

Hello Gairview!

I am writing this holed up in my house due to end of January ice storm. Thanks to our Public Works employees and first responders, our Town is well prepared to deal with this weather event.

Here are some things going on around Town.

Golf Carts

Recently, I attended the Oakwood HOA annual meeting. One of the main topics of conversation were Oakwood residents' concerns about the unsafe use of golf carts in their neighborhood. I heard stories of underage drivers — some were elementary aged children — driving on the streets without appropriate supervision. Please remember per Town ordinance, the driver of a golf cart or similar vehicle should be at least 16 and properly licensed, operate the vehicle only during daylight hours, and the vehicle should not be driven through our parks or on our trails or on public sidewalks. If you want to look up more detailed information about this topic on the Town's website, there is a good summary in the December, 2017 Town Newsletter and you can read the Town's ordinance 2017-22.

Frisco Road

The Town recently received bids associated with the reconstruction of Frisco Road. The Town Council will be reviewing these bids at our February meeting. This project relocates Frisco Road so that it lines up with Country Club Road and expands it to four lanes with a median. McKinney will also be expanding Medical Center Drive to four lanes — giving better access to Hwy 121. This project will help eliminate traffic congestion in that area as well as provide better access into the north side of our commercial area.

Dark Skies

In 2006, our Town chose to become a Dark Skies. Many of our newer homes are being equipped with outside lighting. While I prefer no outdoor lighting, our lighting ordinances allow for night time outdoor lighting. One area that I have recently had complaints about is motion sensitive outdoor security lighting. Security lighting should be shielded and directed such that it only illuminates the owner's property — not your neighbors' properties. Detailed information on types of allowable lighting can be found in Ordinance 2014-9-11B. A really good overview can be found on the Town's website entitled "Dark Sky Lighting Tips".

Townwide Work Day

On April 15, our Parks and Rec Board is planning on having a Town wide workday. There will be groups participating in picking up trash from our roads and parks, hazardous waste deposal, and paper shredding. More information will be coming out on this soon.

Lovejoy High School Senior Receives U.S. Presidential Scholar in the Arts Nomination

Lovejoy ISD has a strong legacy of excellence in the arts. Continuing this legacy is Simi Fadel, Lovejoy High School Senior, who has been recognized as a National YoungArts finalist. This national competition is one of the most esteemed visual arts contests for high school artists and is one of the highest accomplishments possible for an emerging artist. There are only 7 visual artists in the country being recognized at this level.

As a finalist, Simi was invited to travel to Miami for National YoungArts week, an all-expense paid week-long arts intensive with 150 peers to work with a faculty of professional artists, participate in interdisciplinary and media-specific master classes, develop her current processes, and join a cohort of fellow artists working to use their visual art to communicate with the world around them. Based on her work, interactions, and interviews while in Miami, Simi has been nominated as a U.S. Presidential Scholar in the Arts!

"The White House Commission on Presidential Scholars . . . will ultimately select 20 high school seniors to be recognized as U.S. Presidential Scholars in the Arts for their academic and artistic accomplishments, demonstrated leadership, community service and outreach initiatives, and overall creativity (YoungArts)." Lovejoy ISD K-12 Visual Art Coordinator, Brice McCasland said, "Simi's work ethic, commitment to her ideas and gifts, and independence is a wonderful picture of our program's mission for our visual artists. The humility, willingness to help others, and authentically leading by example has made Simi an irreplaceable leader within our program. This nomination and her work are mere



extensions of the brilliance that Simi brings to everything she is a part of."

Simi joins a legacy of fellow Lovejoy High School YoungArts finalists, such as LHS Class of 2022 Alumna Ella Reaugh, who was ultimately named a U.S. Presidential Scholar in the Arts in 2022. Being recognized as a U.S. Presidential Scholar in the Arts Nominee is, "one of the

nation's highest honors for high school students who exemplify artistic and academic excellence (YoungArts)." Katie Kordel, Lovejoy ISD Superintendent stated, "Simi is an incredibly talented, introspective artist who conveys deeply profound and personal concepts through her artwork. The entire Lovejoy community is proud and honored to have her representing the district on a national level. Congratulations, Simi!"



This month at the Allen Public Library...

Traveling History down the Vintage Roads

If you grew up in Collin County in the 50s, you may recall that Greenville Avenue or Highway 5 was a two-lane road called Highway 75. Earlier residents knew that this formerly served as a wagon road that Native Americans used prior to the arrival of the Anglo settlers.

Robin Cole-Jett, author of *Traveling History Up the Cattle Trails: A Road Tripper's Guide to the Cattle Roads of the Southwest*, will speak at 7:30 p.m. Thursday March 9,

at the Allen Public Library. This is a free event and will be web cast on ACTV.org by clicking on the WATCH button. Robin will discuss the once popular but now forgotten roads and ferry crossings of this region.

In this presentation, Cole-Jett will use maps to explore the former transportation routes and how they evolved or devolved. Using images from the Library of Congress, the Texas General Land Office, Stanford University, and other libraries and archives, she will take participants on a journey to uncover the history of these old roads. Information specific to Allen will be provided. Participants will be offered directions from the 1920 Automobile Blue Book regarding the drive from Denison through Allen to Dallas using the old King of Trails Highway.

Known as the Red River Historian, Cole-Jett has researched, documented and shared the history of the Red River Valley for over 20 years through her books and presentations.

Celtic Rock Band Cleghorn

Cleghorn blends original folk/rock songwriting with high energy Celtic fiddle and



bagpipe tunes at 7:30 p.m. Friday, March 17, at the Allen Public Library. Admission to the program is free, and it will be web-casted live at ACTV.org by clicking on the WATCH button.

Cleghorn features Texas southern rock with Celtic melodies. Original songwriting and high energy shows are among the band's most appreciated talents. Featuring John Cleghorn, Dylan Cleghorn, and Danny Rasaily, they have been acclaimed as charismatic performers who even go as far as leaving the stage to play among the crowd during their concerts.

The performances of Cleghorn have enamored audiences at the North Texas Irish Festival, Austin Celtic Festival, State Fair of Texas, Texas Scottish Festival and more.

The Celtic Music News review of Cleghorn's album states: "The robust and pristine sound of Dylan Cleghorn's fiddle is wrapped in heavy pop rock rhythms that approach anthemic intensity. John Cleghorn, adding his original songwriting, screaming guitar riffs and golden vocal melodies, reveals himself as a man who truly knows rock."

Cleghorn released their CD Celtic America in 2018.

While playing for the band "The Kangs", John opened for Cheap Trick, The Producers, Bachman Turner Overdrive and more.

Sponsored by the Allen Public Library, the concert is free.

Texas Dives

The word "dive" can conjure the moods of the Film Noir era by evoking pessimism, fatalism, and menace. However, author Anthony Head and photographer Kirk Weddle dispel those myths through their stunning prose and photographs in their book *Texas Dives: Enduring Neighborhood Bars of the Lone Star State*.

Head and Weddle will be speaking at the Allen Public Library at 7:30 p.m. Thursday, March 30. Admission to the program is free, and it will be web-casted live at ACTV.org by clicking on the WATCH button.

A journalist, Head offers notable insights regarding 12 of the state's "dives." Weddle affords the reader an opportunity to vicariously sit in the "dive" and get a close-up view of the bartender or waitress.

These establishments cater to ordinary people — entrepreneurs, the retired, and hard workers. And unlike national chains, the owners are typically on the premises. Dives anchor their neighborhoods by offering simple familiarity. Materials used to build the facility were typically purchased at the local hardware store or lumber yard during the 1950s.

Raise a glass to this enduring Texas tradition and plan to attend this program.

Jafar. What makes it fun is I get to play a bad guy and I can also be comedic. It is a really fun role".





COLLECTION SCHEDULES

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday if all items are placed inside the cart with lid closed. Please have trash and recycling carts out of 7 a.m.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week. See #7 in the guidelines on next page for size limits.


2023 Holidays: Trash, recycling, bulk and brush will not be picked up on the holidays listed below; instead the collection will slide one day after the holiday-unless otherwise noted.

January 1, New Year's Day – No effect May 29, Memorial Day – Roll Forward One Day July 4, Independence Day – Roll Forward One Day September 4, Labor Day – Roll Forward One Day November 23, Thanksgiving – No effect December 25, Christmas Day – No effect

REMEMBER THESE SIMPLE GUIDELINES FOR PUTTING YOUR TRASH OUT

- 1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
- 2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items outside your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Bulk and brush should be cut in four foot lengths and neatly stacked, you are allowed 12 cubic yards per month, 1 cubic yard is approximately the size of a washing machine.
