

Fairview Roads

Lots of things going on with our roads in Fairview.

We had our groundbreaking on our long-planned new road — Fairview Crossing. This fourlane divided road connecting the northbound US 75 access road with Greenville Avenue (SH 5) will replace Frisco Road and align directly with Country Club, helping to eliminate the regular traffic congestion in this area. It is expected to take about 10 months to complete this project.

Fairview also got good news from Collin County. The County is going to participate in the construction of Fairview Parkway. This four-lane divided road will eventually connect to Stacy and Medical Center Drive in McKinney. It will carry the traffic coming in and out of Fairview on Ridgeview and provide access to both the Fairview Town Center and the Billingsley development. We also expect that it will take some of the traffic off of Greenville.

If you drive on US 75, you can see that the Ridgeview Overpass construction is moving along. TxDOT is getting ready to place some of the beams that will connect the Allen and Fairview sides of this reworked overpass. On the Allen side, they are expanding Chelsea Boulevard and extending Ridgeview from Chelsea to US 75.

Fairview Village Road, which runs between the US 75 access road and Fairview Parkway, has been renamed to Latham Drive.

As one who has lived in Fairview since 1990 and been involved in the planning for these new roads, it very exciting for me to actually see them coming to fruition!

The Council:

- Approved the following items on the consent agenda:
 - a. Minutes of the April 4, 2023, Regular Council meeting
 - b. A resolution authorizing the Police Chief to apply for the 2023 COPS Hiring Program grant
 - c. An ordinance renaming Fairview Village Road to Latham Drive
- Received reports from staff, including updates on project tracking reports and department activities:

In hot summer months, it's tempting to increase the amount of water you give your lawn, but more water isn't always the answer to a healthier lawn.

In fact, according to the Texas Cooperative Extension Service, watering for longer intervals less often forces grass and plants to grow deeper roots, which helps them thrive as it gets hotter outside. Aim for one inch of water a week.

Watering less is also better for us. As regional population grows, our water supply experiences more stress.

Fairview's water conservation plan is designed to help maintain our region's water resources. The plan, which is codified in Fairview Ordinance 13.07, spells out specific rules for lawn watering:

Between April 1 and Oct. 31, residents are only allowed to use an irrigation system before 10 a.m. or after 6 p.m. You're also limited to watering with an irrigation system twice per week, regardless of the time of year.

If you have a pond on your property with a surface area of 500 square feet or more, the ordinance prohibits you from using Fairview's treated water to fill or refill it.

Other water conservation measures in the ordinance include:

- Requiring a shut-off nozzle on your hose if you wash your car at home
- Prohibiting all outdoor watering when it's raining
- Requiring properly maintained rain and freeze sensors and/or evapotranspiration or smart controllers on all new irrigation systems

Do your part to help keep your lawn and your Town healthy. Get personalized watering recommendations from WaterMyYard.org.

Native Texas Butterfly House and Garden Now Open

The Native Texas Butterfly House and Garden at Heard Natural Science Museum & Wildlife Sanctuary in McKinney is open and will welcome visitors through Oct. 1. Guests can walk among free-flying native butterflies and other pollinators in the Butterfly House. Guests will be able to view butterflies up close while learning about their life stages.

The butterfly house is regularly stocked with an assortment of native butterfly species, which varies throughout the exhibit. Guests may even get to see a butterfly emerge from a chrysalis. Inside the butterfly house, nectar plants are also

> available to feed the adult butterflies. There are even



a few host plants for caterpillars to feed on.

The butterfly garden is filled with nectar plants and host plants that naturally attract these lovely creatures. Guests may even find a few ideas to try in home gardens, which can help pollinators on a broader scale. From time to time, other species of wildlife that feed on insects or the nectar plants may also be found in the butterfly garden, including hummingbirds. This area is also a great setting for nature photography.

The Native Texas Butterfly House and Garden is included in museum general

admission and is free for Heard Museum members. The Native Texas Butterfly House and Garden is sponsored by NBC5. Learn more about this exhibit at HeardMuseum. org/Butterflies.

Whether your summer traditions involve making handchurned ice cream at home or enjoying gelato abroad, we want to help you make the most of the warmer season by reminding you of two things:

1. Vacation Watch

The Fairview Police Department offers a special watch program for vacationers. Fill out a form on the police department web page, and officers will provide extra patrols for your home while you're out of town.

As you fill out the form, you'll be asked to note:

- The dates and times you'll be away from home
- How you can be reached if there's an emergency while you're away
- Whether any animals will remain at the home
- Whether any lights will be left on in your home, and if so, where
- The make, model, color and license plate of vehicles that should be at your home. (Don't forget about cleaning services or pet sitters)
- If you have an alarm system, whether an emergency contact has an access code to reset it

2. Ban on Fireworks

Thousands of injuries are reported annually from sparklers and other seemingly harmless novelties purchased from fireworks stands. Many of those injuries involve children.

Fireworks pose a significant safety hazard for you, your family and pets, nearby structures and our natural surroundings. The Fairview Fire Marshal issues citations for violations of the Town's fireworks prohibition.

If you want to enjoy fireworks this summer, take in one of the professional shows organized by our neighbors in McKinney, Allen or surrounding communities.

Extension of Fairview Parkway Coming

In May, the Collin County Commissioners Court approved funding of nearly \$8 million for an extension of Fairview Parkway from the Ridgeview overpass to Medical Center Drive. The funding was allocated from the 2018 Collin County Bond Program, with bonds sold in 2022.

The remaining cost for Fairview Parkway construction will come from federal stimulus funds and private developers. The road, which has been planned for at least a decade, will fulfill the remaining major infrastructure needs for Fairview's commercial district.

Engineering is expected to be completed this year, with construction estimated to begin in 2024.

Groundbreaking Held for Fairview Crossing

On May 30, Mayor Henry Lessner and Town Council members Dr. John Hubbard and Gregg Custer led a groundbreaking ceremony for the future Fairview Crossing with Collin County Commissioner Darrell Hale, members of the Fairview Economic and Community Development Board, representatives from the Allen-Fairview Chamber of Commerce, staff from the office of U.S. Rep. Keith Self, representatives from the future Sloan Corners development and executives from Medical City McKinney.

The four-lane divided road will replace the former Frisco Road in northwestern Fairview, just south of Medical City McKinney and will be realigned to meet Country Club Road where both roads intersect with State Highway 5.



Funding for Fairview Crossing came from a federal economic development grant and Medical City McKinney, with the hospital, Collin County, the city of McKinney and the Billingsley Company also donating right-of-way for the project.

The Billingsley Company has plans to develop approximately 240 acres south of the road into a retail, office and multifamily community. Sloan Corners is expected to include 100,000 square feet of retail space and 4.4 million square feet of office space in Fairview.

Fairview Crossing is scheduled to be open to traffic Spring 2024.

Nixle Options Have Improved: Reduce the Noise While Staying Informed



Nixle is a communication system the Town of Fairview uses to notify residents and people who work in Fairview about emergencies and community events. Nixle sends three types of notifications on behalf of the Town of Fairview:

- **Emergency Alerts** (Examples include severe weather *warnings*, boil-water notices or a missing child)
- Advisory Notifications (Examples include severe weather *watches*, road closures or police activity)
- **Community Notifications** (Examples include special event details, like the annual hazardous waste drop off and drug take-back day, or general updates from Town Hall)

How many text messages do you tolerate before you tune them out? When severe storms pass through DFW, Nixle messages become more frequent to keep you aware. But what if your patience for notifications fades faster than the squall line?

We've got an option that may help: When you send your email address via text to 888-777, Nixle will automatically shift *advisory notifications* (for things like severe thunderstorm watches) and *community notifications* (for things like special events) to your email inbox, reserving text messaging for *emergency alerts* that need your urgent attention.

You can also customize when you receive messages. You'll stay up-to-date on news you don't want to miss while keeping your phone a little quieter. To customize your delivery preferences, go to Nixle.com. Then:

- Go to the "Account" tab and provide contact information for each type of message delivery you'd like. **Note:** On this tab, you can also choose to *turn off* notification during certain hours of the day or night. If choosing this option, be sure to select the "America/ Chicago" option for the Central time zone.
- 2 Don't forget to click "Save" to activate your selections.
- 3 Then, go to the "Settings" tab and click the drop-down menu to the right of "Town of Fairview" to select which types of notifications you want:

Alerts Only Alerts and Advisories Alerts, Advisories and Community

- 4 Check the "Email" box if you provided an email address and would like to receive email notifications in lieu of text messages for everything but emergency alerts.
- 5 Click "Save" again to activate your selections.



Girl Flees Circus

As the tale begins in 1928, entertainment is scarce in tiny No Name, New Mexico, a hamlet near Hobbs, New Mexico. Thus, when a small Wright Whirlwind J5 biplane runs out of fuel and descends on No Name's southbound stretch of the Carlsbad Road, this became the most enthralling news of the decade. Listen to

(and perhaps more), a brave interracial couple who own the town's diner, a World War I veteran who is gripped by PTSD, and a bigoted sheriff who has suspicions about the plane – and the pilot.

Six Weeks on the Throne

In 1966, a 19-year-old California surfer stowed away on the passenger liner the SS Iberia and circumnavigated the world in 79 days. Rick Frey, author of *Six Weeks on The Throne*, will share his adventures at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, July 20.

Along the way, Rick quickly garnered lessons regarding shipboard survival and how to circumvent port security officials while he traveled from Hawaii to Japan, Hong Kong, Singapore, India, the Suez Canal, Egypt, Spain, Portugal, and the ship's destination, England. Posing as a passenger during the day and sleeping undetected at night, he quickly realized there was only one perilous means to get ashore undetected.



Once he reached Britain, Rick encountered a more serious obstacle – a way back to the States without having a passport or even a driver's license. Once again, he stowed away, this time on SS Canberra, to cross the Atlantic and finally reach home.

Asked how that voyage transformed his life, Rick observes, "The adventure taught me that life is impartial; it's your attitude that influences your destiny."

A Musical Journey Through Texas Blues

Take an entertaining journey from the 1940s through the modern blues styles of Texas with the Wanda King Big Blues Band at 7:30 p.m., Friday, July 21. Listen to the tunes of T-Bone Walker, Albert

Collins, Clarence "Gatemouth" Brown, Freddie King, Johnny Winter and more.

Considered one of the cradles of blues music, Texas has been home to numerous pioneers and influential innovators of this genre. In 1947, T-Bone Walker released *Call It Stormy Monday (But Tuesday Is Just as Bad)*, which ushered in a new era for this genre. In 1961, Freddie King's "Hide Away" rocked America, and British Blues artists like Eric Clapton emulated Freddie's style.

Listen to the Karankawan music of Strong Wind (Alex Perez) at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, July.

Using a variety of primitive instruments, Strong Wind will perform the enthralling music of the Karankawa tribe. Alex is a

linguist and cultural advisor to the Karankawan tribe, which he observes, "carries a lot of responsibility and a necessary medicine in an ailing society." When asked what it means to be a Karankawan, Alex notes, "I attempt to serve as a good example of what it means to be a human being and bring my relatives back from the separation of our native ancestry, after having been removed from it for so long,

which created generational traumas. Our grandparents were taught to be ashamed of their identity as indigenous people. But I am in service to correct that misteaching."



Trash, Bulk and Brush Collection



There will be no solid waste collection on **Independence Day, Tuesday, July 4**. Pickup days for affected homes will shift for the entire week.

Residents who normally have trash and recycling collected on Tuesdays will instead receive pickup on Wednesday, July 5. Addresses that normally receive Wednesday pickups will receive collection on Thursday, July 6. Bulk and brush collection isn't impacted by the holiday.

As always, trash and recycling carts should be placed at edge of the street/alley no earlier than 5 p.m. prior to collection day and no later than 7 a.m. on collection day. Only household waste, grass clippings, leaves and similar yard waste placed in an approved container will be collected.

Key things to remember:

- 1. Carts should be placed with handles facing the house and lids opening toward the street or alley.
- 2. Carts must be placed 2 to 3 feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters or other objects that will obstruct the pickup arm.
- 3. Trash should be inside securely tied plastic

bags, and all bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.

- 4. Do not place hazardous waste in the cart.
- 5. Nothing should be placed outside the cart except for acceptable bulk or brush placed for pickup on your scheduled bulk and brush pickup week.
- 6. Carts must be rolled back away from the street after pickup no later than 6 a.m. the following day.
- 7. Bulk and brush should be cut into 4-foot lengths and neatly stacked. Up to 12 cubic yards of brush or bulk are allowed per address in a month. A single cubic yard is 3 feet long, 3 feet wide and 3 feet tall.


