FIRE SAFETY

The holiday season is quickly approaching, and the Fairview Fire Department would like to remind you of a few fire safety tips for while you are working in the kitchen this Thanksgiving:

- Always call 911 immediately if a fire occurs.
- Don't cook food overnight in the oven or on the stovetop.
- Don't leave a stove unattended while cooking.
- Keep children away from hot stovetops and flammable items, spills can cause burns and kitchen fires.
- Don't wear long sleeve clothing when cooking near an open flame.
- Never use water to extinguish a grease fire.
- If a fire ignites in the oven, keep the door closed and turn the heat source off.
- Ensure turkeys are fully thawed before frying; never deep-fry a *frozen* turkey.
- Always keep a fire extinguisher handy while deepfrying a turkey.
- Be careful not to overfill a turkey pot with oil or grease.



Dear Neighbors,

What beautiful weather we are having! I hope that you are able to get outside and try out the Town's trails.

A couple of updates on projects:

- The east side pumping station is now in service. All that remains is to finish the landscaping. The Town, in the event of some significant problem, is now able to handle the water demand for the entire Town from each of our pumping stations.
- The water line replacement in the Countryside neighborhood is complete. All resident water service has been moved to the new pipes. As I write this, there is some additional sod that needs to be placed and a culvert will be improved.
- The foundation for Fire Station #1 was been poured. If you go to the Town's website, there are pictures tracking this construction progress.

Peanut Butter Contest

I took another 462 pounds of peanut butter down to the North Texas Food Bank. Last year, Fairview residents contributed 238 pounds of peanut butter. This year, Fairview residents donated a total of 668 pounds! Special thanks to the Wooded Creek Villas neighborhood.

Elections

Early voting starts on October 13. If you want to see what your ballot will look like prior to voting, go to <u>https://apps.collincountytx.gov/BallotAddressSearch/</u> and input your address and the site will pull your precinct's ballot.

There is no straight ticket voting this time around, so you need to place your vote for each candidate on the ballot. The Town Council positions, the Town referendum on alcohol, and the Lovejoy School Board positions are at the very bottom of the ballot.

Early voting can be done at the Lovejoy Administration Building, the Collin College Administration Center at the NW corner of Medical City Drive and Hwy 121, and at a new location the Allen Event Center in the Village of Allen. On November 3, you can vote at Fairview's Town Hall. I strongly suggest that you vote early.

Mosquito Control

The Town contracts out each year to a company that sets traps up at five locations around Town. The traps and subsequent spreading of larvicide takes place between May 1 and October 31. Mosquitoes caught in the traps are examined each week for signs of West Nile virus. We have had a positive indicator once near Fire Station #2 and once on Meandro Rio. Larvicides were placed in both areas and subsequent tests have been negative. The good news is that mosquito season is just about over.

Covid-19

There has been a resurgence of Covid cases in at least 20 states (Texas is one of them), across Europe, and in several Asian countries. Even President Trump, his wife, and multiple folks in the White House and in Congress have been

infected. While it seems that death rates are down, this is still a very bad disease to get. It seems that in many cases there are lingering negative health effects. Be smart – wear your mask, avoid large crowds, and maintain social distancing.

Children Items

- I have had the pleasure of recently meeting several of our young people who have taken it upon themselves to gather up food for ACO. If you know of young folks that do good deeds like this, please let me know so that we can honor them.
- Lovejoy ISD is not providing some bus services that they had in the past. The Town is working to make the areas where our kiddos walk as safe as possible. As you are driving especially before/after school hours please be cautious, courteous, and watch for our children.

HEARD HAPPENINGS

The month of November is a great time to visit the Heard Museum because there is a lot to do and the cooler weather provides a great opportunity to spend more time outside.

In addition to Covid-19 friendly programs and events the Heard is hosting the 15th annual Dinosaurs Live! Exhibit.

The exhibit is open now through February. You'll want to be sure to catch the 46foot tall T-Rex and nine new life-sized animatronic dinosaurs. The exhibit always gives families and friends a fun, educational activity to enjoy together. See the dinosaurs move and hear them roar! Photo op and play area dinosaurs will be available as well. This year, the exhibit also features an outdoor fossil dig.

The Heard's indoor exhibits provide an interactive environment in which visitors can discover, enjoy and experience various aspects of the Texas natural environment. The exhibits also enhance the experience of visitors to The Heard by providing interpretation of natural events and found objects that might otherwise be overlooked or misunderstood when encountered at the wildlife sanctuary. The Heard Museum currently maintains exhibits on Texas' venomous snakes, rocks, minerals and fossils, seashells and marine life, North Texas ecosystems, a children's fossil dig, a marine room and more. Exhibits at the Heard Museum provide valuable learning opportunities for the more than 20,000 students who visit each year.

One of the most popular exhibits is Animals of the World. This exhibit emphasizes the importance of animals in nature. The Heard





currently provides a home to non-releasable native and non-native animals in exhibits that teach people about animals and the pertinent role they have in nature worldwide.

The Heard Natural Science Museum does not collect animals from the wild nor does it encourage such activities by others. Most of the animals living in captivity at the Heard Museum are abandoned pets or those that were illegally taken from the wild by people who quickly discovered that wild animals don't make good pets. Many of these animals were not cared for properly and now have health or behavioral problems; making them un-releasable; they will always have to live in captivity. The Heard Museum's mission is to inspire love and appreciation of nature in our visitors. Our hope is that these animal ambassadors will motivate our visitors to care deeply enough about the natural world to take steps to restore and preserve ecosystems here in North Texas and around the world.

Current animal ambassadors include Northern Racoon, Patagonian Cavy, Ringtailed Lemur, White-nosed Coatimundi, White-tailed Deer, Screech Owls, Sulcata Tortoise, Common snapping turtle, Bobcat and a Gray Fox.

While there are scholars who debate whether or not the feast at Plymouth really constitutes the first Thanksgiving and some Native Americans take issue with the depiction of relations between the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag people the general consensus is that in November I62I the Pilgrims hosted a three day festival the Wampanoag.

It all started in September 1620 when the Mayflower left Plymouth England with 102 passengers seeking a new home. After 66 days at sea the ship landed near the tip of Cape Cod, much further north than their intended destination at the mouth of the Hudson River. A month after landing the Pilgrims crossed Massachusetts Bay and began establishing a village at Plymouth.

Throughout that first winter most of the colonists remained on board the ship and only half of the original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring. In March 1621, the remaining Pilgrims moved ashore where they were visited by an Abenaki Indian who spoke English. A few days later he returned with another American Indian, Squanto, who taught the Pilgrims how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish and avoid poisonous plants. Squanto also helped the Pilgrims establish a relationship with the Wampanoag, a local tribe. This relationship endured for more than 50 years.

A year after arriving in Plymouth the Pilgrims first corn harvest proved successful and their Governor, William Bradford, organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the colony's Native American Allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit, because they had all helped the Pilgrims so much that year. This feast lasted three days and it is believed that Governor Bradford sent some of his men on a fowl hunt and the Wampanoag guests contributed five deer to the feast. Historians believe many of the dishes were prepared with traditional Native American spices and cooking methods. And, because the Pilgrims had no ovens and their sugar supply had run out the meal didn't feature any of the desserts, we are accustomed to these days.

Historians believe the second Thanksgiving took place in 1623 to mark the end of a religious fast called for by Governor Bradford due to a drought that threatened the harvest. Days of fasting and thanksgiving became an annual tradition in New England. And, during the American Revolution the Continental Congress designated several days of thanksgiving as well. In 1789, Washington issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation, saying Americans will express their gratitude for the "happy conclusion to the country's war of independence and the successful ratification of the U.S. Constitution."

Sarah Josepha Hale, noted editor and author, launched a campaign in 1827 to establish Thanksgiving as a national holiday; for more than 35 years she published numerous editorials and sent dozens of letters to politicians pleading her case. It wasn't until 1863 when Lincoln finally listened to her request. At the height of the Civil War, Lincoln scheduled Thanksgiving as the last Thursday in November. It was moved up a week in 1939 when President Roosevelt attempted to increase retail sales during the depression, but it wasn't until 1941 when he signed a bill making it the fourth Thursday of November.

Fairview Fire Rescue Participates in Covid 19 Antibodies Research Study

The Fairview Fire Rescue Department was contacted by researchers at UT Southwestern Medical Center to participate in a COVID-19 study. Researchers recruited first responders who are currently employed by a Dallas/Fort Worth region fire department and emergency medicine providers and have no health-related restrictions for work. This research study will have 1,000 participants enrolled over the course of about four months. Almost three quarters of the department volunteered.

The purpose of this study is to determine the percent of frontline providers that have antibodies to COVID-19 and no known diagnosis. In addition, the study will look at the number of frontline healthcare workers that develop antibodies over the course of the study. Antibodies develop after a person has an illness from a certain bacteria or virus. In the current pandemic of COVID-19, it has been suggested that a fourth of all people who catch the illness are asymptomatic. The only way to detect the disease in these people is through

wide screening or testing for antibodies. Unfortunately, there is no data to show that those who have antibodies cannot be re-exposed to patient with COVID-19 and not get sick. This is because there is some evidence that the virus changes its structure.

Research participants will do an initial screening for the antibodies and then 90 days from that date they'll be screened again. The second test will determine if the antibody count has changed any.

This is yet another example of our fire fighters going above and beyond the call of duty to help their community.



Record Breaking Year for PEANUT BUTTER DRIVE

With more than 44,000 food insecure children in Collin County alone. Hunger can be a hidden issue in any community. The cities and towns in Collin County worked together to help raise awareness surrounding the issue of food insecurity for children, families and seniors in hopes others will get involved in the fight against hunger. North Texas Food Bank set a goal of collecting more than 220,000 pound of peanut butter and with the help of Fairview residents they were able to reach that goal.

Residents Donna Crawford, Lorraine Shumuzu and Linda Turner worked with their neighbors in the Wooded Creek Villas neighborhood and collected more than 100 jars of peanut butter. In total Mayor Lessner delivered more than 668 pounds to the North Texas Food Bank. That was 430 pounds more than was donated by residents last year. Way to show up Fairview!

Due to COVID-19 the May 2020 election was postponed to November 3, 2020.

Honor a Loved One This Veterans Day




Memorial Stones are available for purchase to all Fairview Residents.

Stones are placed in Fairview's Veterans Park - an area that honors the men and women who have served our country in the military.

There are six monuments, one dedicated to each of the branches: Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard and Merchant Marines-so you can honor any military veteran. Stones with a gold star indicate the person honored was killed in combat.

Order forms along with detailed instructions regarding information needed to complete your order can be found on the Town website under the Top News section on the home page. The cost for each stone is \$200 (up to three names per stone).

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday. Please place trash in the BLUE cart and recyclables in the GREEN cart.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week.

2020 Holidays: Trash, recycling, bulk and brush will not be picked up on the holidays listed below; instead the collection will slide one day after the holiday.

January 1, New Year's Day May 25, Memorial Day July 4, Independence Day September 7, Labor Day November 26, Thanksgiving December 25, Christmas Day

Remember These Simple Guidelines For Putting Your Trash Out

- 1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
- 2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items out side your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Brush and bulk trash must not be more than 12 cubic yards which is equal to 4 truck loads.




