Hello Fairview!

I wonder what everyone thinks about making daylight savings our new official time? I generally like it because there are more hours of light at the end of the day ... but unfortunately, that tends to cause me to stay working in my office longer ... so I get home later.

Here are some things happening around our Town.

Hart Road Turn Lanes

Last month, I told you that TxDot had approved installing a light at Stoddard and Country Club. TxDot now has approved the turn lanes on Country Club at Hart and Red Oak. I don't have a schedule yet, but I expect that this will be done in conjunction with TxDot's planned shoulder improvement project on Country Club that will start later this year. Both of these projects should help with traffic and safety especially during the start and end of school days.

Ordinances being Reviewed

The Planning and Zoning Commission and the Council will be meeting jointly to review and possibly modify ordinances related to sport courts and out buildings. The ordinances on our books that cover these items maybe are not as tight as they need to be. The current process requires the residents to get a Conditional Use Permit (CUP) before starting on a project of this type. To the residents, this sometimes seems like a guessing game as to what is acceptable. We are going to see what we can do to take out some of the mystery associated with this process.

NOT changing the Town Charter

In the April, 2022 Town Newsletter, under the Council's Corner section, there is a statement about the Council discussing calling for a vote to modify term limits for our elected officials. Currently elected officials can serve three two year terms – for six total years. The thought was maybe to change this to two three year terms – for six total years. I have had several folks ask me when will the election be held. Just to be clear – the Council did have these discussions over several months but ultimately decided not to proceed to call an election. Unless this issue is brought up with a future Council, things will stay as they are today.

Emergency Sirens

As we are in severe weather season, I get asked about our emergency sirens. There are three sirens in Fairview. One is near Cypress Crossing in Coyote Park. one is in Oakwood in Creekside Park, and the third siren is at the Heritage Ranch Country Club. These sirens are activated by the Allen Fire Department when weather conditions warrant. Unless you live near one of these sirens, they can be heard when you are outside, but maybe not while you are inside. You also might occasionally hear the sirens in Allen or McKinney. If you are inside during a storm, keep your NOAA weather radio near you.

More Restaurants

The Salad to Go on Stacy just west of the RaceTrac is now open. I am told that they serve large and healthy salads.....but I really enjoy their breakfast burritos! They put lots of

Reducing Septic System Failures in Aerobic Systems



WHY IS STORMWATER MANAGEMENT IMPORTANT?

As environmental standards in the state of Texas are being set, so are the quality standards of our waterways and stormwater runoff. In the past few years, Wilson Creek's status is currently "Impaired" and the impairment is due to an excess of bacteria in the water, which can be caused by farmlands, fertilizers and failing septic systems.

The good news is there are things Fairview residents can do to help; septic systems that are well cared for are not as prone to failure, and therefore less likely to negatively affect our ground and stormwater heading toward Wilson Creek. Below are a few simple Dos and Don'ts to ensure a properly functioning septic system:

SEPTIC SYSTEM DOS

- DO: Be aware of abnormal smells and be sure to call a professional when needed
- DO: Always have a diagram showing the locations of your tank and septic field
- DO: Repair leaking faucets and toilets
- DO: Maintain adequate grass cover over septic field
- DO: Conserve water to avoid overloading your system
- DO: Periodically have solids pumped out of septic tank
- DO: Keep records of when solids are pumped and any other maintenance

SEPTIC SYSTEM DON'TS

- DON'T: Plan any building additions, pools or construction near the septic field
- DON'T: Use your toilet as a trashcan
- DON'T: Pour grease or cooking oil down the drain
- DON'T: Use bleach or harsh chemicals that could harm essential septic bacteria
- DONT: Put baby wipes, feminine products, paper towels, etc. in your septic system
- DONT: Allow anyone to drive or park over any part of your system
- DON'T: Wait for the system to fail by not checking system regularly

Native Texas Butterfly House and Garden at Heard Museum Reopens June 4

From June 4 through October 2, 2022, visitors to the Native Texas Butterfly House and Garden at Heard Natural Science Museum & Wildlife Sanctuary in McKinney, Texas will have the opportunity to walk among free-flying native butterflies and other pollinators. Guests will be able to view butterflies up close while learning about their life stages and more.



The butterfly house is regularly stocked with an assortment of native butterfly species, which varies throughout the exhibit. Guests may even get to see a butterfly emerge from a chrysalis. Inside the butterfly house, nectar plants are also available to feed the adult butterflies. There are even a few host plants for caterpillars to feed on (“host plants”).

The butterfly garden, too, is filled with nectar plants and host plants that naturally attract these lovely creatures. Guests may even find a few ideas to try in home gardens, which can in turn help pollinators on a broader scale. From time to time, other species of wildlife that feed on insects or the nectar plants may also be found in the butterfly garden, including hummingbirds. This area is also a great setting for nature photography.

Irrigation System Check-Up

Did you know in many North Texas communities 30 to 50 percent of the total water used during the summer is used for landscape irrigation?

Having an irrigation system that does not function properly can damage a landscape by creating areas that are too dry or too wet. It can also result in water loss and high water bills. Checking the system at least twice a year can help alleviate these issues. Texas A&M AgriLife Research Center and Water University have some helpful tips to help save water and money.

The first thing to do is to make a copy of the original irrigation design plan to take notes on. If the original plan isn't available, simply sketch the system layout and number all the sprinkler heads in each station.

Run each station for a few minutes to see if sprinkler heads are functioning and distributing water properly. Make notes about which sprinkler heads need attention. Some problems to look for are:

- Water spraying onto the sidewalk, driveway or street/alley
- Sprinkler heads that are missing, not operating, have reduced water flow or have a poor distribution pattern
- Broken sprinkler heads - gushing water out the top or not popping up
- Sprinkler heads that are no longer straight
- Clouds of mist coming from sprinkler heads
- Grass, shrubbery or trees blocking distribution pattern
- Dry landscape areas - possible causes can be low system water pressure, a plugged nozzle or wind
- Sprinkler heads installed too far apart or not in a recommended square or triangle pattern

The next thing to do is to fix the problems either DIY or hire a professional irrigation specialist. Most repairs require a simple cleaning out a sprinkler head. Once the repairs or adjustments are made it will be time to determine how long to run each station and to check for uniform distribution. The easiest way to do this is to collect empty, straight sided cans such as cat food or tuna fish cans. Mark the inside of the cans, similar to a

rain gauge, with markings for $\frac{1}{2}$ ", $\frac{3}{4}$ ", and 1".

Place approximately 3 cans per sprinkler head throughout one irrigation station and run for 15 minutes. Write down how much water is in each can. The ideal irrigation system distributes water uniformly in the area and therefore each can should have the same amount of water. Repeat for each station.

When determining the amount of water required, take the following into consideration: the amount of sunlight, type of plants, type of soil, time of year and amount of precipitation that is typical for North Texas. Texas A&M AgriLife suggests the following summer watering schedule:

- Turf areas in full sun on clay soil require about 1 inch of water every 5 to 7 days.
- Turf areas in full sun on sandy soil require about 1.5 inches of water every 5 to 7 days.
- Shrub, groundcover and perennial areas require about half the amount of water turf areas require if 2 to 4 inches of mulch is covering the root area.
- Water plant containers and vegetable gardens as required.

Now it's time to set the irrigation system controller according to how much time is necessary for each station to provide the estimated amount of water for the plants in that station.

One last bit of advice from Texas A&M AgriLife is to be sure to change the schedule each season. A good rule of thumb for watering amounts during the year (based on summer amounts) is to use 20 percent less in the Spring and Fall and to turn off the irrigation system in the Winter and only water if there is no precipitation in a 30 day period.

Following these simple steps and guidelines will not only help save water and money but will also help provide a beautiful landscaped yard.

Thank you, Maryanne, for your time and effort in making our town a community. Congratulations on your award.




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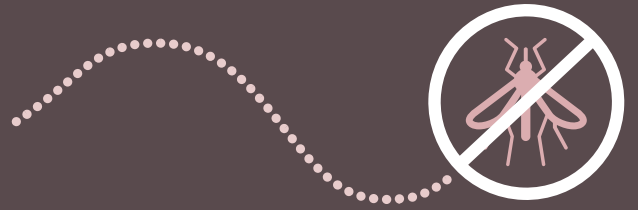


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MOSQUITO PREPAREDNESS



As we begin to spend more time outside on beautiful spring and summer days, we should all be thinking early about steps that can be taken to protect against West Nile virus (WNV), Zika virus (Zika) and Chikungunya virus.

Local municipalities as well as Collin, Dallas and Denton counties work together to share data as well as best practices and that seem to be working well in the fight against mosquitos. As in past years, the Town of Fairview has contracted with Municipal Mosquito to perform trapping and testing every week. They will also be proactively applying larvicide where needed.

You can better protect yourself and your family by following the Four Ds*:

- **DUSK/DAWN:** Stay indoors during evening to early morning hours-from about 7 p.m. to 6 a.m. This is when mosquitoes are most active and hungry.
- **DRESS:** Wear long sleeves and pants when outdoors. Clothes are that magic barrier to keep mosquitoes from finding skin to bite.
- **DUMP & DEFEND:** Get rid of any water outside that has been standing for more than three days, including stagnant swimming pools, birdbaths, pet dishes, empty pots and planters, clogged rain gutters, etc. Mosquitoes only need a few inches of standing water to breed. Also, keep mosquitoes out of your home by repairing or installing window and door screens.
- **DETERRENT:** Use insect repellent containing DEET or other proven deterrents on your outer clothing and exposed skin. These products are safe when used according to their directions. They help keep mosquitoes and other insects

like ticks away. Having mosquito-deterrent plants in your yard such as marigolds or lavender is a good idea too.

Preventative actions taken at the individual level will go a long way in combating the potential for exposure to the viruses. Everyone should look for places around their home or business that contain standing water and drain them. A few examples of places where standing water can occur are:

- Playground equipment can collect water after rain showers or after watering the lawn.
- Lawn furniture and equipment can easily accumulate water.
- Gutter downspouts can cause water to accumulate on the ground underneath. Splash guards can be utilized to better disperse water and prevent collection.
- Stacks of aged wood can hold water and become a breeding ground for mosquitoes. Discarding old wood and keeping new wood in dry locations is ideal.
- Buckets and other items commonly found in the back of truck beds can collect water and should be dumped out regularly.
- Boats contain many places where water can accumulate; keep boats drained and covered.
- Avoid overwatering plants and drain drip trays, if necessary.

The preventative measures provided above are just some of ways individuals can actively combat disease. The Town encourages all residents and local business owners to assess and monitor their properties on a regular basis and to take appropriate actions so that any potential hazards can be eliminated before they become a real threat to public health.

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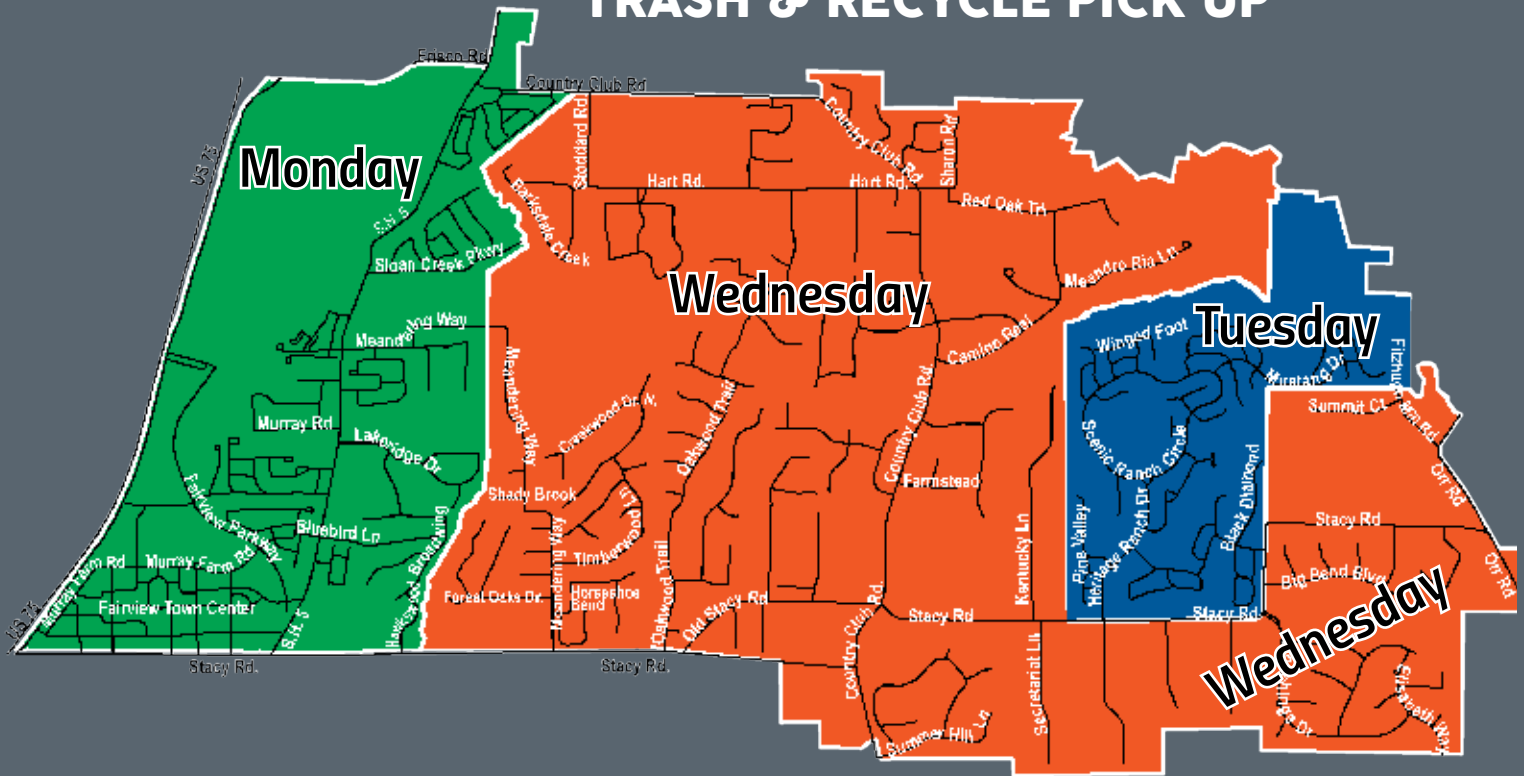
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Trash, Bulk and Brush Collection

COLLECTION SCHEDULES

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday if all items are placed inside the cart with lid closed. Please have trash and recycling carts out by 7 a.m.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week. **See #7 in the guidelines on next page for size limits.**

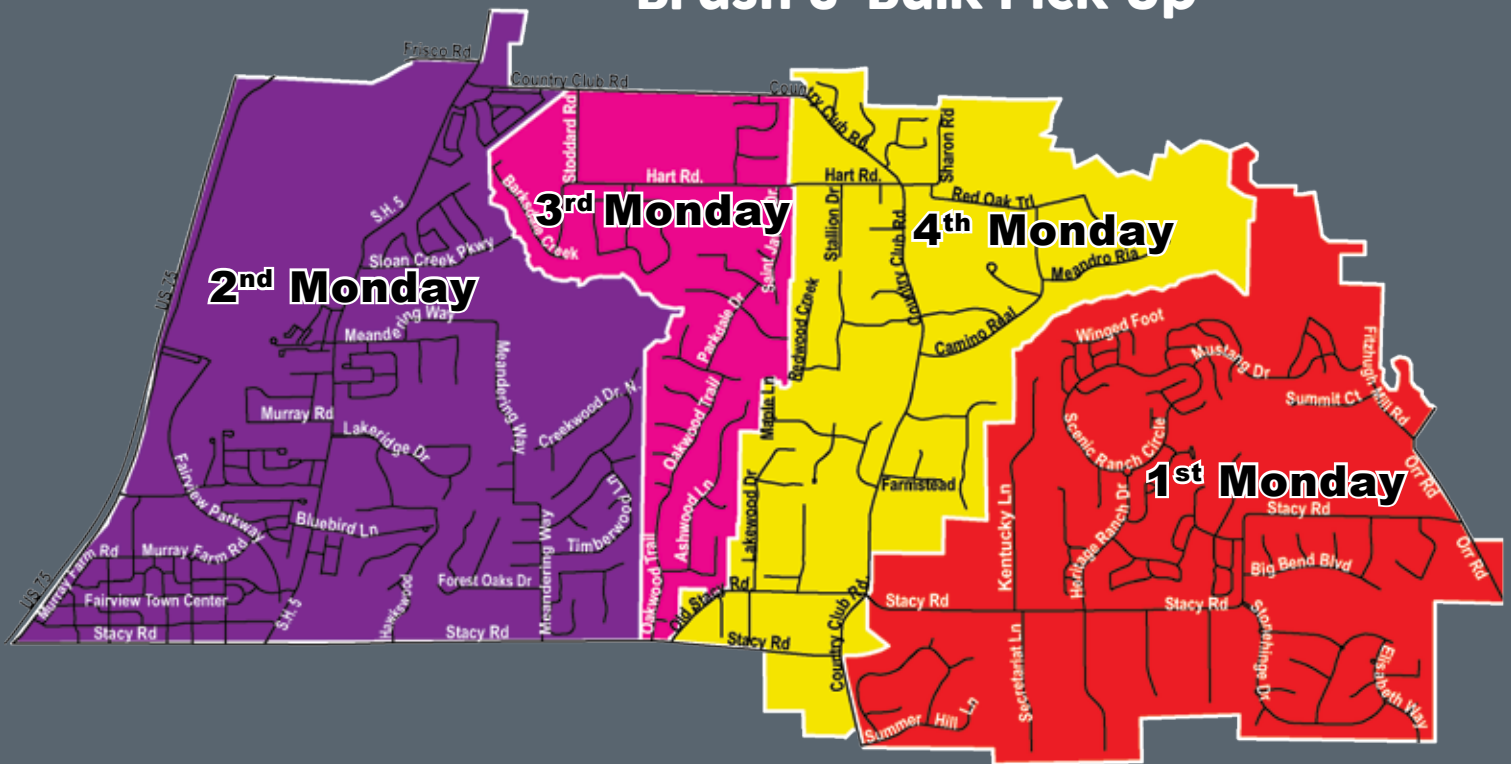

Brush & Bulk Pick Up



REMEMBER THESE SIMPLE GUIDELINES FOR PUTTING YOUR TRASH OUT

1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
6. Do not place any items outside your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
7. Bulk and brush should be cut in four foot lengths and neatly stacked, you are allowed 12 cubic yards per month, 1 cubic yard is approximately the size of a washing machine.
