfect for putting in your recycling bin. But aluminum foil, shredded paper and coated cardboard cannot be recycled in Fairview.
