

Hello Gairview!

As I write this, our trees are looking glorious — I think this is the most fall color that I have ever seen in my 32+ years of living in Fairview!

Here are some things going on around Town.

AT&T Fiber

I am hearing of more and more of our neighborhoods being able to get AT&T fiber to their house. New areas that I am aware of with service from last month are: Kentucky Lane and the southern half of Oakwood. The staff and I met with AT&T in late November and reemphasized that we are expecting that the entire Town have access to AT&T fiber. Those of you on Summit Court will be getting fiber! AT&T continues to bore and pull conduit and fiber in our neighborhoods. They will commit only to completing the Town by the end of 2023.

Concrete Streets

The first concrete street in Fairview was Oakwood Drive — poured sometime in the mid-1990s. These streets are now about 30 years old and require maintenance. This is expensive and the Council has set aside monies in our budget to start dealing with this. As our Public Works crews are working around Town, please be careful when driving near them. Repair projects have been completed in Oakwood Estates and Sloan Creek Estates. Upcoming projects are in Thompson Springs and Ascot Heath.

TxDot Activity

Those of you who live along Country Club are very aware that TxDot is well into their project to improve the shoulders allow this road. They are replacing many converts under driveways and making improvements to drainage along the Fairview portion of this road. They will eventually be adding turn lanes at Hart and Red oak, in front of Sloan Creek Intermediate School, in front of the nature school, and a light at Stoddard Road. All of this should be completed by summer 2023.

Frisco Road

The interlocal agreement with McKinney has been sent to their Town Council for action. Assuming things stay on schedule, Fairview should be bidding out this project in February, 2023. Completing the relocation and expansion of this road is key for eliminating the traffic congestion in this area as well as for getting the Billingsley development started.

I hope that everyone is looking forward to the Christmas season. I see lights on houses and know of neighborhood Christmas parties taking place. There is a Reason for the season ... be of good cheer and remember to share the blessings that all of us living in Fairview have received.

FIRE SPRINKLER MAINTENANCE

It is critical that a fire sprinkler system be regularly maintained, including ensuring that piping is fully and properly insulated. Sometimes insulation settles or is disturbed by someone moving or doing work in the

or is disturbed by someone moving or doing work in the attic. In some rare cases, an installer may have installed inadequate insulation, as Town staff found in one home with broken piping several years ago.

To help prevent broken water pipes and the damage they can create, it is important to inspect fire sprinkler systems regularly. A good rule of thumb is to walk your attic at least once per year. If you see any *orange* pipe, then the pipe is not properly insulated, which could possibly lead to a break during extreme weather. If you are unsure what to look for in an inspection, ask the installer of your sprinklers to inspect the system for you. If your house contains an anti-freeze system, insulation is slightly less important, but additionally the anti-freeze solution should be tested annually by a professional installer to ensure there are proper amounts of anti-freeze in the fire-sprinkler system.

All fire sprinkler systems have shut-off valves; it is important to know where your shut-off valve is located. This valve allows you to turn off the flow of water to your sprinkler system in case of a malfunction. It's a good idea to know exactly where your valve is located and to ensure it's readily accessible. If it is locked, be certain you can locate the key during an emergency. And remember to make sure more than one person in your home knows the location and how to operate the shut-off valve. You never know who will be at home during an emergency.

Winter will be arriving soon in Texas and with that freezing temperatures. So, the Town would like to share some advice to help your pipes in the event of freezing weather. While broken pipes cannot always be avoided during the colder months, here are some tips that can help you prevent them:

- Cover vents around the foundation of your home.
- Insulate outside faucets with Styrofoam cover, rags or paper.
- Remove garden hoses from outside faucets.
- Wrap any pipes that are exposed outside or in a colder part of your home.
- Every adult in your home should know where your shut-off valve is located and how to operate it, in case of a broken pipe. Apply an oil, such as WD-40, to the cut-off valve before operating to prevent the valve from breaking.
- Inspect or have your Fire Sprinkler System inspected annually to prevent broken pipes.
- During a freeze, drip outside faucets 24 hours a day with approximately 5 drops per minute. This is necessary when temperatures are expected to be 28 degrees or below for at least 4 hours.
- Open cabinet doors under sinks adjacent to outside walls.
- If your garage is unheated, shut off the water to your washing machine.
- During sustained sub-freezing weather, let water drip slowly from inside faucets.
- If you are traveling and your house will be unoccupied for several days, shut water off at the property owner's cut-off valve and drain all outside water faucets.

If a water line breaks and the cut off valve does not work or you are unable to locate or operate the valve, call the Town's After-Hours Water Emergency Line at 972-886-4229 or Town Hall at 972-562-0522 dial 4.

During normal business hours, you can reach the Utility Billing Desk at 972-886-4242 for assistance.

Waste Not, Want Not – Fairview Waste and Recycling

The average household in Fairview generates more than 3,000 pounds of waste annually. That is the equivalent of throwing a Corvette out of every single home in Fairview, every year.



Fairview has had single stream recycling bins for many years. Single stream means you do not need to sort all of your recyclable material, the processing facility handles that chore. However, it still does require knowing what material can or cannot be recycled and using the recycle bin whenever possible.

The participation rate in Fairview, meaning households that attempt to recycle, is 40 percent. However, Fairview's recycling rate (the percentage of total waste that is recycled) has been falling for several years and is currently less than 20 percent. The national average recycle rate is 34 percent. Frisco, Plano and Denton are just a few of the cites that have a rate higher than the national average. (Please note all data is for single-family residences in the Town.) Reducing waste and improving the Town's recycling rate just takes a little effort some time to develop new good habits.

Reduce

Look at where your waste comes from and seek ways to minimize it. Buying in bulk and bringing your own reusable grocery bags can help cut down on the incoming materials that become your waste stream.

Reuse

Neighbors are often seeking boxes via the Nextdoor site. Boxes can be reused many times. What else in your waste stream can be reused?


Recycle

Become familiar with what can go in the recycle bin and develop good waste sorting habits.

Yard Waste and Compost

Rather than bag lawn clippings, leave them on the lawn and they will break down and nourish the soil. Reuse the organic waste that makes up a large portion of the monthly bulk waste pickup, such as vegetable scraps, leaves, branches or lawn clippings. Toss all leaves, grass and food scraps (without any meat or dairy) into a compost pile; this waste will become compost that can be used in your garden or on your lawn. Large branches can be cut for firewood for you or a neighbor. Smaller branches can be piled up in a corner of your yard. While piled they make great homes for small animals. Once the pile is big enough, rent a chipper or hire someone to shred the branches for you. The shredded branches make great mulch for your garden beds.

If we all work together, we can help make Fairview a lot greener.

Fairview Alarm Permit Renewals

The Town of Fairview requires all residential, commercial, and other non-residential alarm systems in Fairview, whether monitored or not, to have a valid alarm permit. Alarm permits must be renewed annually between January 1st and January 31st. Renewals received after January 31st will incur a late fee of \$12.50 for residential and \$25.00 for commercial and other non-residential.

New and renewal residential alarm permit fees are \$50.00, and new and renewal commercial and other non-residential alarm permit fees are \$100.00. If you have an alarm system and do not currently have an alarm permit, please contact Officer Sonia Golgoun at sgolgoun@fairviewtexas.org or 972-886-4211, ext. 5022.



COLLECTION SCHEDULES

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday if all items are placed inside the cart with lid closed. Please have trash and recycling carts out by 7 a.m.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week. **See #7 in the guidelines on next page for size limits.**


2022 Holidays: Trash, recycling, bulk and brush will not be picked up on the holidays listed below; instead the collection will slide one day after the holiday-unless otherwise noted.

January 1, New Year's Day - No effect May 30, Memorial Day - Roll Foward One Day July 4, Independence Day - Roll Foward One Day September 5, Labor Day - Roll Foward One Day November 24, Thanksgiving - No effect December 25, Christmas Day - No effect

REMEMBER THESE SIMPLE GUIDELINES FOR PUTTING YOUR TRASH OUT

- 1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
- 2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items outside your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Bulk and brush should be cut in four foot lengths and neatly stacked, you are allowed 12 cubic yards per month, 1 cubic yard is approximately the size of a washing machine.
