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MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

Dear Neighbors,

Spring is just around the corner! I am already seeing leaf growth on some of my trees.

This month, I give you an update on the fire station #1 rebuild and what we are doing with drainage issues in Town.

Fire Station #1

In May, 2019, by a 70/30 margin, our residents approved the rebuild of fire station #1 (FS#1). The approved cost was \$8.8M with up to \$7.6M in debt issued if needed.

At the January 14, 2020 Special Council meeting, our architect and engineers presented the detailed design drawing and updated the cost estimates. The good news is that the overall cost estimate was \$8,379,881 – with four options that could add up to another \$110,746. The options are: finish out two restrooms, enclose the dumpster, enclose the emergency generator, and have a brick exterior versus split face block. The Council will wait until we get further into the project to decide whether to add these four items into the project.

The project team was sent forward to develop the construction drawings and bid packages. The construction drawings are due at the end of March with the bid documents due at the end of April. We expect to have a guaranteed maximum price by the end of May with the Council approving start of construction at our June meeting. Actual construction will take about a year with a completion scheduled for June 2021.

If you want to take a look, the documents presented by the architects/engineers are on the Town's website. The next status check will occur at the April Town Council meeting.

Drainage/Flooding

Because the Town decided many years ago not to construct an underground storm drainage system on the east side of Town and in some other older parts of Town, there are some areas where water flows or lays on the ground for a while after large rainfall events. This is caused by surface water flows as well as the more difficult issue – subsurface water flows. These problems are being addressed by our staff as they are identified. Over the years, the staff has addressed multiple lot to lot drainage problems like this. Some examples of where mitigation activities are happening or planned to happen:

- In the Countryside neighborhood. When their water distribution pipes are replaced this summer, staff believes some underground embedment of the water main may help intercept and redirect some of this groundwater. This is a significant project and will bid out with construction is expected to start late this summer.
- There are two homes in the Domain neighborhood that have had sheet drainage coming off of the property behind their homes. Construction of fire station #1 will include site work that will take care of their concerns.
- In Fox Glen, our Public Works folks are going to replace a small bridge across Pecan Drive that has been affected by erosion.
- Outside of Chamberlain Place, there was an area in the road that accumulated significant ponding water after heavy rains. Our Town Engineer worked with the HOA to make modifications at the entrance that seems to have solved this problem.
- In the area just east of Sloan Creek Intermediate School, the Town is having the civil engineering firm, who had studied this area once before, return to see if anything has changed from when they made their initial assessment. The contract for this work was just approved by the Council at our February meeting. We expect to see some preliminary results by our April meeting with the full report due at our May meeting.
- In the Bluebird Lane area, the Town is currently working with residents to determine the source of their drainage issue that impacts their backyards.

To provide for more visibility into these issues, the Town staff will be recording all drainage problems and what is being done to mitigate that particular problem. One word of caution about this – there are areas where all mitigation activity needed is on private property. The

Town will provide suggestions/advice/coordination to the resident involved but might not be able to go onto private property to resolve the particular issue.

The flooding problem we have is along Sloan Creek impacting Fox Glen, Montecito Estates, the Heritage Ranch golf course, and potentially Harper's Landing. This is caused by large volumes of water coming down Wilson Creek from Celina, Frisco, and McKinney blocking the path to Lake Lavon for Sloan Creek and in some cases actually causing water to flow back up Sloan Creek. This problem is not going to get better because of the upstream development – which has already caused the FEMA 100 year flood plain to be raised such that we now have several homes sitting in the flood plain. All of the property affected along these creeks is either privately owned, in McKinney, or managed by the Corp of Engineers. We have been able to get the Corp of Engineers to work with us and they had several suggestions for the Town including having the Town request a study funded by the Corp that will look at the entire Wilson Creek drainage area (about 76 square miles). Our Town Engineer is working to put the documents together to request this significant study. This is not something that is going to happen quickly – it was suggested getting the study done might take two years - but we will continue to press this forward.

It is still dark in the mornings when our kiddos are heading out to school; please be careful.

COUNCIL'S CORNER

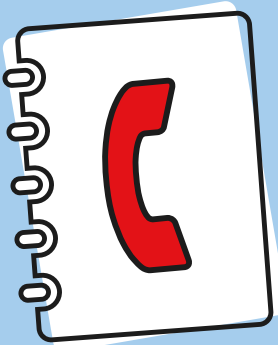
At the Tuesday, January 7, 2020 Regular Town Council meeting, the Town Council discussed the following items:

- Approved the following items on the consent agenda:
 - » The minutes of the December 3, 2019 Regular Council meeting.
 - » The minutes of the December 9, 2019 Special Council meeting.
- Received Monthly Financial Report – Period ending November 30, 2019.
- Received updates on Town construction projects.
- Received the Monthly Fire Report – Period ending October 31, 2019.
- Received the Monthly Police Report – Period ending November 30, 2019.
- Conducted a public hearing and approved an ordinance on a request for a Regulating Plan with Major Warrants for the development of an office building. The 8.72-acre site is generally located at the northwest corner of Murray Farm Road and Convention Drive and is zoned for the (CPDD) Commercial Planned Development District with the Urban Village Sub-district. Applicant: Trey Braswell, Kimley-Horn and Associates representing Village FV LTD
- Discussed and approved a Final Plat of the Field Manor Estates Addition. The four (4) lot, 6.0-acre site is located at the southeast corner of Stoddard Road and Country Club Road and is zoned for the (RE-1.5) One-and-one-half Acre Ranch Estate District. Owner/applicant: Joel Field.
- Discussed and approved a new potable water supply contract between the Town and North Texas Municipal Water District.
- Discussed and approved a resolution authorizing Town participation in a coalition of customer cities served by NTMWD.
- The discussion of Boards & Commissions was postponed to the February meeting.

At the Tuesday, January 21, 2020 Special Town Council meeting the following items were discussed:

- Discussed planning for fire station #1 including site layouts, building layouts, design elevations, estimated costs, bidding process, construction process and any related matters; and approved authorizing the consultants to proceed with plans completion and bidding for construction of the fire station and any related action.

Sunday, March 8, 2020 (at 2 a.m.) marks the beginning of Daylight Saving Time. Be sure to move the clocks on all your devices forward one hour the night before.

This is also a good time to change the batteries in all your smoke detectors.

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Lawson Principal Susie Towber leads a group of students through the school's new Sensory Path which not only helps develop their gross motor skills, but also serves as a method for students to learn how to self-regulate when they struggle with strong emotions.

Excellence in Education

You have to hustle to keep up with Susie Towber as she moves through the bright, expansive halls of McKinney ISD's Lawson Early Childhood School. The longtime Lawson principal proceeds like she's on a mission—and that's because, frankly, she is.

Towber is determined that every one of the more than 550 pre-school students under her care will move on to kindergarten equipped for the journey ahead—academically, socially and emotionally. Everything she does is pointed toward that objective, and she is surrounded by a staff of like-minded, motivated educators.

That outlook is the driving force behind the initiatives and programs that have led to Lawson being chosen for the second time in three years as an H-E-B Excellence in Education finalist. On Jan. 14, 2020, H-E-B announced five early childhood facilities from across Texas that have been selected as finalists for the retailer's 19th annual Excellence in Education Awards program that also includes awards for school boards and districts.

Since the program's inception, H-E-B has awarded more than \$11.5 million in funding to benefit outstanding Texas public schools. Each

early childhood finalist campus will receive \$5,000. To determine overall statewide winners, a panel of judges visits each early childhood facility, tours campuses and talks with administration, staff, parents and community members.

"I'm very proud of the work being done at Lawson," says Suzy Woodard, MISD assistant superintendent of elementary student support. "Susie Towber and the Lawson staff go above and beyond in every way to provide an excellent learning environment and positive culture for Lawson students. They really do outstanding work."

Winners will be announced at the H-E-B Excellence in Education Awards ceremony on May 3 in San Antonio. The winning early childhood facility will receive \$25,000.

Which is great, of course. But, for Towber, perhaps the greater reward is the spotlight that the award points toward the people who

make it all happen everyday.

“It’s such an honor to be nominated by H-E-B. Our staff, our students and our parents are so wonderful, and they deserve this. It’s so wonderful when people recognize early childhood education and its importance,” says Towber.

Lawson is home to the district’s youngest learners—from 3 years old to 5 years old—who participate in Early Head Start, Head Start (Bilingual, ESL, Monolingual), Pre-K (Bilingual, ESL, Monolingual), Early Childhood Special Education, Low Ratio Early Childhood Education and Preschool Language Program.

At the beginning of the 2019-2020 school year, Lawson changed its half-day Pre-K program to a full day program, allowing more students to attend. Inspired by the Ron Clark Academy in Atlanta, Georgia, the school has implemented a “House System” this year featuring the Houses of Kindness, Courage and Friendship, which serve to foster a more tightly knit community within the school.

The school’s STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics) Lab, which was introduced three years ago, provides a place for students to engage in open-ended, hands-on experiences focused on specific concepts such as energy or transportation. The Lawson team designed a teaching cycle (thinking, planning, doing and reflecting) to ensure success in the lab as students engage with higher

order questions, visuals, “I can” statements and reflective questions that help them grasp essential academic and social vocabulary.

This year, through a grant, Lawson added a Sensory Path that helps build neural pathways and helps students develop balance and gross motor skills, while at the same time offering an option for students experiencing strong emotions to de-escalate through self regulation. That is coupled with breathing techniques that help them learn to understand and process their emotions in healthy ways.

The Lawson team build engagement and community with parents through home visits, the Sidewalk Librarian initiative and IM-PACT nights (IMportance of Parents and Children Together), which bring Lawson families to the campus for a carnival-like atmosphere and activities that reinforce critical skills. Families leave with lessons they can use at home, and every child leaves with a book.

Admittedly, such highlights barely scratch

the surface of the work going on at Lawson.

It is a land in constant motion, and only the kids themselves seem capable of slowing Towber down.

As she passes groups of them moving through the halls in busy but orderly lines, she stops, and there is true joy in her voice as she calls out to them, offering greetings, praise and encouragement.

She just cannot pass them by.

And, Towber—and her staff—are on a mission to make sure the rest of the world doesn’t either.

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TYPES OF DEFICIENCIES

& their solutions

NITROGEN deficiency

SIGNS:

Yellow or pale green leaves, stunted growth.

SOULTION:

Add coffee grounds directly to your soil or plant nitrogen-rich plants near nitrogen-deficient plants. Common nitrogen-rich plants include beans and peas.



PHOSPHOROUS deficiency

SIGNS:

Darkening around edges of leaves, small or absent flowers, stunted growth.

SOULTION:

Add bone meal directly to soil. You can also add used fish tank water to soil if it does not contain saltwater. This water is also a good source of nitrogen.



POTASSIUM deficiency

SIGNS:

Leaves with brown spots, brown or yellow veins or yellow edges. This deficiency is more susceptible to disease and drought.

SOULTION:

Bury banana peels an inch into your soil. Peels take a while to rot, so this is a method that will slowly help your plants. Banana peels also deter aphids.



MAGNESIUM deficiency

SIGNS:

Yellowing of veins and edges of leaves. Can sometimes have a marbled appearance.

SOULTION:

Add epsom salt directly to the top of your soil before you water your soil. Epsom salt is especially beneficial for tomatoes, peppers and roses.



CALCIUM deficiency

SIGNS:

Yellow spots between leaf veins, blossom end rot, stunted growth, weak or dying stems.

SOULTION:

Add crushed egg shells into soil. This method will slowly help your plants, so make sure you till the egg shells well into the soil to help the process along.

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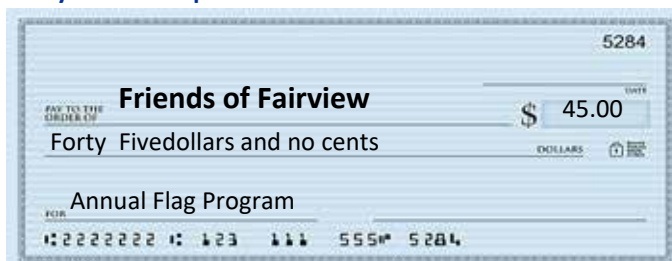

Fairview Fire Rescue promotes Travis Green and Nathan Janiga

Family, friends and colleagues gathered at Fairview Town Hall on January 3, 2020 to celebrate Fairview Fire Rescue promotions of Travis Green and Nathan Janiga.

Fire Marshall Travis Green was promoted to Assistant Fire Chief effective January 13, 2020 and retains his Fire Marshall position as well. Travis joined FFR in January 2006 as a volunteer and joined Prosper FD as a Full Time Firefighter/Paramedic in 2008. Around this same time, Travis became a volunteer Captain with Fairview Fire Rescue. He became a fulltime officer for the Fairview Fire Rescue in 2010 after relinquishing his position with Prosper. He served as a Captain for seven years and then became Fairview's full time Fire Marshall. He went through Law Enforcement Training and started our law enforcement agency within Fairview Fire Rescue to process arson related crimes and fire investigation within the Town of Fairview. Travis is now Fairview's Assistant Fire Chief/ Fire Marshal. He will keep his existing Fire Marshall duties and will also fully manage EMS and personnel related items within the department. Travis will be receiving an MPA, Masters in Public Affairs, Graduate Certificate in Local Government from UTD in April 2020.

Nathan Janiga was promoted to Engineer effective January 13, 2020. After gaining several years of firefighter experience in Minnesota, Nathan moved to Texas where he joined Fairview

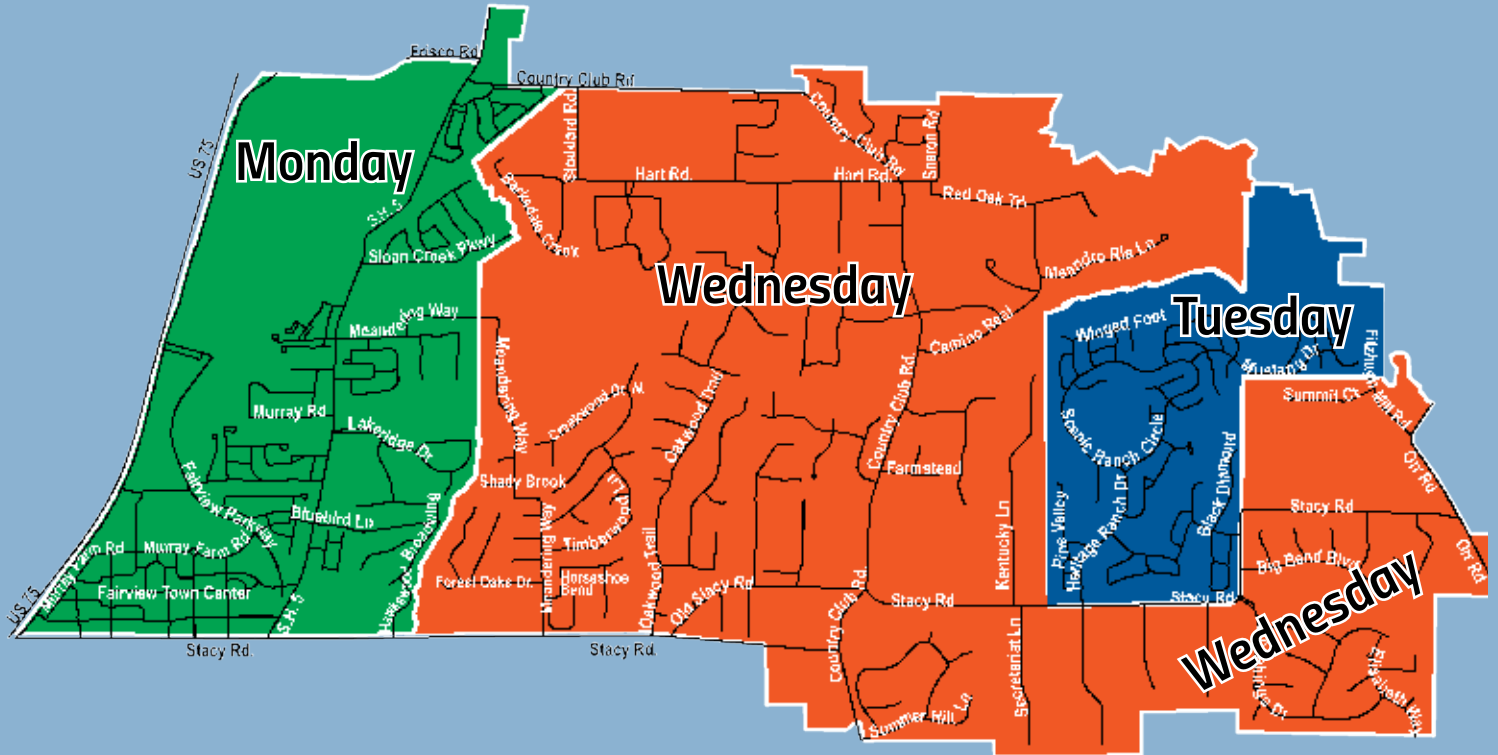

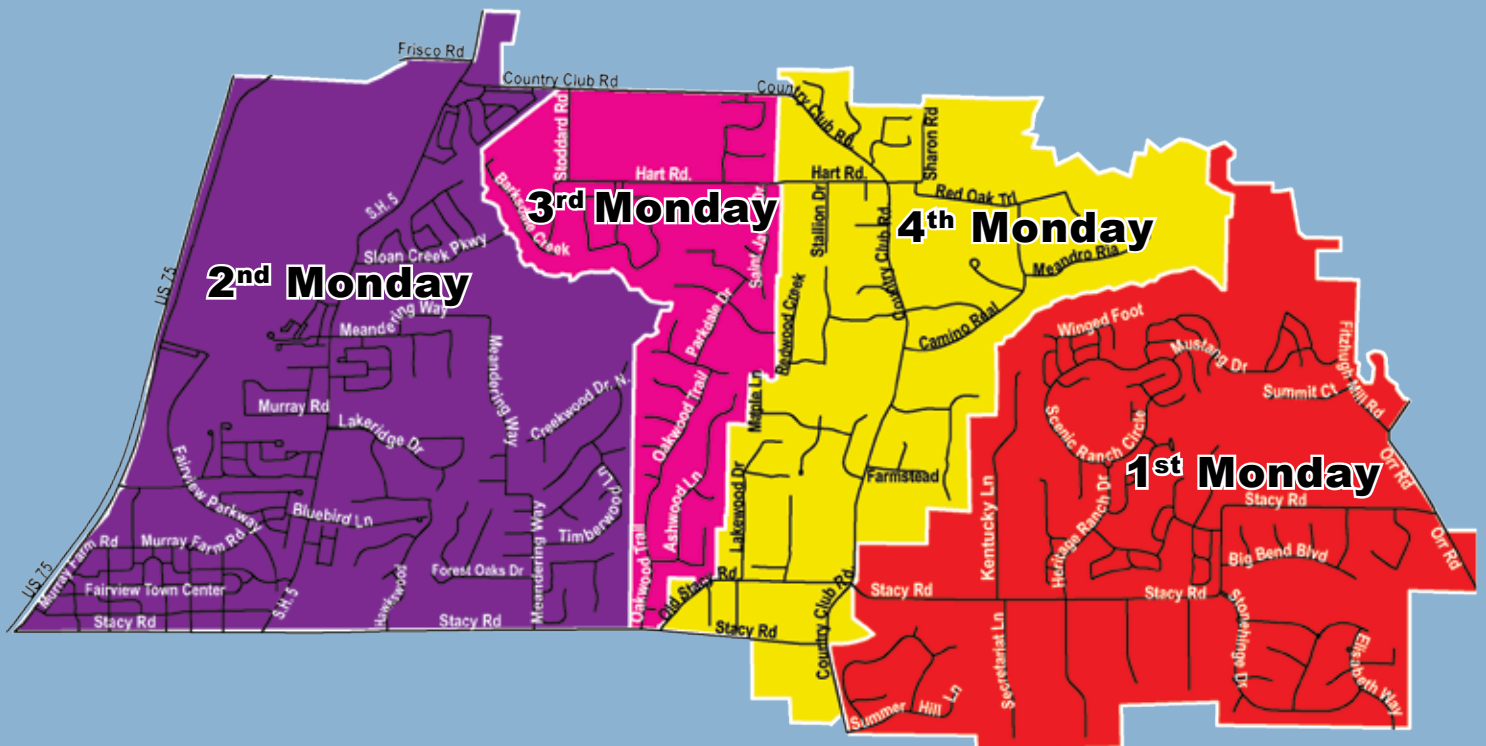

Remember These Simple Guidelines For Putting Your Trash Out

1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
6. Do not place any items out side your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
7. Brush and bulk trash must not be more than 12 cubic yards which is equal to 4 truck loads.

Medication can be disposed in its original container
or by removing the medication from its container and
disposing of it directly into the disposal box. Liquid
products, such as cough syrup, should remain sealed in
the original container. Caps must be tightly sealed to
prevent leakage. Intra-venous solutions, injectables and
syringes will not be accepted due to potential hazard
posed by blood-borne pathogens.
