## Women Veterans Day

Women have been a part of the American military dating back to the Revolutionary War, serving alongside men, serving as nurses, acting as spies and disguised as men in order to enlist. It wasn't until the last two years of World War I, when women were allowed to join the military on a volunteer basis. However, they, nor their families, were eligible for benefits through Veterans Affairs.

Seventy two years ago in 1948, President Truman and Congress passed the Women's Armed Services Integration Act allowing women to join the military, in a limited capacity. This afforded enlisted women, and their families, rights to receive VA benefits.

Between the years of 1975 and 2003, with the support of Presidents and Congress, women were able to enter U.S. military academies, authorized to fly in combat missions and engage in combat. In January 2013 Defense Secretary Leon Panetta announced all positions in the armed services must be open to women by 2016.

On June 9, 2017 Governor Greg Abbott signed Senate Bill 805, declaring June 12 as Women Veterans Day. And, it is on this day we commemorate the fearless service of women who have served our nation in the Armed Forces, and we honor our women veterans and their families for their remarkable sacrifices and outstanding contributions to our nation.

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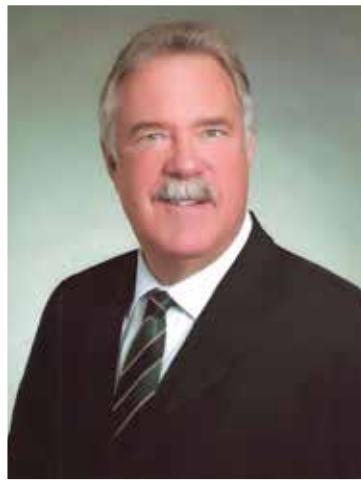
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# MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

*Dear Neighbors,*

Well, it is a beautiful sunny May 1st and the State is starting to open up. In Fairview Town Center, several of the restaurants are opening up today and will be operating at 25% capacity according to the governor's guidelines. Takeout is also available from all of these restaurants. Several of the retail stores are open for order pickup. You can get details at: [FairviewTownCenter.org](http://FairviewTownCenter.org). If there is no significant increase in the number of Covid-19 cases in Texas, then on May 15, there may be further relaxation of the State rules.

### **Covid-19 Status**

The Covid-19 numbers for Fairview remain the same. As of today, we have had:

- six cases
- three are recovered
- two are recovering at home
- one person has died
- there are eight residents in home isolation being monitored because they have had close contact with a person who has Covid-19

My heart goes out to the family of whoever has passed away. If there is anything you need, please let me know.

### **Parks and Trails and Council Meetings**

While things are opening up Covid-19 is still a very dangerous disease; there is no treatment for the symptoms, there is no vaccine and people in the DFW region are still dying. Please continue to follow the social distancing guidelines, avoid crowds and wear a mask if you go shopping. Fairview will continue to keep Town Hall closed to protect our employees and our parks and basketball courts will remain closed. Please for your sake and others – be very cautious still.

One good thing that I am noticing is that there is a large increase in the number of people out walking in our neighborhoods and on our Town's trail system. Be neighborly and say hi – but keep social distances and if you are walking your dog, please remember to pick up any deposits that the dog might leave along the path. I have heard from several folks in Town asking me to remind folks about picking up after your dog.

The Town Council continues to meet and tend to the Town's business. We now have had three meetings using a video meeting service and I think it is working well and I have received feedback from residents confirming this. Whenever we can meet again in person, we will continue to include the online video service so more folks can participate in our meetings.

### **US Census**

By now you should have been contacted by the US Census Bureau. Please take the time to complete the simple questionnaire and return it. I completed my census form online about a month ago and it took maybe three minutes. So much depends on getting good population numbers such as; how many Representatives we get in the US Congress and how federal dollars are allocated between the States. It is thought that Texas might pick up three new Representative this time, giving Texas the second largest delegation in the House of Representatives after California.

### **Groups that help**

Finally, as I have written before, please be generous with the non-profits that are working to help those less fortunate than most of the residents in Fairview. There are 30 million people in the U.S. who have applied for unemployment benefits.

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# Things to Plant IN JUNE

**FLOWER PLANTS:** Ajuga, Balsam, Wax Begonia, Blue Daze, Boltonia, Chocolate Plant, Chrysanthemum, Cockscomb, Copper Plant, Cosmos sulphureus, Gomphrena, hibiscus, Periwinkle, Portulaca, Purslane, Rudbeckia Hirta (Gloriosa Daisy), Salvia, Sedum, Stokes' Aster, Torenia (Wishbone Flower), Zinnia.

**FLOWER SEEDS:** Balsam, Blue Lace Flower, Castor Bean, Celosia, Cleome, Cockscomb, Coleus, Cosmos, Cypress Vine, Dahlia (Dwarf), Feverfew, Four-o'clock, Gaillardia (Blanket Flower), Impatiens, marigold, Moonflower, Morning Glory, Periwinkle, Portulaca, sunflower, Tithonia, Torenia, Vinca, Zinnia.

**BULBS:** Amaryllis, Canna, Crinum, Gingers, Daylily, Liriope, Monkey Grass, and Rainlily.

**VEGETABLES:** ALL Month: Malabar Spinach, Okra, Southern Pea, Sweet Potato, Peanut, Pumpkin. Start transplants indoors for fall tomatoes, peppers and eggplants.

## THINGS TO DO IN JUNE

**FERTILIZE:** Fertilize annual bloomers with 1 cup of balanced fertilizer per 100 sq. ft. Rich compost, manure tea and fish emulsion are some organic options. Yellowing leaves near the tip of Azalea shoots indicate a lack of iron. Check soil pH and treat with iron supplement. Feed roses and young fruit trees with a nitrogen fertilizer. Feed established annuals and perennials with a high nitrogen/low phosphorus fertilizer such as 12-5-10.

**WATER:** Water all planted areas deeply but infrequently during dry periods. Water outdoor potted plants daily.

**LAWNCARE:** Mow every 5-7 days, leaving the clippings on the lawn. Raise mower setting to reduce stress to turf in summer. Water during the cool of early morning. Avoid weed killers when temperatures are above 85 degrees.

**DISEASES/PESTS TO LOOK FOR:** Watch for chinch bugs in the sunny areas of your lawn, especially near streets and driveways. Call the Extension Service for recommended treatment. Bagworms and webworms can be treated with *Bacillus thuringiensis* (Bt). For scale insects, including mealy bugs use summer oil or horticultural oil. Check for spider mites; spray with insecticidal soap.

**PRUNE:** Remove spent flowers from daisies, daylilies, cannas and other summer flowers. Remove fruiting canes from blackberries after harvest. Tip prune new canes at 4' to promote branching. Prune dead and damaged wood from trees and shrubs as needed. Cut geraniums back plane in light shade. Do not prune oak trees at this time since the beetle that carries oak wilt is active now and may enter any cuts you make.

## OTHER THINGS TO DO IN JUNE

Prepare fall garden beds. Remove old tomato, pepper and strawberry plants from beds. Replenish mulch.

# Town Quarterly Financial Report For Quarter Ending March 31, 2020

Monthly financial reports are prepared for the General Fund, Water and Wastewater Fund, Solid Waste Fund, Debt Service Fund, Stormwater Fund and Fairview EDC/CDC Funds, these reports are presented to the Town Council at their monthly meetings. These monthly financials can be accessed on [fairviewtexas.org](http://fairviewtexas.org) by selecting Departments/Finance/Reports.

This report covers through March 31, 2020, which is the end of the second quarter of fiscal year 2019-2020; therefore, it is generally desirable for year-to-date revenue totals to have achieved 50 percent of the budgeted amount and expenditures should generally not exceed 50 percent of the budgeted amounts. However, because property taxes are primarily received during the first trimester of the budget year and other revenues such as franchise fees are cyclical, revenues will not always equate to the projected percentage. Likewise, total expenditures may not always equate to the projected percentage, because payments for contracted services, insurance and debt service payments are paid in lump sum amounts, while transfers to other funds occur quarterly.

## General Fund Analysis

Revenue collections in the General Fund thru the sixth month of fiscal year 2020 total \$6,808,161 and represent 72.7 percent of the total annual budget. Actual total collection this year is \$257,108 more than last year, primarily due to an increase in property tax revenue, and the sale of a fire apparatus is reflected.

General Fund expenditures total \$4,221,689 and represent 45.1 percent of the total annual budget. Expenditures are \$3,570 more than the previous year. Other expenditures for all divisions are within the acceptable range.

## Water and Wastewater Fund Analysis

The Water and Sewer Fund revenues total \$2,345,120 and represent 34.8 percent of the total annual budget. This amount is \$598,192 more than last year. Water sales were higher by \$591,010 and sewer sales were higher by \$53,942 than the previous year.

Expenses for the Water and Sewer Fund total \$3,014,671 and represent 43.5 percent of the annual budget. This amount is \$153,432 more than prior year.

## Other Funds Analysis

The revenues and expenditures for all the other operating funds are within an acceptable percentage range. Revenues and expenditures will be monitored and reported to ensure that spending will not exceed the approved budget amounts.

## Sales Tax Analysis

Sales tax revenue collections for the entire Town of Fairview (Town, Fairview EDC and Fairview CDC portions) thru the sixth month of fiscal year 2020 total \$1,799,923. Actual total collection this year is \$29,892 or 1.7 percent higher than last year.

The Town of Fairview received \$231,238 in sales tax revenue during the month of March 2020. This amount represents an increase of \$30,380 or 15 percent more than March 2019. Due to timing, the sales tax received in the month of April 2020 can be reported in this financial report too. The Town of Fairview received \$224,712 during the month of April 2020. This amount represents an increase of \$2,062 or 1 percent more than April 2019.

# CAPTAIN STEVE FRANK

Steven Frank, PhD, Captain at Fairview Fire Rescue (FFR) was honored at Fairview Fire Rescue Awards Banquet on January 25 in recognition of his 20 years of volunteer service with the department.

Several key elements of Steve Frank's life and career led him to Fairview and to his current calling as volunteer Captain of FFR.

Steve gained an early appreciation for firefighting as his father was a volunteer firefighter in Iowa. Steve's grandfather was the Fire Chief there as well.

A recognized leader in the scientific community, Dr. Frank is noted for nearly 20 years of service at Texas Instruments. A focus of his TI career was developing lower cost infrared imaging technology. One application was an infrared camera suitable for use in firefighting. The technology developed is still in use today. Dr. Frank retired in 2007 as Vice President and Chief Technology Officer for Infrared Products.

While developing the infrared camera, Dr. Frank and TI colleagues enrolled at Collin College and earned volunteer firefighter certifications so they could fully understand

the conditions and challenges under which firefighting occurs. In 1999 Steve took the advice of the Lucas Texas Fire Chief who was leading the certification program to volunteer for FFR since he was a Fairview resident.

Steve was 52 at this time. He attended the volunteer Fire Academy and achieved an advanced firefighting certification from the Texas State Firefighters and Fire Marshals Association. He gained even more experience about how thermal imaging cameras can help firefighters see through smoke and find fires as well as find their way into and out of fires. Steve was promoted to Lieutenant in the mid-2000s and to Captain a few years later.

The Town of Fairview employed a contract ambulance crew for many years and began providing apparatus space and crew space at Town Hall (now Station 1) in the mid-2000s. Space was later expanded to allow sleeping



quarters for a volunteer firefighter crew at night. Captain Frank was there every third night and also served as the overnight officer for several years after Station 2 was built and more paid Fairview personnel were added. Captain Frank eventually transitioned to administrative duties which he continues on a daily basis.

Congratulations Captain Steve Frank on your 20 years of volunteer service to the Town of Fairview and the Fairview Fire Rescue. We truly appreciate your service.





## Nifty Needles *donates* Face Masks

**I**n early April, Fairview Fire Rescue Chief Jeff Bell reached out to Fairview residents and groups asking if anyone could make 200 non-EMS face masks that were needed by Fairview Fire Rescue, the Fairview Police Department, the Town Public Works Department and Town staff to wear daily to help deter the spread of germs and the COVID 19 virus. The response from the Fairview community was overwhelming.

The Heritage Ranch Nifty Needles sewing group has been lending their talents to those in need for many years. This time was no different. President Jenny Sullivan mustered a group of at least 25 volunteers. They gathered elastic, which was in short supply, and fabric from sources throughout the community and the sewing machines began to hum. Hundreds of masks were completed in a matter of days and provided to Fairview Fire Chief Jeff Bell's office for distribution.

Cathy Swift, board member of the Friends of Fairview Firefighters Association, got the word out as well, and masks and supplies started flowing in and were coordinated with the Nifty Needles group.

# History of Father's Day

While a presidential proclamation declaring the third Sunday of June as Father's Day wasn't signed until 1966 by President Lyndon Johnson many scholars believe Father's Day has been celebrated around the world for centuries and can be traced back to the ruins of Babylon. Archaeologists uncovered a carved message from a boy to his father wishing him good health and a long life.

There are many theories as to who first came up with the idea of celebrating Father's Day, but most historians believe the modern day celebration, as we know it in the United States, can be attributed to Sonora Louise Smart Dodd. She was listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909. Sonora was close with her father, William Smart, and wondered why there wasn't a day to celebrate fathers.

Inspired by the woman behind Mother's Day, Anna Jarvis, Sonora started a campaign to celebrate the first Father's Day. She worked with the Spokane Ministerial Association and the YMCA and together they held the first Father's Day Celebration on June 19, 1910. Over the next five years Father's Day celebrations gained popularity across the U.S.

Seeing the growth of Father's Day, President Woodrow Wilson got on board and supported the

holiday in 1916 with President Coolidge supporting the idea as well in 1924 to, "establish more intimate relations between fathers and their children and to impress upon fathers the full measure of their obligations." And, it was in 1972 that President Nixon established a permanent national observance of Father's Day to be held on the third Sunday of June.

Over the years Father's Day celebrations have grown all over the world and is considered a secular holiday. However, in countries where the Catholic Church holds greater influence, Father's Day is celebrated on March 19 which is the Feast of Saint Joseph.

# HEARD HAPPENINGS



The Heard's sanctuary provides new and different experiences every day of the year. As you walk the nature trails you encounter numerous sights, sounds, colors, textures and patterns. You may also encounter many species of birds, insects and animals that have found refuge in the sanctuary, an oasis within the rapidly developing Collin County area.

The mission of the Heard Wildlife Sanctuary is threefold:

- Provide the best possible habitat for native and endemic wildlife species
- Train future land stewards and naturalists through habitat restoration and wildlife management
- Preserve functional examples of pre-settlement Collin County ecosystems. In part, the sanctuary exists to restore human connection to the land.

The Heard has been awarded The Audubon Society's designation as an important birding area. Texas has preeminence as a bird-watching area due to its placement on major migratory paths. However, The Heard offers special opportunities for bird-watching by providing a unique resource in a large metropolitan area. Dedicated volunteers aid The Heard in participating in on-going scientific work in bird banding and



annual bird counts.

You can visit [HeardMuseum.org/Birding](http://HeardMuseum.org/Birding) for the following (this is just a sample of what you can find on the site):

**Types of birds that can be found at The Heard including** – Canadian Geese, Wood Ducks, Blue-Winged Teal, Yellow-billed Cuckoo and Warblers; just to name a few.

**Second Saturday Bird Walks** – These bird walks are intended to help beginning and intermediate birders with bird spotting and identification techniques. There will also be plenty of opportunity for questions. Prairie, woodland, and wetland habitats are included in these walks. The walks begin at 8 a.m. and last for a hour and a half.

**Migratory Bird Banding** – Bird banding contributes vital knowledge of habitat use. More than 25,000 birds have been banded at the Heard since the station's establishment in 1978 and has provided information

to evaluate habitat breeding quality. The station shares data with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Bird Banding Laboratory (BBL) and participates in The Institute for Bird Populations (IBP) "MAPS" program (Monitoring Avian Productivity and Survivorship) by contributing our data to an international effort. MAPS measures reproduction on breeding grounds and combines data from the U.S., Canada and Mexico so scientists can determine global populations of most songbird species.

**Prairie & Timbers Audubon Society** – PTAS has monthly meetings at the Heard Museum that feature programs with guest speakers on topics of interest to birders. For additional information see their website at [PrairieAndTimbers.org](http://PrairieAndTimbers.org).

The Heard Museum offers so many experiences for everyone and now's the time to check it out. They are currently open during normal hours but ask guests to purchase tickets online to minimize contact and they ask everyone to practice recommended safety practices and social distancing.

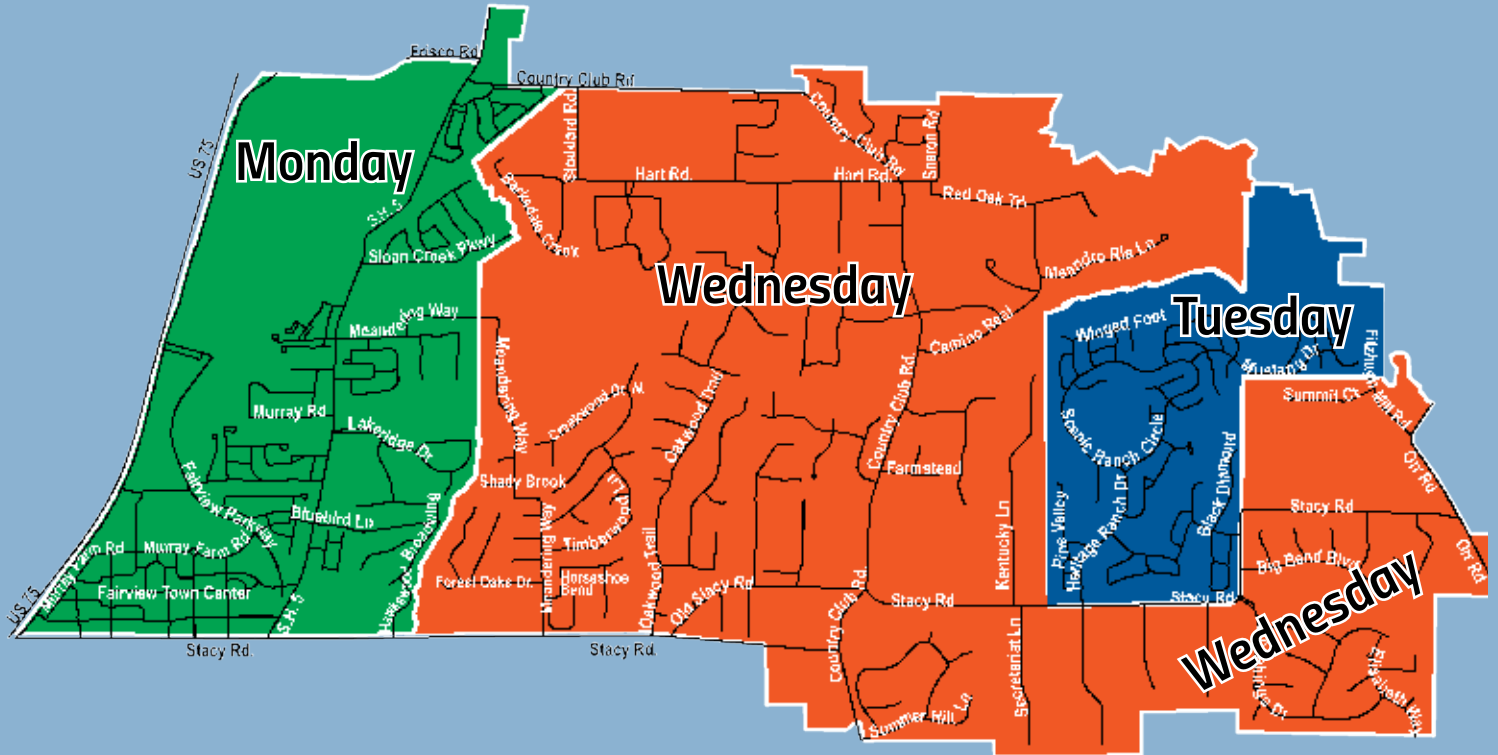

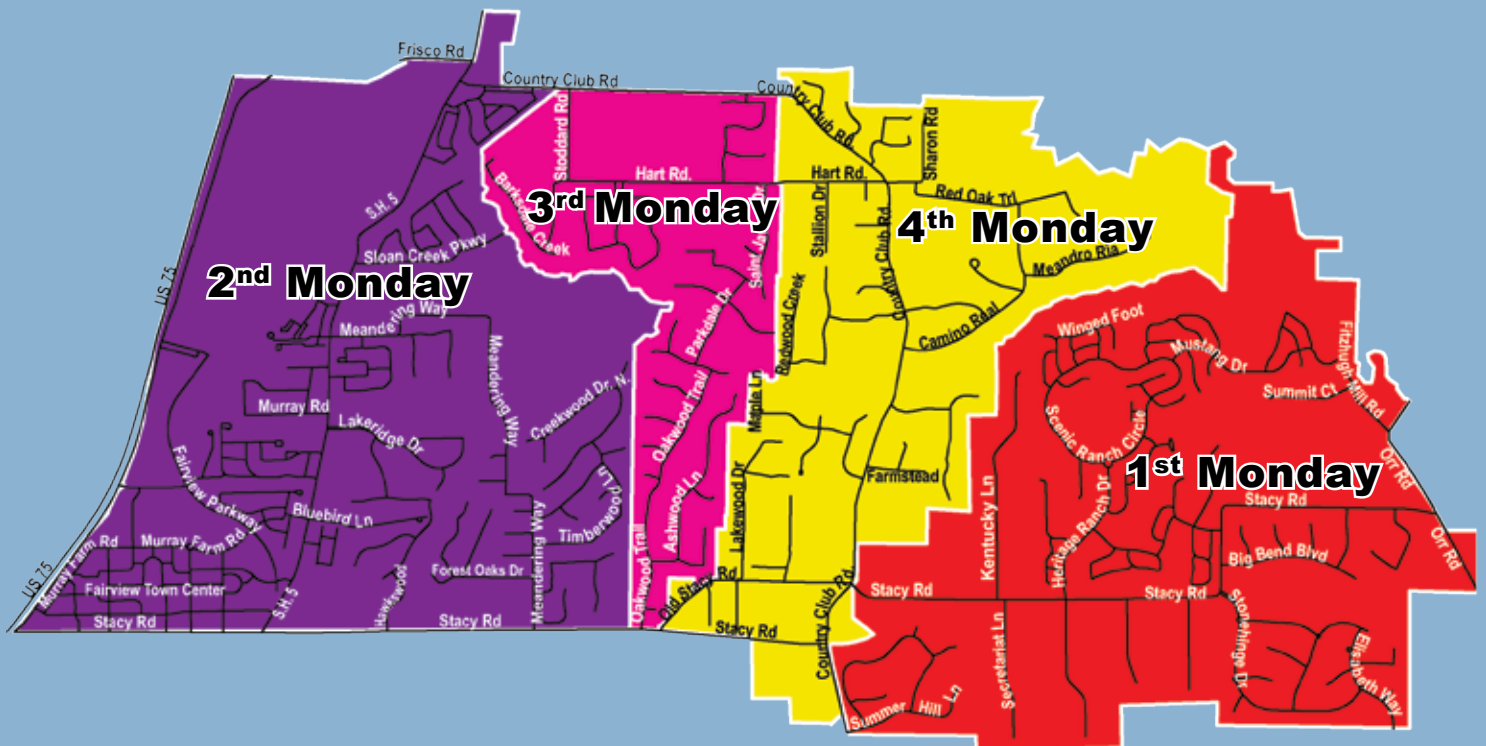

## Remember These Simple Guidelines For Putting Your Trash Out

1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
6. Do not place any items out side your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
7. Brush and bulk trash must not be more than 12 cubic yards which is equal to 4 truck loads.
