## FIRE SAFETY

The holiday season is quickly approaching, and the Fairview Fire Department would like to remind you of a few fire safety tips for while you are working in the kitchen this Thanksgiving:

- Always call 911 immediately if a fire occurs.
- Don't cook food overnight in the oven or on the stovetop.
- Don't leave a stove unattended while cooking.
- Keep children away from hot stovetops and flammable items, spills can cause burns and kitchen fires.
- Don't wear long sleeve clothing when cooking near an open flame.
- Never use water to extinguish a grease fire.
- If a fire ignites in the oven, keep the door closed and turn the heat source off.
- Ensure turkeys are fully thawed before frying; never deep-fry a *frozen* turkey.
- Always keep a fire extinguisher handy while deepfrying a turkey.
- Be careful not to overfill a turkey pot with oil or grease.

Dear Neighbors,

Welcome to fall! This is my favorite time of year with warm days with totally clear blue skies and cool evenings. High school and college football are under way. Tell those Lovejoy Leopards to keep up the good work – they are 6-0 (as of Oct. 11) and winning by big margins.

Here are some things going on around Town.

#### **Peanut Butter Challenge**

So far, we have taken 1,012 pounds of peanut butter down to the North Texas Food Bank! This is about 400 pounds more than last year! Good food to help feed hungry people. Thanks to everyone who has donated. A special thanks to Dennie and Ruth Swingle who helped me take all the peanut butter down to the NTFB and to the folks in Wooded Creek Villas. For the second year, Wooded Creek Villas made collecting peanut butter a neighborhood event.

#### **Fairview Town Center**

If you are on the FTC Facebook page you will see that Lincoln Properties recently reopened the fountains in the back by Glorias and Pie314. The fountains had suffered major damage due to the cold snap in February. Thanks to the folks at FTC for getting this popular venue back online.

#### **Drainage Projects**

Countryside: Discussions continue with the most impacted property owners trying to work out a solution acceptable to all three of them. When the project is finally agreed on, our Public Works folks will be doing the actual construction. Several months ago, Public Works took immediate action when we learned that one of the houses along Home Place had water coming into their house.

Fox Glen: The Town Council just reviewed and approved the proposal from Huitt-Zollars that will upgrade the drainage system in this neighborhood. Another neighborhood meeting will be held sometime later in October to share the plan with the residents and get their feedback.

#### **Town Charter Revision**

Over the years, various Town Councilmembers have talked about revising the term limits section of our Town Charter. As things are today, council members and the mayor can serve for three consecutive two-year terms for a total of six years. They can run again if they lay out for one year. What I think will be coming out of the Council will be to change the term length to three years with the ability to serve two consecutive terms for a total of six years. They can run again if they lay out one year.

Today elections are held every year. On even numbered years (like 2022), Council seats 2, 4, and 6 are elected. On odd numbered years (like 2023), seats 1, 3, 5, and the mayor are elected. The proposed change will probably have seats 2, 4, and 6 running in 2022 for three-year terms. In 2023, seats 1, 3, and 5, and the mayor running for three-year terms. There would be no town election in 2024. The cycle would repeat itself starting in 2025.

If Council approves them, these changes would be on the May 2022 ballot.

# MESSAGE MAYOR

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#### Why make these changes?

- If you ask someone who has served on the Council, it typically takes about two budget cycles before they start to really understand how municipal finances work. So today, after a year and a half on the Council, that person would have to run again and if they were to be defeated, that knowledge and understanding is lost.
- There can be a significant cost to run for our elected offices. Instead of having to spend that money every two years, this cost would be incurred every three years. Remember these elected positions are volunteer. There is no compensation in any form.
- There would be one year when our lawns and street corners would not be cluttered with town election campaign signs.
- I think there is a bit of election weariness. There would be year when there isn't a town election.

I expect to see the updated language of this proposal at our November Council meeting. If the Council decides to go forward with these changes and put the changes on the May 2022 ballot, the Town will have information in this Newsletter in future months.

#### **Christmas Tree Lighting**

Come out on December 2 at 6 p.m. to participate in our annual Christmas Tree lighting! This happens on the west steps of Town Hall. There will be singers, youth groups, and hot chocolate and cookies - everything you need to get into the holiday spirit!

#### **Tree Trimming**

I have seen ONCOR doing tree trimming in Fairview along Highway 5 and FM1378 during the past two weeks. Obviously, they are doing this to help make our electric service delivery more reliable. There is another thing that trimming trees might do for some of us – let more sunlight down onto your grass. I have two places in my yard – one in the front and one in the back – where very little sunlight gets through the leaves and no grass will grow. I have been trimming limbs off in the front yard as I would like that area to look as nice as possible so now the grass will get more sunlight. In the back yard, the bald spot in my yard is under a very large tree that provides a lot of privacy so I am not going to trim this tree. There are places in Town where drainage issues are blamed for grass not growing in yards. Many of these yards are under very large trees. I would suggest that in those yards if you want grass to grow, get a professional tree company to look and see if they can suggest ways to get more sunlight down to the grass. Advanced Tree and Shrub Care is a Fairview owned and operated company that I have used in the past.

As we get close to our holiday season, remember that there any many more folks in our area that need some sort of assistance. When you give – give locally. All Community Outreach, Treasured Vessels, the North Texas Veterans Center, the North Texas Food Bank, and the Samaritan Inn are few of the many outstanding non-profits in Collin County that are available to help our friends and neighbors. We who are so fortunate to live in a place like Fairview need to give generously.

Get outside and enjoy the pretty days of fall! And why not go take a hike at the Heard Museum?

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# the history of While there feast at Ply and some Thanksgiving

While there are scholars who debate whether or not the feast at Plymouth really constitutes the first Thanksgiving and some Native Americans take issue with the depiction

of relations between the Pilgrims and the Wampanoag people the general consensus is that in November 1621 the Pilgrims hosted a three day festival the Wampanoag.

It all started in September 1620 when the Mayflower left Plymouth England with 102 passengers seeking a new home. After 66 days at sea the ship landed near the tip of Cape Cod, much further north than their intended destination at the mouth of the Hudson River. A month after landing the Pilgrims crossed Massachusetts Bay and began establishing a village at Plymouth.

Throughout that first winter most of the colonists remained on board the ship and only half of the original passengers and crew lived to see their first New England spring. In March 1621, the remaining Pilgrims moved ashore where they were visited by an Abenaki Indian who spoke English. A few days later he returned with another American Indian, Squanto, who taught the Pilgrims how to cultivate corn, extract sap from maple trees, catch fish and avoid poisonous plants. Squanto also helped the Pilgrims establish a relationship with the Wampanoag, a local tribe. This relationship endured for more than 50 years.

A year after arriving in Plymouth the Pilgrims first corn harvest proved successful and their Governor, William Bradford, organized a celebratory feast and invited a group of the colony's Native American Allies, including the Wampanoag chief Massasoit, because they had all helped the Pilgrims so much that year. This feast lasted three days and it is believed that Governor Bradford sent some of his men on a fowl hunt and the Wampanoag guests contributed five deer to the feast. Historians believe many of the dishes were prepared with traditional Native American spices and cooking methods. And, because the Pilgrims had no ovens and their sugar supply had run out the meal didn't feature any of the desserts, we are accustomed to these days.

Historians believe the second Thanksgiving took place in 1623 to mark the end of a religious fast called for by Governor Bradford due to a drought that threatened the harvest. Days of fasting and thanksgiving became an annual tradition in New England. And, during the American Revolution the Continental Congress designated several days of thanksgiving as well. In 1789, Washington issued the first Thanksgiving proclamation, saying Americans will express their gratitude for the "happy conclusion to the country's war of independence and the successful ratification of the U.S. Constitution."

Sarah Josepha Hale, noted editor and author, launched a campaign in 1827 to establish Thanksgiving as a national holiday; for more than 35 years she published numerous editorials and sent dozens of letters to politicians pleading her case. It wasn't until 1863 when Lincoln finally listened to her request. At the height of the Civil War, Lincoln scheduled Thanksgiving as the last Thursday in November. It was moved up a week in 1939 when President Roosevelt attempted to increase retail sales during the depression, but it wasn't until 1941 when he signed a bill making it the fourth Thursday of November.

The Town of Fairview Town Council, board members, committee members and staff wish you all a very happy and safe Thanksgiving.

## HEARD HAPPENINGS

The month of November is a great time to visit the Heard Museum because there is a lot to do and the cooler weather provides a great opportunity to spend more time outside. The Heard is hosting the 16th annual Dinosaurs Live! Exhibit.

The exhibit is open now through February. You'll want to be sure to catch the 46-foot tall T-Rex and nine new life-sized animatronic dinosaurs. The exhibit always gives families and friends a fun, educational activity to enjoy together. See the dinosaurs move and hear them roar! Photo op and play area dinosaurs will be available as well. This year, the exhibit also features an outdoor fossil dig.

The Heard's indoor exhibits provide an interactive environment in which visitors can discover, enjoy and experience various aspects of the Texas natural environment. The exhibits also enhance the experience of visitors to The Heard by providing interpretation of natural events and found objects that might otherwise be overlooked or misunderstood when encountered at the wildlife sanctuary. The Heard Museum currently maintains exhibits on



Texas' venomous snakes, rocks, minerals and fossils, seashells and marine life, North Texas ecosystems, a children's fossil dig, a marine room and more. Exhibits at the Heard Museum provide valuable learning opportunities for the more than 20,000 students who visit each year.

One of the most popular exhibits is Animals of the World. This exhibit emphasizes the importance of animals in nature. The Heard currently provides a home to non-releasable native and non-native animals in exhibits that teach people about animals and the pertinent role they have in nature worldwide.

The Heard Natural Science Museum does not collect animals from the wild nor does it encourage such activities by others. Most of the animals living in captivity at the Heard Museum are abandoned pets or those that were illegally taken from the wild by people who quickly discovered that wild animals don't make good pets. Many of these animals were not cared for properly and now have health or behavioral problems; making them un-releasable; they will always have to live in captivity. The Heard Museum's mission is to inspire love and appreciation of nature in our visitors. Our hope is that these animal ambassadors will motivate our visitors to care deeply enough about the natural world to take steps to restore and preserve ecosystems here in North Texas and around the world.

Current animal ambassadors include Northern Racoon, Patagonian Cavy, Ringtailed Lemur, White-nosed Coatimundi, Whitetailed Deer, Screech Owls, Sulcata Tortoise, Common snapping turtle, Bobcat and a Gray Fox.

### **DAYLIGHT SAVING SAFETY**

Daylight Saving Time ends on Sunday, November 7 at 2:00 a.m. So, as we fall back an hour, it is important to realize that more joggers and cyclists will be on residential roads during night hours. Studies have found that car accidents go up after we turn the clocks back. In addition to decreased visibility, commuting in the dark makes drivers drowsier than usual. Below are some tips for staying safe both outside and on the road.

#### **TIPS FOR DRIVERS:**

- As a driver, assume people are on the streets at all hours.
- Clean headlights, taillights, signal lights, mirror faces and windows once a week. Clean your windows on the inside and outside.
- Make sure headlights are properly aimed, misaimed headlights blind other drivers and reduce your ability to see the road.
- If there is any doubt of visibility, turn your headlights on. Remember that being seen is as important as seeing.
- Reduce your speed and increase your following distance at night.
- Avoid glare from oncoming bright headlights by watching the right edge of the road and using that as your steering guide.
- If you have car trouble, pull off the road as far as possible. Turn on emergency flashers and the interior dome light. Stay off the roadway and get passengers away from the area.

#### **TIPS FOR PEDESTRIANS:**

- Wear light colored clothing.
- Carry a small LED flashlight in your hand and point it at the ground as you travel. A quick wave of the light at any approaching car may get the driver's attention.
- Ensure bike safety reflectors and lights are working properly.
- Stay alert. If you use a headset, keep the volume low enough that you can still hear oncoming traffic.
- Remember that riding or running down the middle of the road puts you in harm's way and decreases reaction time.
- If you are uncomfortable with oncoming traffic, stop and step off the road and wait for vehicles to pass. Do not try to keep moving on dark or uneven ground.
- If you bring your dog(s) at night, keep them on a short leash in the presence of oncoming traffic.

TIP: When you change your clocks, it is also a great time to remember to change the batteries in smoke alarms and carbon monoxide detectors.

**Bulk waste and loose brush** are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week. **See #7 in the guidelines below for size** *limits.* 

**2021 Holidays:** Trash, recycling, bulk and brush will not be picked up on the holidays listed below; instead the collection will slide one day after the holiday-unless otherwise noted.

#### **Remember These Simple Guidelines For Putting Your Trash Out**

- 1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
- 2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items out side your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Brush and bulk trash must not be more than 12 cubic yards which is equal to 4 pick-up truck loads.
