Every year in October the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) along with local fire departments host Fire Prevention Week (FPW). This year's FPW campaign, "Learn the Sounds of Fire Safety" will be held October 3-9. The campaign works to educate everyone about the different sounds the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms make. Knowing what to do when an alarm sounds will keep you and your family safe – Hear a Beep, Get on Your Feet! Hear a Chirp, Make a Change.

Is there a beep or a chirp coming out of your smoke or carbon monoxide alarm? What does it all mean? Knowing the difference can save you, your home, and your family! Make sure everyone in the home understands the sounds of the smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and knows how to respond. Learn the sounds of your smoke and carbon monoxide alarms by checking the user guide or search the brand and model online.

Since 1922, the NFPA has sponsored the public observance of Fire Prevention Week. In 1925, President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed Fire Prevention Week a national observance, making it the longest-running public health observance in the country. During Fire Prevention Week, children, adults, and teachers learn how to stay safe in case of a fire. Firefighters provide lifesaving public education in an effort to drastically decrease casualties caused by fires.

Fire Prevention Week is observed each year during the week of October 9th in commemoration of the Great Chicago Fire, which began on October 8, 1871, and caused devastating damage. This horrific fire killed more than 250 people, left 100,000 homeless, destroyed more than 17,400 structures and burned more than 2,000 acres of land.

In a fire, mere seconds can mean the difference between a safe escape and a tragedy. Fire safety education isn't just for school children. Teenagers, adults, and the elderly are also at risk in fires, making it important for every member of the community to take some time every October during Fire Prevention Week to make sure they understand how to stay safe in case of a fire.

According to NFPA children under 5 and adults over 65 are at the highest risk for injury or death in a fire; however, people of all ages are vulnerable. In fact, the risk of a nonfatal fire injury is highest for those between 20 and 49, showing that fire safety education is essential for everyone.

The purpose of Fire Prevention Week is to bring awareness to the risk of death in case of a fire and provide educational resources for everyone. Visit NFPA.org/ Public-Education to learn more about staying safe.



Dear Neighbors,

I hope everyone has had a good start to fall. As I write this (September 9), there was a touch of fall feeling outside this morning and I'm hoping we get some good fall color this year on our trees.

Peanut Butter Contest

This is a competition between all the towns/cities in Collin County to see who can collect the most peanut butter for the North Texas Food Bank. You can drop off jars peanut butter at either of our fire stations. I am sure that you have seen the lines of cars waiting for food relief on TV. Food insecurity is a growing problem – even in Collin County. Our previous donations were: 238 pounds in 2019, 668 pounds in 2020. On a per resident basis, I think we came in second to Plano last year. Several of our neighborhoods got behind this contest and really helped last year. Let's see if we can hit at least 1,000 pounds this year – and beat Plano!

Fire Station #1 Opening

What a great turnout we had for the opening ceremony!! Thanks to the Friends of the Fairview Fire Fighters and our town staff who helped put on this event. Thanks to all our residents who supported building this much needed facility for our first responders.

Tax Roll

Collin County determines the tax value of all the property in Fairview. The total appraised value for the 2021-2022 fiscal year is up to \$2,236,478,486. This is about 3% higher than last year. The split between residential/commercial/other appraised value is about 86% - 7% - 7%. It will be nice whenever we get the Billingsley properties built so that the percentage of commercial goes up. The average home value is up to \$571,719 up about 6.4% from last year.

Tax Rate

The Town Council has approved the tax rate for 2021-2022. The presentations made during the public hearing are available on the Town's website. The new tax rate is 0.3445580 per \$100 of valuation. This tax rate is about 4.5% lower than the last fiscal year. At this tax rate, the average homeowner in Fairview will see a \$9.29 per month increase in their Fairview property taxes. The average annual cost to our residents is \$1,975.75 or \$164.65/ month. For this payment, we get 24x7x365 professional and highly competent fire, EMS, and police service. We get clean water every time we turn on the tap, we have a skilled and dedicated Public Works group that fixes water breaks and keeps our streets, parks, and trails very well maintained. We have code enforcement and zoning protection for our property values. Every year, I compare my town taxes with my homeowner's insurance cost. Every year, except for one, the town tax paid is less by several hundred dollars than what I pay for homeowner's insurance. I think what we get for our tax dollars is a great bargain.

Budget

As usual, our annual budget funds regular municipal services, doing what is necessary to provide the services that our residents expect such as to maintain the Town's infrastructure and to fix some infrastructure issues in some of our older neighborhoods. About 71% of the General Fund budget is wages and benefits. About 68% of the General Fund budget goes to support our fire, police, and public works groups. We will be slightly reducing the amount held in our reserve accounts. Some of the things included in the overall budget are: drainage projects in three neighborhoods, additional funds set aside for road maintenance, funding a market study on what we pay our staff, replacing outdated police cameras, repurposing the original fire station #1 for public works use, improving security at our Public Works sites, and commissioning a study on the rebuild of Hart Road.

Water and Sewer Rates

Water rates will remain the same – no increase. If you have sewer service in your neighborhood, NTMWD is raising the rate by 14% that is charged to the Town, The Council decided to pass through 10% of the increase. The difference will be covered by slightly lowering our utility fund reserves.

Speed Limits

Now that school is open, please be aware of the kiddos going to and from school. The speed limit in our neighborhoods is 25 mph.

Covid

If you have children in our schools, you know that there are a very large number of our kiddos getting sick with Covid. This greatly pains me. Please if your child is 12 years or older – get them vaccinated. If you haven't been vaccinated – please get vaccinated. If we are going to eventually beat Covid – there is only one way – get everyone vaccinated. I am already signed up for my booster shot this month.



Fairview's Event Venue Gets a Refresh

A self-professed "ordinary mom," Accasia has been planning events for sixteen years, for both corporate employers and personal connections. Get to know her, however, and you'll discover that special events have been part of her story since childhood.

Born in New York and raised in the Dominican Republic, Accasia grew up with a deep sense of family and connection. "Family" was loosely defined, with little distinction made between neighbors, friends, and blood relatives. Everyone was family and there was always a special reason to come together. For holidays, parties, and special occasions, they gathered together around a large Acacia tree at her grandparent's house.

Accasia shares, "We always gathered under that Acacia tree. Over the years we cried together, laughed together, played games, supported friends...we did everything together at that tree. It's very meaningful to me how that tree bonded us together. It's how I got my name and represents my upbringing. The bond we felt beneath it and my joy in connecting people is why I have a passion for event planning."

In late spring of this year, Accasia made the bold decision to resign from her marketing position at Frito Lay to pursue owning and operating her own event venue.

She shares, "When I said to my husband, 'I want to quit my job and do this,' it took us both by surprise. He has been amazing, supporting me every step of the way."

Her leap of faith led her to the space formerly known as Noah's Event Venue. It had been empty for well over a year and would need a little work, but was otherwise perfect.

"The architecture of the facility is beautiful," she remarks. "It's one of the reasons I knew this was the right space at the right time. We got right to work on repairs, deep cleaning, and muchneeded updates, like new audio/visual equipment."

And, she added a nod to the special Acacia tree at her grandparent's house, now found in her business logo.

hospitality suite, Chiavari chairs, audio/visual equipment, stateof-the-art decorating grids, a catering prep kitchen, and more. Clients enjoy the perks of a generous 8-hour time block, full use of the linens, chairs, and decor options. Also of note, they offer an open vendor policy, allowing clients the flexibility to play with their budget.

The best perk of all is Accasia herself. Dedicated to ensuring that each event runs smoothly, she serves as the on-site Event Coordinator for each and every event.

When a prospective client comes for a tour, Accasia walks them through her various layouts and amenities based on their wish list and then creates a custom package that will bring their vision to life.

"I want anyone who comes in here to feel like it's their home," she says. "They should feel proud to invite their guests here for a great experience."

It hasn't taken Accasia long to become small business savvy. A forward thinker, she intends to maximize the value of her new venue. On weekdays, two of the smaller rooms convert to conference-style spaces, available to rent by the hour with full use of the audio/visual equipment.

With the holiday season coming up, she also wants to help small businesses provide celebrations for their employees and partners. She shares, "After the madness these last couple of years, they deserve time to celebrate together." To that end, she has developed packages that allow business owners from Fairview and surrounding cities, such as Allen and McKinney, to gather and share the expense of holiday parties.

Accasia's Event Venue has hit the ground running. They've executed a few events already and have several more booked in the coming weeks. Accasia admits that launching a new business is equal parts exciting and terrifying, but she's fueled by her heart to foster community, just as her family did under the Acacia tree in the Dominican Republic.

"This is very personal to me, it's why I put my name on the building. Whether we coordinate on the day of the event or plan every detail from concept to execution, I want to bring your vision to life while you focus on enjoying your special day."

HALLOWEEN Safety Tips

While Trick-or-Treating may still look a little different this year because of COVID-19 we can still use some practical reminders to keep everyone safe.

Child Safety

- Never eat any treats until they are examined by an adult at your home.
- Never Trick-or-Treat alone. Go with friends or a parent.
- Never enter the house or car of a stranger.
- Always Trick-or-Treat before dark.
- Trick-or-Treat in your own neighborhood and visit houses that you know.
- Stay on streets that are well lit and cross the street at corners.
- Never run across the street and ALWAYS look both ways before crossing.
- Never take short cuts through backyards, alleys or parks.
- Carry a flashlight so you can see hazards and wear reflective tape so drivers can see you.
- Only Trick-or-Treat at houses that are well lit and that have a porch light on.
- Do not let children use sharp tools to carve pumpkins. Allow children to draw faces on pumpkins with markers and then have the adults cut them.

Adult Safety

- Only buy flame resistant costumes, wigs, masks, etc., for you and your children.
- Only buy accessories like knives and swords that are made of soft, flexible materials.
- Welcome Trick-or-Treaters by turning on your porch light.
- Candlelit jack-o'-lanterns should be kept clear of doorsteps and walk paths.
- Consider using flashlights to light up your jack-o'lanterns, instead of candles.

- Keep pets away from the door, so children do not become frightened.
- Set a time limit for your children to Trick-or-Treat and designate a specific route.
- Feed children before they go, so they will be less likely to eat the treats before getting home.
- Carefully inspect all treats before allowing young children to start eating them.
- Use extreme caution when driving children around. Watch out for children walking in roadways or darting across the street.
- Backing vehicles account for a number of injuries on Halloween, so back up carefully.

Pet Safety

• In case of teenage pranks, do not leave pets outside on Halloween.

- Remember, chocolate, tin foil and/or candy wrappers can be very harmful or toxic to some pets.
- Pets may knock over lit candles and pumpkins and start fires or get burned.
- Dressing pets in costumes can cause undue stress on animals.
- Keep pets in a separate room from where Trickor-Treaters will visit.
- Pets can be unpredictable around people dressed in costumes. Someone could be bitten.
- Pets may run to the door or dart out the door when Trick-or-Treaters come knocking.
- Walk your dog before the Trick-or-Treaters come out to avoid accidental encounters.



Collection Schedules

Trash, recycling and yard trimmings are collected weekly on Monday, Tuesday or Wednesday if all items are placed inside the cart with lid closed. Please place trash in the BLUE cart and recyclables in the GREEN cart.

Bulk waste and loose brush are collected once a month. Please refer to the map on the previous page to determine your pick up week. Bulk trash may be put out after 6 p.m. on the Friday before collection but no later than 7 a.m. on Monday of your collection week. Bulk trash may be picked up anytime during the collection week. **See #7 in the guidelines below for size** *limits.*

2021 Holidays: Trash, recycling, bulk and brush will not be picked up on the holidays listed below; instead the collection will slide one day after the holiday-unless otherwise noted.

Remember These Simple Guidelines For Putting Your Trash Out

- 1. Place carts on the edge of the street/alley with handles facing the house and with the lids opening to the street/alley.
- 2. Keep carts two to three feet apart and away from fences, cars, gates, gas meters, etc...
- 3. All trash should be contained in securely tied plastic bags. All bags should fit into the cart with the lid closed.
- 4. Do not place hazardous household waste in your cart.
- 5. Place your carts out by 7 a.m. on pick up day; carts should not be left out after 6 a.m. the following day.
- 6. Do not place any items out side your carts; unless it's for bulk pick up.
- 7. Brush and bulk trash must not be more than 12 cubic yards which is equal to 4 pick-up truck loads.

FRISCO ROAD UPDATE

The Town Council has approved an amended professional services agreement with Kimley-Horn and Associates for the complete design of the Frisco Road realignment from State Highway 5 to US75/SH121.

This amendment takes the current 30% design to 100% design, followed by the construction start in early 2022. The town received a \$3 million EDA grant for the project which will allow for design to move right into the construction phase. This project will convert the existing 3-way intersection at FM1378/SH5 into a 4-way intersection with the realignment of Frisco Road and a connection North to Medical Center Drive and a future connection South to Fairview Pkwy.
